

DR. S. W. WEAVER'S RESIDENCE NARROWLY ESCAPES.

The Hook & Ladder Company Promptly
Saves the Building.

Just before noon Saturday the ominous bling of the fire bell in the city hall announced a fire in the 3rd ward. The boys were at the ladder house in a moment, and, considering the long run, were quick to arrive at the scene of the conflagration. The ladders went up, the roof of the house was chopped in, and in no time a deluge of water was poured in, coming up in buckets from ladders on both sides.

It didn't take long to extinguish the fire, though it was gaining headway very fast before the boys arrived, and great volumes of smoke were rolling out through the roof.

During the time all the furniture was removed from the house, but in half an hour it was all moved back, only slightly damaged, and Dr. Weaver had carpenters on the house repairing the roof. The total damage will not, perhaps, exceed \$50, and the house was saved only through the prompt action of the firemen. Had they been two minutes later, the fire would have been beyond control.

In the excitement some one who was handling an axe, struck C. H. Freas under the chin, inflicting an ugly but not dangerous cut. His wound was dressed and sewn up promptly by Dr. Peter.

Several others materially assisted the firemen, several were materially in the way, some of them running about frantically, in all directions, hatless and coatless, and so far as having the intelligent use of any cerebral contents was concerned, headless to boot.

The boys had to make a long run with the truck, and were nearly exhausted when they arrived at the fire, as the building is well out of town, and muddy roads without gravel had to be gone over. Some who rushed to the scene without axes, buckets, motives, or anything else, would have done better if they had lent a hand in pulling the truck, as the boys gave out.

The fire was the result of a defective fuse, and should be a warning to those having dangerous fuses in their houses. The city authorities are now determined to enforce the ordinance providing for safe brick fuses, and it is right, as no one should be allowed to jeopardize the safety of all the property in the city by such criminal carelessness as is manifested in using an unsafe fuse.

Mr. Wm. Webb, one of the electricians, who has had a good chance to make observations in putting electric light wires on the buildings in the city, says that many of the chimneys are not safe, and that in many instances the mortar has crumbled away from between the bricks, making destructive fires liable at any time. The fire marshal should make a round, carefully investigating every building.

Charged With Forgery.

U. S. Deputy Marshal Sanott, of Portland, took Ex-Postmaster J. C. Mason to Portland to answer to the charge of forgery in connection with some money order business transacted while he was Postmaster. Sophia Severance and John Erickson were taken along as witnesses. Mr. Mason will be taken before U. S. Commissioner Paul Dewey. It is to be hoped that he will be able to prove himself clear of the charges.

LATER:—Mr. Mason was bound over in the sum of \$1000 to appear before the United States grand jury and answer the charge.

CITY ORDINANCE.

ORDINANCE NO. 37.

AN ORDINANCE TO CHANGE THE NORTH LINE OF BLOCK 10 OF TILLAMOOK CITY.

The people of Tillamook City do ordain: Sec. 1. It is hereby declared necessary, expedient and, for the interest of the city and the public that the south line of First Street, across Blk. 10, of Tillamook City, be changed as follows:

To-wit: Beginning at a point where the north line of Blk. 1, of Thayer's Addition, if extended, would intersect the east line of Blk. 10, of Tillamook, thence extend said line N. 77° W. to an intersection with the north line of said Blk. 10, and that all land lying north of said line and south of the present north boundary of Blk. 10 shall be a part of said First Street.

Sec. 2. Immediately after the passage of this ordinance it shall be the duty of the Recorder to have the same published for a period of one month in the Tillamook HEADLIGHT, a newspaper published in said city.

ANDREW LANG'S FIRST BOOKS.

What the Famous Litterateur Read When He Was a Youth in Pinafores.

The first books which vividly impressed me were, naturally, fairy tales and chapbooks about Robert Bruce, William Wallace and Rob Roy. At that time these little tracts could be bought for a penny apiece. I can still see Bruce and Wallace in full armor, discoursing across a burn, and Rob Roy slipping from the soldier's horse into the stream. They did not then awaken a precocious patriotism; a boy of five is more at home in Fairyland than in his own country.

The sudden appearance of the White Cat as a queen, after her head was cut off; the fiendish malice of the Yellow Dwarf; the strange cake of crocodile eggs and millet seed which the mother of the Princess Frutilla made for the Fairy of the Desert—these things, all fresh and astonishing, but certainly to be credited, are my first memories of romance.

One story of a White Serpent, with a woodcut of that mysterious reptile, I neglected to secure, probably for want of a penny, and I have regretted it ever since. One never sees those cheap books now. "The White Serpent," in spite of all research, remains invaluable. It was a lost chance, and for time does not forgive.

Nobody ever interfered with these, or indeed with any other, studies of ours at that time, so long as they were not prosecuted on Sundays. "The fightingest parts of the Bible," and the Apocrypha, and stories like that of the "Wittol of Endor" were subliminal literature, read in a huge old illustrated Bible.

How I advanced from the fairy tales to Shakespeare, what stages there were on the way—for there must have been stages—is a thing that memory cannot recover.

A nursery legend tells that I was wont to arrange six open books on six chairs and go from one to the other, perusing them by turn. No doubt this was what people call "desultory reading," but I did not hear the criticism till later, and then too often for my comfort.—Andrew Lang in Scribner's.

Then you can sell goods cheaper to your good patrons. Isn't this true business, and what honest man can object to receiving a statement of his account? N. Boats frequently descend the Nehalem from Columbia county to the lower Nehalem in this county. It is a dangerous trip to those who are not hardy and accustomed to such ordeals, as there are large rocks and rapids in places, and the river is lashed into a foaming torrent. None but experts should try it, and they are liable to be dashed to pieces. It doesn't take long for a boat to make the trip of over 100 miles, and is not likely to be forgotten by those who try it. The scenery at some of the
