ELECTRIC LIGHTS.

TILLAMOOK LIGHTED BY ELECTRIC
ILLUMINATORS FOR THE
FIRST TIME.The System a Great Success—The Lights
Very Brilliant—Tillamookers
Enthusiastic.

The incandescent lights have been
glowing for the last week, and the arc
lights will be turned on to-night. The
city presents a scene of gorgeous brilliance,
the people are buoyant with enthusiasm,
and there is nothing to mar the occasion
but a drizzling rain and the Democratic
convention.

THE PLANT.

The plant is the latest improved and
most perfect system in use. The ma-
chinery is of the most approved pattern,
is finely finished, and very delicate and
positive in action, though simple in con-
struction. It was furnished by the North
West Thompson-Houston Electric Com-
pany of Portland, Oregon, and this
company has furnished the lighting sys-
tems for a great number of cities and
towns in the North West, being in use
more than any other. The Thompson-
Houston machines are in use in Portland,
Forest Grove, Tacoma, Seattle, Olympia,
North Yakima, and many other cities
in Oregon and Washington, and the sys-
tem is in use in the principal cities all
over the World, having been brought to
a high degree of perfection. The diffi-
culties which were encountered a few
years ago have been entirely overcome,
and electric lights are now the cheapest,
best, and most effective artificial lights
in existence.

The plant put in here is as good as the
best used in the large cities, and no ex-
pense has been spared in putting in the
very best and most durable appliances,
even to the poles and minor wires.

The dynamo for the incandescent light
is a fine machine, and has a capacity of
1,100 volts, or 650 16-candle-power lights,
though 250 of these lights are sufficient
for the city at present. The arc dynamo
has a capacity of eight 2,000-candle-
power arc lights, and the six arc lights
on the streets make the city at night al-
most as light as day. The Exciter is a
smaller dynamo used to excite a cur-
rent in the large alternating incandescent
dynamo, and is a powerful little machine
of itself. One side of the room where
the plant is located is called the switch-
board, and is supplied with all the regu-
lating indicating and safety appliances
known to electrical skill and ingenuity.
These fixtures are all, of course, con-
nected with the machinery and main
wires. The Current Indicator shows the
power of the current as to quantity by
amperes, and the Potential Indicator
shows the intensity of the current by
volts. There are complicated machines
known as Rheostats, for regulating and
modifying the current as it is turned on
the main wires, for both arc and incan-
descent dynamos. Lightning arresters
are provided, so that in case the wires
are struck by lightning, the force of it is
carried into the ground just outside, in-
stead of running into the machines and
injuring them. There is, also, an ingen-
ious contrivance, called the Ground
Detector, which shows immediately if
the line is anywhere in contact with the
ground, a limb, or other obstruction
which closes the circuit. The wall is also
covered with transformers, reducers,
switches, appliances for shutting off the
light, etc., etc.

The main wires are covered with a
non-conductive, water and fire proof
covering, very thick, and all the wires
used are heavily insulated, so that none
of the power is lost through the atmos-
phere or by coming in contact with any-
thing, and are perfectly safe to
handle. Safety appliances are used in
the transformers or switches, located at
various places on the poles, where the
branch wires are joined to connect in-
dividual lights, and at the connections at
the entrance of each building is a delicate
contrivance which makes it impossible
for anyone to receive any injury from the
current in the lamps.

An insulated wire cord is used next to
the lamps, and the light can be safely
moved about anywhere in the room.
The lights can be turned on and off at
pleasure and are very powerful, yet soft,
and easy on the eyes while reading even
the finest print. A glass bulb vacuum
containing the completion of the circuit
by a fine carbonized bamboo filament,
covered by any desired style of shade,
constitutes the light. The carbonized
fiber being a non-conductor and not
combustible, offers resistance, hence the
glow. It is on the same principle that a
spark is generated when two poles of a
battery are brought in close proximity.
There is little heat generated, and no
danger of fire from these lamps.

The large arc lights on the street work
on the same principle, except the circuit
is closed (nearly) by sticks of carbon
which glow with great brilliancy when
the current is on. The globes, shades
and mechanism of the arc lamps are very
effective, and pulleys are arranged so
the lamps can be lowered into the mid-
dle of the street for adjusting or placing
new carbons, which is necessary every
day. The fiber carbon in the incandes-
cent lights is supposed to last 1000 hours
before renewing is necessary.

The poles and cross arms, erected
in the most substantial manner, and

machinery at the engine house is on a
good foundation, works perfectly, the
power is good, and in fact, nothing has
been done half-way.

J. L. Lambirth, the Thompson-Hous-
ton Co's electrician, thoroughly under-
stands his business, and has had
experience under the most trying circum-
stances. He is perfectly familiar with
all the details of such work, having been
in charge of the Thompson-Houston
Electrical Exhibit at the Portland exhi-
bition last year, at which 106 arc and 3000
incandescent lamps were kept going. He
has had charge of the construction
here, and will stay thirty days after the
lights are started here, and give instruc-
tions to the engineers and electricians
who will be left in charge. Curtis Cren-
shaw and Frank McCormack are in
training for the work. The services of
Wm. Webb, an expert electrician, were
also utilized during the construction.

The enterprise shown by the Tillamook
Lumbering Co. which put in the plant is
highly commendable, and the people of
Tillamook seem imbued with the same
spirit of progression, and are giving the
Company liberal patronage. Verily,
Tillamook is on the high road to pros-
perity.

When you go to the electric light
engine house, be careful not to monkey
with the exciter dynamo. You might
get a few hundred volts clogged up in
your spinal column, or an amperes cross-
wise under your belt, which might tend
to a concatenation of the duplex process
of four clavicular autonomy. Keep your
metacarpal appendages off the Potential
Indicator and Rheostat, if you don't want
forked lightning to penetrate your mar-
row bones. A Rheostat is a nice thing in
its place, and very useful in raising a
family, but you don't want to fool with it
when it's excited. The wall is covered with
duplex switches, thingabobs, indicators,
dynam
