ARSENIC AND AMMONIA.

Remarkable Contrast of the Effect of Two Poisons on the Complexion.

The slow absorption of many poisons changes in some more or less modified form the complexion, but arsenic and ammonia show their effect about as quickly as any. The popular belief that arsenic clears the complexion has led many silly women to kill themselves with it in small, continued doses.

It produces a waxy, ivory-like appearance of the skin during a certain stage of the poisoning, but its terrible after effects have become too well known to make it of common use as a cosmetic.

The effects of ammonia upon the complexion are directly the opposite to that of arsenic. The first appearance of ammonia poisoning which seen in those who work in ammonia factories is a discoloration of the skin of the nose and forehead. This gradually extends over the face until the complexion has a stained, blotched and unsightly appearance.

With people who take ammonia into their systems in smaller doses, as with their food or water, these striking symptoms do not appear so soon. The only effect of the poison that is visible for a time is the general unwholesomeness and sallowness of the complexion.

Many persons are slowly absorbing ammonia poison without knowing it. The use of ammonia in the manufacture has greatly increased of late, and it is unquestionably used as an adulterant in certain food preparations. Official analysis have plainly shown its use, even in such cheap articles of every day consumption as baking powders. The continued absorption of ammonia in even minute quantities, as an adulterant in food, is injurious, not merely from its effect upon the complexion, but because it destroys the coating of the stomach and causes dyspepsia and kindred evils.

Professor Long of Chicago, is authority for the statement that, if to fifty million parts of water there is one part of ammonia, the water is dangerous.

of May 5th, headed, "50,000 for Roads." I think it a subject of more than ordinary interest; it is of vital interest. If the citizens of this county would give this matter due consideration, there would, in the near future, be a wonderful improvement in our roads.

I believe our present road system is radically wrong, and under it at least ninety per cent of the old settlers will have passed away before there is very much improvement in Tillamook roads.

While a great many see the great necessity of better roads, there is another portion of the community that does not stop to consider the advantages of a good system of public highways, and still others, who are regular kickers, and still fight against all law and order just to hold a dollar which, if spent for some public enterprise, such as roads and school buildings, would bring them in tenfold. Now, in the article referred to, in the HEADLIGHT, the suggestion there made would obviate all difficulties.

It places the cost where it belongs, and would not be burdensome to the taxpayer. I believe the credit of Tillamook county is good, and bonds could be disposed of on easy terms. I would most heartily endorse that method of obtaining the means to improve and make good roads, or any feasible plan to attain that end. There are a great many expressions of opinion as to levying extra assessments for road purposes, and while I have always worked out my assessments cheerfully, that we might have better roads, I never believed the measure a legal one, and have always thought it unsatisfactory. It has never accomplished the desired result, and I believe never will, and the correct way, legal or not, is to make a test case, if there is anyone who will refuse to work his assessments. The best way to get rid of a bad law or usage is to enforce it.

If every good citizen of this county would give this road question the consideration its importance merits, and make a strike to get out of the mud and mire on to good gravelled roads, it would enhance the value of property one hundred per cent. Every man in this county should sign a petition to the legislature, asking for permission for the taxpayers to vote on issuing the bonds.

I would like to hear from any and all parties interested in the improvement of roads, (all ought to be) and the HEADLIGHT is the medium through which we can exchange ideas. If any one has a better plan than the one in the HEADLIGHT of May 5th, let us hear from him.
