THE CONVENTION.

The Republican convention to meet here next Saturday, is one of more than ordinary importance. Two years ago we met with defeat and disaster by a disgraceful squabble over personal likes and dislikes, and while we fought one another, the Democratic minority captured the offices. A like fate will befall the same conduct this year.

If the delegates come together in a proper spirit, with a determination to consult together and nominate a good ticket they can do so. But if the convention is split up by fights for and against individual candidates they will invite and deserve defeat.

It is the duty of each delegate to remember that he is acting for the whole party, and is on his honor to try to make the best nominations possible, first regarding fitness for the office, and then regarding the chance of polling a good vote, and last consideration of all should be that of personal friendship or enmity.

In this spirit we can win, and help towards having our state sound the first note for a national victory this fall, as she did four years ago.

We earnestly commend to the delegates who shall meet next Saturday, the importance of harmony and a spirit of mutual concession in their deliberations, and trust to them for a ticket that shall secure mutual support and ultimate success.

PROPOSED APPROPRIATIONS.

The House Committee on Rivers and Harbors has recommended appropriations as follows for Oregon:

Columbia River at Cascades	\$433,000
Mouth of the Columbia	300,000
Coos Bay	210,000
Yaquina Bay	75,000
Siuslaw River	10,000
Tillamook Bay	15,000
Lower Willamette and Columbia	50,000
Cogswell Jetty	25,000
Upper Cogswell River	5,000
Yamhill River to McMinnville	3,000
Upper Columbia and Snake R.	150,000
Willamette River to Eugene City, with a commencement of the special work at Oswego, Clackamas Rapids, Corvallis, Independence and Salem	430,000

The total is \$1,170,000, and is the largest outside of New York. Provision is made for the preliminary survey of Nestucca Bay, and Mr. Hermann hopes to have the plans of the War Department, for Nehalem, modified so that an appropriation may be had for that place. He has done well for Oregon, but the paltry sum of \$15,000 for Tillamook bay seems insignificant alongside of the \$210,000 for Coos Bay and \$75,000 for Yaquina. It should be remembered that Tillamook bay is of more importance than any other point between San Francisco and Astoria.

organized a stock company and have, very liberally contributed lands, lots and notes to form a grand pool of collateral on which to raise a \$400,000 subsidy for a railroad, and a railroad for that town is an assured thing now. Surveyors are at work already, and Tillamook should not be slow in taking action to secure the railroad through this county. The citizens of this place might well imitate Astoria, and, as cash is hard to get, contribute property on which the money can be raised to offer as an inducement to railroads. Other important industries could be secured in the same manner. A railroad connecting Astoria with the Willamette valley should traverse this county by all means, and if it does, the road will gather a large amount of business all along the line, whereas if it takes some other route the side traffic will amount to but little until it reaches the Willamette valley.

There was a prize fight recently between two 16-year-old Portland boys, and one of them died from the effects of it. The coroner's jury brought in a verdict of "died from heart failure, superinduced by over exertion during a prize fighting contest." Almost as bad as the Texan jury that rendered a verdict over the victim to the effect that "the deceased came to his death by calling Bill Jackson a liar."

There seems to be such a desire for harmony among some of the politicians that they are willing to sacrifice their friends, their enemies and their first wife's relations in order to secure it.

And now this government and Great Britain are quarreling again over the Behring seal fishing question, with some prospects of war.

BEST TIME FOR SCHOOL.

Ed. HEADLIGHT—I understand that it is the intention of your school board to have a nine months term of school, beginning about the 1st of April. I think it a great mistake to have school during the summer months, and an injustice to the pupils, as well. The little folks need a time to grow, and there is no time so good for that as when the sun shines. It is an injustice to the large scholars, who have to help provide a living, as the summer months are the working months, and, of course, they must miss the summer term. Again you had a vacation in the winter, which is a great injustice to all the children in the district. I have heard this excused on the very plausible ground that the weather was so bad at this time of the year that pupils living at a distance were unable to attend. If the school is practicable during December and January, then, surely, it is so during the next two months, when the days are longer and the weather, almost always, better than it is the two preceding months. Now, let me suggest that we have a term of three months this spring, to begin as soon as possible, and then a vacation of two months. This would suit several parties with whom I have conversed. After vacation, have a nine months session. Messrs. Directors, please remember that your school is largely supported by taxes, and that it is the tax-payers who are to be pleased.

ORDINANCE NO. 35.

AN ORDINANCE TO EXTEND AND WIDEN 3rd AVENUE EAST.

The people of Tillamook City do ordain:

Sec. 1. It is hereby declared necessary, expedient, and for the interest of the city and the public that 3rd Ave. East in said city of Tillamook be extended and continued sixty (60) feet in width from the south side of Sixth Street southerly in a straight line with the west line of said 3rd Ave. East as now laid out and established, to the center of Eighth Street.

Sec. 2. Immediately after the passage of this ordinance it shall be the duty of the Recorder to have the same published for a period of one month in the Tillamook HEADLIGHT, a newspaper published in said city.
