

THE CITY OFFICIALS TAKE A COURAGEOUS STAND.

The inmate of the Bagin Arrested and Fined for Keeping a Bawdy House.

A complaint was made before City Recorder L. Crenshaw on Friday, charging "Belle Cooper" with keeping a bawdy house. The warrant was served by Marshal D. H. Sexton, and the accused concluded to plead not guilty and stand trial. A. W. Severance acted as prosecutor for the city, and the court appointed E. E. Selph who, with the assistance of Van Buren Bromley, Esq., of Bay City, reluctantly undertook the defense.

The testimony of the complaining witness, W. F. D. Jones, was to the effect that the house occupied by the defendant was notoriously a house of ill-fame, that it was so recognized by the citizens of the town, and that frequenters of the place often disturbed the surrounding neighborhood with their revelries.

Chas. Chatterton, being placed on the witness stand, gave testimony identical with the foregoing, and coached his evidence in the most pointed terms.

The testimony of I. T. Maubly was in such a low tone that the reporter didn't catch its import.

R. D. Peckham being sworn, stated that he knew "nothing about it." It will be remembered, however, that Mr. Peckham lives on the same block with the defendant, and was very persistent in protesting when the institution was located there.

Wm. Armstrong and Louis Olsen were called, and being virtuous young men, knew little about the case. Louis did not even recognize the defendant. However, their being called, was the result of a "practical joke," and in justice to them it may be said that they know no more about the case than a hundred other young men who were not called.

Dr. Petre and Joe Portagee were not placed on the stand, and the prosecution rested the case. The defense offered no testimony. Prosecuting Attorney Severance opened the argument, taking the ground that the ordinance provided that common fame was sufficient evidence in such cases, and that such evidence had been produced. Attorney E. E. Selph valiantly opened the argument for the defense. He pleaded like a little man, and in fact, grew eloquent at intervals. His task was an unpleasant one, but he did the best he could under the circumstances, and pointed out the weakness of the prosecution in regard to some technical points. In the closing argument, A. W. Severance waxed eloquent, and paid a glowing tribute to Wendell Phillips, Lovejoy, and others who dared to take the initiative stand for right, regardless of consequences.

The Recorder imposed a fine of \$25 and costs on the defendant, and the large and appreciative audience dispersed. It is reported that some of the young men of the town raised the money to pay the fine and costs, which altogether amounted to about \$40.

Boy Drowned.

A ten-year-old son of H. A. Ward, of Trask, was drowned in North Trask, near his home Sunday afternoon. Two of Mr. Ward's boys were in a boat fishing, and the one who was drowned was standing in the boat when a sudden surge threw him overboard. The other little fellow was unable to assist him, and when the body was recovered all efforts to resuscitate it proved futile.

We have tried to imbibe the enthusiasm of others who do this, and have gone right along with the boys, waded as deep as anybody, practiced trolling, casting, and used the professional anglers' terms very glibly, but somehow, the elements of success were lacking. Even when a fish was caught, our manly bosom was not thrilled with delight, as with many of the disciples of Isaac Walton. It all seems but a hollow mockery, and as near as we can figure, an expensive one, too, for we were out about \$2.19 for every speckled beauty we ever caught.

The idea of taking an artificial fly, without any substantial bait, and flapping it around on top of the water, looks like a very juvenile pastime, and beneath the notice of any sane fish. The new-fangled poles, with reels and the book of flies, including the "professor," "hackle" etc., seems to us an innovation on the good, old-fashioned way of fishing. A man who will fish without cork, lead or bait, is easily amused, and we think lassoing mosquitoes with a horse-hair would be exquisite sport for some piscatorial dudes. People may think we lack the true essentials of a sportsman, but if that so be, we can't help it.

Back on "Willie Crick," it was different. We dug up a patch of greensward and got a can full of worms. There was a deal of joy and excitement even in getting the worms. Then we cut a good hickory pole, fastened to it a strong line, provided with a large hook, a bullet for a sinker, and a big cork. A deep hole in the creek was sought out, and we proceeded to seat ourselves comfortably on a birch log, where we waited with serene anticipation of getting a bite right along. When a whopping cat fish takes the hook, you know it, and with a good strong pole you can easily land him on the bank. Talk about salmon and trout! There's nothing like a string of cat fish, and we generally got 'em. Some may think there is no sentiment in a man who will fish this way, but it's a mistake. To have good luck, it is necessary to spit on the hook before throwing it in, and to refrain from the luxury of profane language. Many of our great statesmen have in their halcyon days of youth, caught cat fish in the Wabash and its tributaries. Cat fishing is one of the chief features of life in the whole Mississippi valley.

Our recollections of cat fishing on "Willie Crick" will always remain a green spot, an oasis, as it were, in the desert of our existence. After all, it may be that this feeling comes from a tendency of mankind to reflect on youthful days with pleasant recollections, forgetting the hardships of the misty past, and many men would feel like boys again if they would for a time throw aside some of the new-fangled notions of sport and engage for a while in some of the recreations common in their boyhood days.

Mr. William Olsen, of Tillamook, who was in the city yesterday, is happy over the receipt of a telegram from San Francisco announcing good news about his steam schooner Louis Olsen, which is engaged in the sealing business in the Japan sea. The sealing schooner Edward E. Webster, Captain Dan McLean, arrived in San Francisco on the 23d, 22 days from the Japan sea, with 2183 skins. The captain reported having spoken the Louis Olsen on June 17, and the vessel had made a catch of 1764 sealskins. All the crew of 19 men were well. The Olsen left San Francisco Feb. 17, and will return to that port Oct. 15. The vessel is in command of Captain Charles Haritan, better known as Long Charlie. The catch of the Olsen, so far, is valued at \$20,000, and will probably be considerable.
