The Salem Statesman says that Judge Boise and his friends are earnestly supporting Burnett, instead of fighting him, as was reported. It is believed that Burnett and McCain will receive big majorities in this county.

We are in receipt of several letters from our friends, and others, who write articles for publication which we think will engender strife in the coming election, if published. We believe in the free and untrammelled expression of opinion through the press, but at this time we ask our friends to withhold everything of a nature to foment a controversy. The exigencies of the present time demand that great care should be taken about this matter.

Tillamook county is isolated at present from the rest of the world, and we need a better state of affairs, and better recognition from the state and national authorities. We can get this only by concerted

county expects to accomplish anything for the country it must stand together. We say further, that Republicans and Democrats should stand together as much as possible. It will take the combined strength of all of us to secure what we need, and party differences should not draw us into disgraceful fights. For this reason we deprecate any personal fights in the coming county election. It means money in our pockets and general prosperity for us to go through this campaign peacefully. We earnestly appeal to every right-thinking man to seriously consider this policy. The advantages of it that we enumerate are only a few of them. It will strengthen the Republican party in the county, and aid our interests mutually.

Hon. F. A. Moore, of Columbia county, the Republican candidate for Supreme Judge, is very popular throughout the state. He is an able lawyer, an honorable and upright man, clean and pure in his record morally, and has filled every office to which he has been elected in such a manner that he has never been in the role of a candidate. The honors have been thrust upon him, without his asking, and without effort on the part of his friends. Senator Moore is a self-made man, toiling hard and applying himself industriously and persistently to whatever work he had before him, until success has crowned his efforts, and the future has much yet in store for him. If he is elected, which certainly will be the case, he will wear his honors becomingly. Senator Moore is not a flattering demagogical politician, yet he is easily approached by the humblest personage, and is courteous, gentlemanly, and kind to everyone alike. Justice will be meted out by him to rich or poor, great or small just the same. The Republicans should be proud of their selection.

OUR JOINT REPRESENTATIVE.

The Yamhill Reporter has the following to say regarding a mild remonstrance which appeared in the HEADLIGHT recently: "Mr. Lamson will labor as zealously for the interests of one part of his district as another, and the interests of Tillamook will not suffer in his hands. It will be well enough for our republican friends on that side to understand something of the feeling over this way, and they will know why they are disappointed. Yamhill county is entitled to the joint representative part of the time, but has been kindly disposed toward the sister county and for the last two years has conceded the representative. Lately, however, it seems Tillamook republicans have got to wrangling among themselves, and if a candidate is taken from one of the rival factions the other is liable to slaughter him at the polls. Our delegation merely acted in the capacity of an arbitrator, by giving them a candidate who would be free from factional prejudice."

There are several points in the above worthy of attention: First, we should like to know what is the "feeling," to which an allusion is made.

We are willing that Yamhill should have three representatives, but we want one in Tillamook all the time and think we are entitled to that one. The population of Tillamook is fully one-third as much as that of Yamhill, and it is not so much a question of population as it is of location. A representative from this county could shake hands across the dividing line on the summit of the Coast Range with the Yamhill representatives and join in efforts that would be of great mutual benefit to the two counties, located so peculiarly and dependent on each other in many particulars. Yamhill has many things that we want, and Tillamook county has many things that Yamhill county wants.

As to the political wrangle here, Mr. T. B. Handley, who was recommended by us, was the choice of all elements or factions, regardless of wrangles, and would have polled as large a vote here as Mr. Lamson, in fact, more than the full strength of his party. Our delegates were unanimously for him and needed no arbitrators.

But, aside from all this, we believe the Republicans of this county will cheerfully support Mr. Lamson, and give him a rousing majority at the polls in June, as we have every reason to believe Mr. Lamson is an honorable and capable man, and that he did not seek the nomination. The feeling
