WHAT TILLAMOOK CITY HAS.

ELECTRIC LIGHTS.—The city is lighted throughout by electricity, the streets with arc lights and the dwellings and business houses with incandescent lights. The plant is first class in every respect, and capable of lighting a city of 10,000 inhabitants.

SIDEWALKS.—Miles of good, wide, substantially constructed sidewalks, forming a network extending to and connecting all parts of the city.

GRAVELED STREETS.—A first-class system of graveled streets, with a deep covering of good gravel, which is obtained in the city limits.

CITY HALL.—A neat substantial structure, containing city offices, council chamber, city jail and rooms for Fire Company. There is a good fire bell in the tower, and the building presents a good architectural appearance.

TELEGRAPH.—The Tillamook & Bay City Telegraph line connects with the Western Union at Forest Grove, and will be extended on this end to Nehalem and Clatsop.

TOWNSHIP.—The location of the city is remarkably beautiful, and is just sloping enough to secure good sewerage and drainage. An excellent system of water-works can be put in at reasonable cost, also. The townsite is laid out regularly, and with wide streets.

BUILDINGS.—There are many costly and beautiful dwelling houses in the city, and many substantial business houses. The school house is a credit to the city.

BUSINESS.—The city has four wharves, a saw mill, three blacksmith shops, two livery stables, three good hotels, several wood-working shops, two hardware stores, a jewelry store, a book-store, a shoe store, three saloons, two barber shops, a temperance resort, a feed store, two drug stores, agriculturists' implement store, meat market, bakery and restaurant, photograph gallery, cooperage shop, a bank, a fruit store, a newspaper, machinist's shop, real estate agents, lawyers, doctors, etc., etc.

FAIR GROUNDS.—The Tillamook Fair Association has fine grounds, an excellent half-mile track, grand-stand, pagoda, pavilion, etc.

CHURCHES.—The Catholics, the Methodists, Christians, M. E. Church South, and other denominations are well represented here.

SOCIETIES.—The Odd Fellows, Masons, Grand Army, and other orders have lodges here.

EDUCATION.—The school employs four teachers. Private schools are often conducted. Two or three church institutions are in embryo, and good inducements are held out for a college. Literary societies and reading circles are maintained.

MAIL FACILITIES.—There are daily mails from the S. P. R. station at North Yamhill; also to Bay City and points on the Bay, and tri-weekly mails from this place to many other points in the county.

ADVANTAGES.—Tillamook City is the county seat and commercial metropolis of Tillamook County. It holds the key to the farming region and to traffic on the Bay, and is backed by magnificent resources in the way of lumbering, dairying, fishing, etc.

TRANSPORTATION.—Steamers ply between this place and Astoria and Portland; also between the Bay and San Francisco. The steamers have good accommodations for passengers, and carry freight at cheap rates. There is a daily stage between this place and North Yamhill (on the S. P. R. R.) in the summer, and new stage routes will soon be opened. A railroad is sure to come in the near future.
