UNDER THE WIRES.

THE ELECTRIC LIGHT PLANT HAS
ARRIVED.

The Wires are Up and the Machinery is
Being Placed.

The Str. Augusta brought in both the
arc and incandescent dynamos of the
electric light plant for the Tillamook
Lumbering Company, together with all
the machinery, wires, insulators, lamps
etc. The main conducting wires are up,
the machinery is being placed, and the
branch wires are being run into the resi-
dences and business houses. Work is
being pushed by the Thompson-Houston
Company's electrician, J. L. Lambirth,
and he is aided in superintending the
work by his assistant, W. H. Webb, of
Portland. These gentlemen are experts
in their business, and are working all the
men that can be utilized, and if no ac-
cident occurs the lights will be turned on
in less than two weeks.

The machinery and fixtures are the
best and latest improved that could be
obtained, being an \$8,000 plant, and
would have cost much more, but that
the Lumbering Company is able to fur-
nish power from the mill engines.

The people of the town are very enthu-
siastic regarding the future, now, and
none doubt further regarding the electric
lights being an assured thing. Prices on
real estate are beginning to advance.

BAKING POWDER
In the New York Legislature.

The following taken from "The Oil,
Paint and Drug Reporter," refers to a
new bill introduced in the legislature of
New York State:

"The latest development in the baking
powder war, is the introduction of a bill
in the legislature of this State, requiring
all packages of baking powder which
contain ammonia, to be branded with a
statement of that fact in large type on
the label.

Now while the ammonia contention is
on, why cannot the law give the public
the benefit of the doubt? Wholly un-
prejudiced people are certainly not
willing to be dosed with a substance
acknowledged as a poison, simply be-
cause scientists, some of whom are not
even physiologists, disagree as to its
potency."

A similar bill was introduced last April
but it is shrewdly surmised that the in-
fluence of interested parties prevented its
passage. The provisions of the present
bill are so just that it will probably soon
become a law.

This will be welcome news to the

A bill compelling alum powders to be
conspicuously labelled as such, already
exists in Minnesota and it is to be hoped
in the interest of the consumer that sim-
ilar laws will be enacted in other states,
for ammonia as well as alum.

tain either ammonia or alum or both,
will be affected by the proposed legisla-
tion:

Royal, Pearl, Calumet, Chicago Yeast,
Forest City, One Spoon (Taylors), Bonbon,
Kenton, Echo, Snow Puff, Unleavened, Yar-
nall's One Spoon, Shepard's Economical,
Crown, Climax, Hercules, Monarch, New
Era, Snow Ball.
