FOUR YEARS OLD.

With this issue the HEADLIGHT ends the fourth year of its publication. Next week it begins the fifth year of existence with renewed vigor.

The present editor and publisher has been with the paper three years of this time, though the paper changed hands two or three times prior to his connection with it.

We have stood at our post firmly, if not successfully in every respect, and have so far been able to stand the sheriff off. Other newspapers have started and soon faded away. Other newspaper men have come and gone, quite a number of them, and their experience here has been one of misfortune invariably. We do not boast of this, but mention it to show that this county is not yet able to support more than one paper.

If every legal voter in the county was a subscriber to the HEADLIGHT, our list would not be equal to the lists of the Yamhill and Washington county papers. If every merchant in Tillamook county was an advertiser, our advertising patronage would be small. Yet we could publish a much better paper if all would take an interest in the matter. The patronage of every citizen in the county is needed.

Every subscriber helps to increase the value of his own property. Every advertiser benefits his own business. Look at the merchants who do not advertise! They complain most of hard times, and their trade is falling off in favor of others. They say business is overdone, but we believe they can keep ahead in the race by advertising, and at the same time help the paper. We believe our readers can trade to better advantage and get better bargains with those who advertise.

Suppose no paper had been started here yet! Would the timber men have come? Would settlers and investors have found out the resources of this country? Would this city have had electric lights? Of course a few men wrote letters describing the county, but thousands of papers have gone abroad doing the good work. Thousands more will go, and some good ones, too if we can receive the proper encouragement.

Suppose you all try the experiment of withdrawing your patronage. The paper would die, and, of course, no one would think of allowing this to happen.

We ask the earnest co-operation of all, though we do not wish to be considered as objects of charity. We have toiled hard physically and otherwise, and believe we have earned all that we have received.

We consider this a business proposition, and mean this as a plain business talk.

It has been our aim, though we may have failed in some respects, to give the people a good paper and to battle for what is right, yet it is impossible to please all, and we shall not try to do that.

For three long years have we stood upon the ink-stained arena of our back and pulled the lever of a man-killing hand-press, the work of a four-horse-power engine. If there be one among you who deem this a too soft snap, let him come forth and surge upon the stubborn lever. If there be three among the whole populace who dare cope with the toggle-jointed monster on the grease-stained floor of our press-room, let them come on. If you don't think we've earned the scanty crust upon which we have subsisted, then toy with the back-breaker in our rear shop. We have wrestled and tugged with the joint-stretching, muscle developer, until our arms are bundles of tough ligaments, and we feel perfectly able to lick the man who says we ought to do something to earn a living. We have swung on the handle of this lung-testing, pile-driving mechanism until our hands were blistered, our soles were sore, and holes were worn through the floor where we braced our enormous feet. We have been solicited to furnish power for a rock-crusher, but we were not always thus, a slave to a three legged iron constitution wrecker. We were once able to hire an able bodied giant to do the work. Our aunt's sisters came from Ohio and settled on Willow creek, back in Illinois, but they were not news paper men. They raised chickens and made butter, for which they received coffee, sugar and calico in exchange. Our early life, therefore stood quiet as a mud-puddle, but a little later on our heart throbbed with inspiration as we mused and went to sleep in the shade letting the sheep get away, and dreamed of higher spheres in life and journeyed forth to the wicked metropolis, where we acquired very little fortune and considerable experience but finally reformed by going into the newspaper business. We have toiled in various climes, but our heart oft turns back to Willow Creek. But to return to the subject, we say we have toiled here three long years and tried to shed the effulgent rays of knowledge upon the benighted people, and reaching down in our pantaloons pockets to-day we find not one sesterc.

There is an impression that money invested in tax-titles is likely to be lost, especially if the advertising of delinquent property is not properly done, or if the land is described incorrectly. Now, we are informed by the County Clerk and other good authority that there is no possible show of loss, in buying tax-titles, as the county is responsible and must return all money so received, unless it can give good title to the land sold for taxes. This should be well understood. Furthermore, if the sale is legal in every respect, there is no better investment for idle money, for if the land owner redeems his property he has to pay twenty per cent. to the buyer. It is to be hoped somebody will buy up all the delinquent lands and teach the dead-beat land holders to pay their taxes. It is a good way to use idle money. Even on lands that were delinquent for years prior to this, it is safe to buy tax titles, as the county must make good the titles to the purchasers or refund the money.

The Oregonian and other papers are raising a great "ho-ho" about the new election law, claiming it is bunglesome. Now, this is all foolishness, as it is just as simple and easy to vote the new ticket as the old style. You scratch out the names you don't want, in the old fashion, and any man who can't vote the ticket ought not to be allowed to vote. The Oregonian says the difficulty will lessen the vote in Multnomah county by 5000, one-third, but perhaps that is a good thing. Some may be scared away from the polls by the hue and cry made about it, but the honest citizens of the state may well rejoice that there is a chance to have reasonably fair elections. Of course, there is a good deal of red tape for the candidates to go through to get their names on the tickets, but if they can't do a little clerical work on the start, they should not ask of the people to be put in office.

The Frankfort (Wash.) Chronicle, W. H. Braden, business manager, and E. C. Pentland,

has given the Democratic party of Oregon the grand bounce, on account of its failing to endorse Free Coinage. He says he can't see how R. M. Ventch, the Democratic candidate for Congress can conscientiously accept the nomination, being a Free Coinage man.

If you don't see the name on the ticket you wish to vote for, write it on the blank line and mark the others out. If you don't wish to vote for any person for any particular office, mark them all out. Write the names of your choice for Justice of the Peace and Constable on the blank lines at the bottom of the ticket, unless the names you want are printed there. You can mark out the way you will vote on a colored ticket and carry it with you into the booth and use it as a copy in making out your white ballot, if you like.
