A. E. Stevenson, of Illinois, is the Democratic nominee for Vice President. This is a victory for the Anti-Cleveland men.

The New York Delegates repeatedly asserted that Cleveland could not carry New York, but since the convention they are quiet, though it is probable that they were right.

The Democratic platform is a very long document, and very carefully straddles the Tariff and Silver questions. The rest of it is devoted to bitter denunciations of the Republican party and its measures.

The Democratic managers have little hope of electing Cleveland in the general election. Their plan is to encourage the Free Silver and Farmers' Alliance parties to concentrate on some man, with the hope that they will carry Nevada, Montana, Colorado, and a few other states, thus throwing the election into the house of Representatives.

President Harrison has exhibited a broad and powerful grasp of mind, an ability to seize the right side of every question and the courage and firmness to maintain it. He has selected wise men as his counsellors. He has taken an active part in the business of every department of the government, and he is familiar with the duties and interests entrusted to every member of his cabinet.

PASTE THIS IN YOUR HAT.

In the electoral college of 1888 there were 401 votes, of which the Republicans received 233 and the Democrats 168. By the new apportionment the states which were Republican in 1888 have 249 votes; the states which were then Democratic are entitled to 175 votes, and the new states which have been admitted to the Union since the last presidential campaign have 20 votes, making a total of 444 votes in the whole electoral college of 1892.

The new states, with the number of electoral votes to which they are entitled, are as follows: Idaho, 3; Washington, 4; Montana, 3; Wyoming, 3; North Dakota, 3; South Dakota, 4; Total, 20.

This, as will be seen at a glance, gives the Republicans only 157 votes which they can count on, and they will have to get 66 votes from the doubtful states to elect their candidate.

The new states which are considered surely Republican are Idaho, 3; North Dakota, 3; South Dakota, 4; Washington, 4; Wyoming, 3—a total of 17.

Besides the closer vote in Iowa, Wisconsin, Massachusetts and Indiana, the Republicans have to contend against the new law in Michigan, by which the presidential electors are to be chosen by congressional districts, instead of by the state at large.

These 58 votes may be obtained from Indiana, 15; Iowa 13; Massachusetts, 15; New Hampshire, 4; and Wisconsin, 12—total, 59—and the Republicans would win without New York, Connecticut, New Jersey or Montana.

There are one or two other possible combinations by which the Republicans might win without New York, but in these, as in all other combinations looking to Republican success, it will be necessary to regain at least three of the five states which have been carried by the Democrats since the last presidential election.
