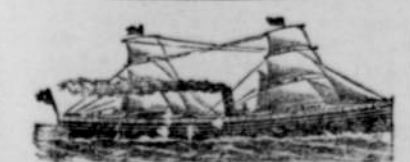

SALMON CAPE QUICKSILVER.

Timber Land Case.

The statement contained in a dispatch
from Washington, to the effect that the
supreme court of the United States had
sustained the decision of Judge Hanford,
in the case of the United States vs N. E.
Budd and Jas. B. Montgomery, in re-
gard to a timber claim in Coville county,
gave great satisfaction to a number of
people in this section. Dealers in timber
land say this decision will be conducive
to the best interests of the state. Capita-
lists who have given up making
investments here, because of the trouble
in establishing the fact that land
heavily timbered was timber land, will
now feel that they can safely invest in
timber land here. Scores of persons who
bought timber land in good faith and
who, on account of the rulings of com-
missioners, could not get a title nor get
their money back, now feel assured that
they will be able to secure the land they
have paid the maximum price for.The timber land act was passed in
1878, and provided that lands chiefly
valuable for their timber could be sold in
Oregon, Washington, California and
Nevada for \$2.50 per acre. In 1885
Sparks, land commissioner, held that
land that could grow grass or anything
after the timber was off was agricultural
land, notwithstanding that the timber
was worth much more than the land ever
would be, and that it cost more to clear
the land than it was worth. Sparks'
successor, Groff, held the same, and
there has been no end of trouble ever
since in regard to timber lands. People
who entered timber lands under this act
were charged with perjury and fraudu-
lent entry, and could get no patent to
their claims nor were they ever able to
get their money back. Mr. J. B. Mont-
gomery bought a large number of timber
claims from the parties who entered
them, and was accused of fraud and
everything that was bad. People located
homesteads on the land that he had
bought, claiming that it was agricultural
land, and he has been lawing for years
to secure possession.Judge Hanford finally decided that
land heavily covered with timber was
timber land, and it is only fair to say
that Commissioner Carter held the same
view.While there may in some instances
have been collusion between the party
taking up a timber claim and the man
who bought it from him, there is no
doubt that the land thus taken was tim-
ber land, and that the man who made
the fraudulent entry and perjured him-
self in so doing, was the man who took
up 160 acres of dense timber, swearing
that it was agricultural land, and that he
intended to make a farm of it, when he
knew that it would cost him \$100 an acre
to clear it off, his only idea in taking it
up being to secure the timber on it.
It is probable that the decision of the
supreme court will put end to the claims
of the fellows who have located home-
steads on lands which had been taken up
and paid for as timber lands.—Oregonian.
