TO CORRESPONDENTS.

Separate your items.

Write only on one side of the paper.

Avoid personal attacks and criticisms.

Pay no attention to personal and neighborhood quarrels.

Don't say anything that will injure the legitimate business of anyone.

Write freely regarding the advantages or resources of your locality.

The columns of the newspaper belong to you, but make good use of them.

Write nothing but news. The public doesn't care if "John Smith's" girl has gone back on him.

If you think you can succeed on a different plan from what the editor follows, buy him out and try it.

If you have an idea worth expressing, write it out; it will help us and the public, but don't mistake yourself.

Articles on the "road question," or other local matters of interest, are always good; only make them short and to the point.

Don't get mad if your correspondence is left out. The editor consigns many of his own pet ideas to the waste basket every week.

Avoid poetry like you would the pest. Our own poetry is bad enough, God knows, and we are seldom foolish enough to publish it.

Your letters should get here not later than Tuesday to insure insertion, and as early as Monday, if possible. They are of little use the next week.

Your communications help the editor to make a good paper, even if they are not always published. It is a good thing for the editor to have plenty of "copy" on hand.

Before you send an article for publication, just ask yourself honestly if you would publish it if you were running a paper and your bread depended on the business.

When the time comes to go to press, the paper must be printed, in order to catch the mails, no matter how much is left out, and the overworked printer has to leave out what he can't put into type, and the editor, perhaps, hasn't the money to hire more help.

Be brief as possible. One or two pages is likely to be published, while a letter of six to twelve pages is almost sure to go into the waste basket. There are certain short news items that must be published every week, and they have the right of way over everything else.

If you wish to express an opinion regarding any abuse or wrong, sign your name in full for publication. Don't be ashamed to father what you say. Don't try to dodge the responsibility of your assertions, and shoulder them on the editor. The editor's name stands boldly over all he says, and he has enough to do in keeping from getting licked for his own assertions.

Articles on religion, prohibition, long-winded political reform, etc.

that comparatively few read such articles, and it keeps the editor busy to give the local news. There are papers better equipped to publish long opinions on such topics, and they should be patronized for such purposes. Be brief, condense your work, cull out the useless words, say nothing that is not worth saying, boil it down, trim it to the core, talk to the point, avoid big words, cut out the "highfalutin" part, drop the big adjectives, and don't write at all unless you have a good subject, and know how to handle it.

Governor Penoyer has flopped clear out of the Democratic party on account of the silver question, and is especially opposed to Grover Cleveland's "gold bug proclivities." The governor will not even support the state Democratic ticket, and will vote for the Citizens' candidate, so he says.

There is a great deal of confusion regarding the new election law, and there is no reason for it, as it is very simple, if a person takes the trouble to inform himself. A great many who take eastern papers have got the law as it applies in eastern states confused with the Oregon law, and in some cases papers in Oregon have published the California law, which is quite different in detail, though the same as to intent, as being the Oregon law. Others have published sample tickets, which are grossly wrong and misleading, all through neglect to give the matter attention. The Oregon law is defective, inasmuch it does not give any authorized form for the printer to follow, so as to have a uniform ticket all over the state, yet on another page we give a sample ballot that conforms with the law in every particular, and instructions as to voting that will be well for all to read.

A Tribute to Freshmen.
Mr. Phelps, in the course of an address, paid a tribute to freshmen, which every freshman should have been present to hear.
"Some one sent to me not long ago," he said, "for samples of the examination papers of some Yale freshmen. 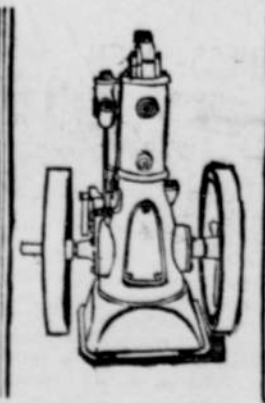
