By the statement of the present County Clerk, the legal fees of his office for the full term of his office will be \$3093.33, which shows an increase in two of about \$600; and, therefore, the next two years will add \$600 more making \$3,700. It having been pretty well demonstrated by the article heretofore published in the HEADLIGHT, (mentioned last week,) that the county fees payable at the officers' not more than one-fourth of the total receipts; four times \$3,700 makes \$14,800 for the whole term, or \$24.50 per day for County Clerk, and but one man to pay out of it. Do you doubt about my paying the county \$5,000 or \$6,000 a year if elected?

At the last session of the legislature, on the last day, a bill was passed appropriating \$120,000.00 from the five per cent Internal improvement fund for building roads in this state, of which \$13,500 was for the benefit of Tillamook county. At the next session of the legislature, this same bill will be brought up, and the question asked "shall this bill pass notwithstanding the Governor's veto?" Now voters, remember, that a vote for Hon. J. W. Maxwell and H. N. H. W. Lamson, on the 6th of June, is a vote for \$13,500 for the roads of Tillamook county.
