The Sheridan Sun, just started, is our latest exchange. It is bright and newsy. J. W. Foster is editor.

Chas. Nickel, editor of the Democratic Times of Jacksonville, has been elected Representative for Jackson county.

Whitelaw Reid could never be prevailed upon to accept an office until he was sent as minister to France. He resigned that position in order to devote his time to his newspaper, the New York Tribune.

Last week we stated the total vote of the county to be 960, but the official count shows it to be 1001. Considering that there was a poor turn-out at the polls this year, it is a big increase over the vote of 830, two years ago.

As a newspaper man, Whitelaw Reid is the peer of any. His success has been as great as that of Horace Greely, whom Reid succeeded on the Tribune, and as a politician, in the true sense of the word, Mr. Reid has shown better judgement than Greely did.

The latest returns from the state election shows the whole state ticket elected by the Republicans, except Chamberlain for Attorney General, whom the Democrats have elected by a very small majority, about 200. Moore's majority is 3497, Herrmann's majority is 5895, Ellis, for Congress in the 2nd District, has a majority of 3114, and the state legislature is safely Republican. The senate stands 16 Republicans to 14 Democrats, and the house stands 36 to 24 in favor of the Republicans. The Democrats elect one Representative in Yamhill county, and the Citizens ticket was quite successful in Multnomah county. The peoples' party vote was quite large, being about 10,000 in the state, though the Prohibition vote was small.

ALL BUT ONE.

It will be noticed that Oregon on the ballot, gave Harrison only one vote. Mr. Joseph Simon got in his work right well. It is evident that circuit judgeship was not disposed of in the way that would have given Harrison most votes

REPUBLICAN PLATFORM.

The platform re-affirms its protection and reciprocity principles, favors the use of a bimetallic base for the currency and legislation that will keep every dollar, whether gold, silver or paper on an equal basis, and the purchasing power of one dollar as good as another. It favors an international conference that will establish a parity of gold and silver throughout the world. A free ballot and purity in elections are demanded. Foreign commerce should be encouraged, the navy should be strengthened, friendly foreign relations should be maintained, the Monroe doctrine is still good, and criminal and pauper immigration should be restricted.

Sympathy is expressed for Home Rule in Ireland, and for the persecuted Jews in Russia. Religious liberty is advocated, but church and state should remain separate. Trusts are denounced, and a one-cent rate on letter postage is called for. Government aid should be given to the Nicaragua canal, the remaining territories should be admitted as states, arid government lands should be ceded to the states where they lie, with conditions providing for their reclamation and subject to homestead. Legislation to prevent the evils of intemperance should be enacted, and the veteran soldiers should receive recognition. Harrison's administration is endorsed, and the increased prosperity of the country is commented on.

A MALIGNANT CRANK.

A fellow signing himself A. O. Y. takes the HEADLIGHT to task for referring to certain delinquent taxpayers as dead-beats. Of course, anyone with common sense knows that we meant the land sharks who have large holdings and always try to get out of paying taxes. The railroad companies and some others have lands they offer to sell, yet they object to having them assessed or to paying taxes. A great deal of tax has been sworn off by certain individuals, though some of the timber speculators are very prompt in paying their taxes.

A. O. Y. says that some of the delinquents could buy and sell the HEADLIGHT. True enough. That is just what we object to, and so should A. O. Y. It isn't rights for the poor man to bear all the burden of public expenses. He says that the editor of this paper has been requested to lift his advertisement out of the forms, as his land should not be advertised as delinquent. That statement is false, and if we had been requested to do it, we should not unless the request came from the proper authorities. As advertised, there is \$8.77 taxes against A. O. Y., and perhaps he has as much property as the editor of this paper, who has receipts for \$42 taxes paid in this county this year.

The principal cause of A. O. Y.'s spleen against this paper is that his long-winded communications have generally found a place in the waste basket when sent to this office. He is known as a great bore to quite a number of newspaper men, for he is always wanting to vent some cranky idea through the press, and whole bundles of his manuscript are consigned to the waste-basket in this office, without being read, as he wants to occupy the whole paper with his interminable articles. A. O. Y. should have a newspaper of his own wherein he could air his opinions to the public.

M. E. Bain has started a paper at Barlow, Clackamas county, called Three Sisters. It is a good paper and is independent in politics.

HEADLIGHT - Has it occurred to the average citizens of Tillamook City and vicinity that if the Government instead of spending money on Dry Stocking Bar would lay it out as an aid in digging a ditch from some point on Wilson river east of town to intersect Hoquarton slough above the city so as to deflect that stream into and through said slough into the bay would be vastly more productive of benefit to the city and surrounding country than the mere dredging and piling of Dry Stocking ever will accomplish for it? As is well known, such a ditch would not necessarily be over three miles in length, and comparatively easy of being dug, as one half the route would be along sloughs and low swampy grounds and nowhere with more than the depth of ordinary river bottom land to contend with. The deflection of the Wilson river into the Hoquarton slough once accomplished, the good, resulting from it, would be scarcely calculable, as it would more than double the volume of tidal discharge of the slough. This would inevitably create a current sufficient to dredge out not only Dry Stocking but every other bar, besides deepening the channel of the slough along its entire course, enough to admit perhaps up to our wharves any vessel that can safely cross Tillamook bar. The effect of such an event on this city is so patent to every one that it would only be a waste of time to dwell upon it here. And so will close the suggestion with the recommendation that a sufficient sum might be raised by subscription among our citizens to purchase and survey the route for the ditch after which a government appropriation of say \$10,000 would cut a ditch carrying four feet of water with a width of ten feet, after which a few freshets would accomplish the rest.
