In the 1 mile trotting race, if the race does not fill, any horse entering and trotting in 2:40, or better shall be entitled to the purse.

Discussion Before the American Chemical Society.

To the Editor of the Tribune:—I have just seen the report in your issue of Sep. 3, of the discussion at the Washington meeting of the American Chemical Society, Aug. 18, relative to the use of carbonate of ammonia in baking powders.

This report is incomplete and incorrect in many particulars, and as the paper which precipitated the discussion was read by me and based upon my own experiments, I desire to make certain corrections in the interest of the truth and for the large numbers of your readers to whom the question is one of great moment.

The paper, as read before the society, related that ammonia in baking powder is retained in the bread by reason of its affinity to the gluten. The consensus of opinion, as expressed during the discussion, was against the use of carbonate of ammonia in baking powder with the only exception of Dr. McMurtrie, who is now an employee of a baking powder company which uses carbonate of ammonia in its baking powder.

Of the other parties mentioned as having taken part in the discussion, were Professor Dr. Barker, of the University of Pennsylvania, who is the president of the society and one of our highest authorities.

In answer to a pleading by Professor McMurtrie that only small quantities of ammonia were used in baking powder, he stated: "No matter how small the quantity, I must decline to be dosed medically without my consent when taking my meals."

Dr. E. H. Bartley, formerly chemist of the Brooklyn Board of Health, and Professor of Chemistry at the Long Island College, likewise named, did not, I believe, take an active part in the discussion, but is already on record as strongly opposed to the use of ammonia in baking powders.

Dr. Richardson volunteered only the question whether the flour used in the experiments was of good quality, of which I assured him by stating that it was the best and the flour used in my family.

Professor Mallet was not present.

Your article is misleading, insofar as it gives the impression that ammonia disappears on baking. My actual tests agree with those made by others, showing that ammonia remains in the bread.

My investigations merely assign a new cause for the retention.

Ed. HEADLIGHT.—It will be a matter of some interest to the people of Tillamook City and County to know that one of the places near them in the Willamette valley is now, as it has been for the past year or so, making very rapid progress.

This is the city of Forest Grove, directly across the hills from Tillamook.

When the wagon road, now in progress on the Wilson river, is completed, it will be only a day's drive from one place to the other. It is very much to be desired that the road be finished soon, and done in good order, so that good time may be made thereon.

The people of Washington county like to go to the ocean shore just as well as anybody, to eat clams and rock oysters and bathe in the surf. Many of them have their own teams and vehicles and enjoy driving, and, moreover, fully appreciate the possession of these in driving on the beach.

The people of Forest Grove feel much interest in the advancement of Tillamook as a shipping point, and have every reason to think that the logging railroads which are to be pushed out from the Bay up the Wilson and other streams, will develop into longer lines across the mountains, or rather, hills, and join the main system. In this way, it may not be so long before rail connection is had between Tillamook and Forest Grove. It is now coming to be generally understood that that piece of Oregon from Tillamook bay to the Willamette valley and north to the Columbia river, is one of the most promising in the whole Northwest, or in all the Union, for that matter. Timber of the most magnificent quality; below that, a soil of the greatest fertility, when opened up to the sun and air; and under that nobody knows how much coal and iron. And with all this it has a climate as pleasant and healthful as any in the world. About everything that is needed is found in that favored section. Only get wagon roads and railroads and then it will be just the place for families to make a home in, and then you will see the settlers come in. Forest Grove, situated at one corner of this fine region, and commanding the east side slope, has a population of about fifteen hundred, and does a business of about \$200,000 a year. It has a creamery, a fruit and vegetable cannery, a furniture factory, and is lighted by electricity. Its streets are graveled, and its citizens are agitating strongly the macadamizing of the main county roads. It has a number of fine brick buildings, a bank, and some of the handsomest residences in the state.

Forest Grove is a very pretty place. It will soon have water-works, and, possibly, a line of electric cars to the depot, which is about a mile from the business part of the town. It is, also, the seat of one of the oldest institutions of learning in the state, the Pacific University. This institution is in a manner the soul of the town. It is very prosperous, having a better corps of teachers than ever before. The faculty consists of ten or twelve professors. It is now expected that a new brick and stone building will be erected during the coming year.

Forest Grove and Tillamook, being near neighbors, ought to and doubtless will know each other better, and will in no great length of time be doing a good deal of business together, being brought into active communication by the road now nearing completion. H. S. LYMAN.
