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lazy and indolent to work. Some of these people were highly elated to think the county would provide for them, and made no effort to provide for themselves. Those who have children should be relieved of their care by process of law, the children put with respectable families, and the irresponsible parents made to "rustle for themselves. The grown brothers of one young woman, for whom aid was sought, should be required to support her and protect her, or be themselves supported on a sharp cornered rail and protected by a liberal coat of tar and feathers. Some of the loose and lewd strumpets who are wont to inflict their ill-begotten progeny on the indulgent public, should receive the withering condemnation of all decent people, and the scavengers who consort with them, and take advantage of such imbecility, be purged from the community, or placed in durance vile.

The Tillamook County Fair Association is beginning to make preparations for the Fair this fall, and will have ample time to make it a grand success. Last year there was hardly time to get things properly arranged and advertised, and the committees lacked experience. This year no such obstacles will be in the way, and the Fair grounds will be fitted up in much more comfortable and attractive shape, and the outlook, at present, is that there will be ten times as large an exhibit as last year. The attractions and inducements to farmers, stock raisers and dairymen will be much greater and the principal feature this time, and all are earnestly invited to take an active part and bring something to exhibit. The exhibit last year was a very great surprise to all present, and can be made much more interesting and extensive this year. There are some excellent cattle and horses in the county, and it is to be hoped that all of the best will be represented. A very imposing display can be made of vegetables fruit, grain and grass products. Nestuckerites should not miss the opportunity to exhibit samples of their unexcelled honey. They have no occasion to market their honey in the Willamette valley, as every pound of the product can be sold here at better rates than in the Valley, if they will only show what they have, and then bring it here to market. There should be a large exhibit of butter and cheese, by all means, from all parts of the county. Nehalem people should have samples of their coal here, and there should be some specimen cuts from some of the largest trees in the county on the ground, as there will be a number of outsiders here, in all probability. The mill men should see to this. Let every mill and manufacturing industry have some product on exhibition, and every business man have samples of his wares. The Fair can be and should be made of enormous benefit to the interests of the county.

IMPORTANT LAND DECISION.

Assistant U. S. Land Commissioner Stone has sent the following instructions to the Land Office at La Grande, Oregon:

"Legally qualified pre-emptor who settled upon unsurveyed lands prior to repeal of pre-emption law, is entitled to file therefor after expiration of ninety days from filing of township plat, in absence of adverse claim."

There is no doubt but those who have settled in good faith on unsurveyed lands in this county will have the right to pre-empt their claims (if they haven't already exhausted that right) within ninety days after the plats are filed in the Land Office at Oregon City.

ALBANY AND ASTORIA RAILROAD.

The outlook of the Albany and Astoria railroad seems to be most favorable at present. The railroad people of Astoria, to use a phrase common but expressive, have gotten a move on, and are bound to make the railroad matter work out in the right manner. It is said that parties from Astoria will soon visit Albany to see what can be done in the way of helping the work through. The matter should be met by our people in a liberal manner, for it is what Albany needs and must have. Salem will also be interviewed upon the sub-

THE ROAD QUESTION.

ED. HEADLIGHT:—Respecting the improvement of county roads, your correspondent thinks that New York is taking a step in the right direction. A bill has been introduced into the legislature (see Farm and Fireside) which provides that all able bodied male convicts over 18 years of age shall be drafted out for the purpose of working the public roads. The bill further provides that the roads shall be worked in sections of eight miles, having movable shanties for the workmen at the center, and be worked either way four miles, the convicts being guarded by a proper corps of keepers.

That idea is the wisest which has been presented before the public as yet, for the convicts should be made to earn the expense of their keeping, and that to the benefit of the people in general. As it is now, they are kept to work at trades, and their productions are sent out in competition with free and honorable labor.

When once the roads are macadamized, the general road tax, even at a reduced rate per capita, will keep up the roads in first-class order.

The state or county should furnish rock crushers at points most conveniently located for hauling.

In the west of England, and, presumably, all through that country, the heavy farm wagons for hauling grain to market, have wheels with tires five or six inches in width, which prevent cutting the road into ruts and act as crushers and smoothers as they pass over the limestone rock which is laid very evenly. Where required, when the roads get muddy, men are employed with hand and horse scrapers to remove the mud to the roadside, and it is then carted away to be used as a fertilizer by mixing with ashes and manure. You may walk across the roads, so constructed, in that country, and not soil more than the soles of your boots, so well kept are they.

The roads, in '66, when your correspondent first came to make this country his home, were kept up by a system of turnpike gates, with toll from six to twelve cents for a vehicle; footmen always free. How they are conducted now, I cannot very well say, as I have not kept well informed on that matter. However, I think that for this country, the convicts should be used, as is the idea in New York.
