Attention is called to an article in this paper regarding the rafts being towed on the sea, from Noyo, Mendocino Co., Cal., to San Francisco. The problem of towing logs at sea will soon be satisfactorily solved.
In the report of the premiums awarded by the Fair Association, the name of Mrs. O. Young, of Bay City, was left out, though several articles of fancy work that she exhibited bore tags showing that she was awarded premiums. The record left by the judges did not show it, however.
The Str. Augusta brought in our new presses and fixtures Monday. The new quarters for the HEADLIGHT are being fitted up as rapidly as possible, and if nothing happens, and we find nothing missing when unpacking, the paper will be issued from the new press and new office next week.
It is amusing to see the complimentary notices of the Kickapoo Show and Medicine Co., given by the Yamhill county papers. Of course, the show is a traveling fake for selling nostrums, but business is business, and we suppose we should advertise their show in the same manner if they came up with the coin.
Peck, the Democratic labor statistician of New York, has got the Democratic party in a peck of trouble by one of his reports regarding the conditions of labor and industrial productions under the McKinley law. It is the best campaign document ever issued for the Republicans, and Peck is now undergoing a series of persecutions at the hands of the Democrats. His report was a regular bomb-shell.
The latest reports regarding the cholera are rather more favorable. The quarantine has been raised on most of the infected vessels, and there are but few new cases. There were a few straggling cases in New York City, but the health authorities are taking every means to hold the disease in check, and little danger is anticipated. The situation in Hamburg and in Russia remains about the same.
A fund has been collected among our people for the benefit of Mr. Isaac Jones, the money to be expended in giving him the comforts and advantages of hospital treatment at Portland. The sum of \$27.65 has been donated for this charitable purpose. Those who have so kindly subscribed to help this poor and stricken man, deserve and will receive the hearty commendation of our people. The object of this kindly effort is an old man, with no relatives in this country and afflicted with an incurable disease. Mr. L. G. The steamer Noyo reached this port (San Francisco) Sunday with the big lumber raft from Fort Bragg.
The raft contains 1,000 logs, in 346 feet long, 23 feet deep and 40 feet wide. The logs average 65 feet in length, with a few giants in the center that will run up to 120.
The Noyo has been towing loose rafts from Noyo and Fort Bragg for three years past, and has made but five trips without losing a section or two of his tow. His biggest tow heretofore has been 830 logs, chained in 24 sections or platoons, and he was about five platoons short when he got in. Two and one-half knots per hour has been the best speed attained with such a tow, and a smaller fraction over two knots has been an average to be proud of. In the new form the Noyo hauled over twice the amount of logs, never lost one, and averaged three and two-thirds knots per hour for thirty-four hours.
The success of the raft marks a new era in lumber business on the Coast south of the timber region. One company has already set up a sawmill here, and others will be quick to follow as far south as business extends. The main secret lies in this, that the refuse, or what is mill waste, along the sparsely populated north coast, will about pay the running expenses of a mill in a town of any importance whatever.
Chips and slabs out of 1,000 feet of lumber will bring from \$3 to \$3.50, and even the sawdust will command a price. In the timber country this stuff is thrown away. The mill recently built over on the Potrero has found it profitable to tow logs down in loose rafts, even with the loss of a good portion of the logs in every raft. When timber in the rough at \$5 per 1,000 is balanced with cut lumber at \$12, \$14 or \$16, the extra \$1.50 for building solid rafts and towing to mill at the market is a small matter, which is wiped out by the freight on planks.
Another advantage which the rafting plan will command is in the ease with which special orders can be filled. Few of the coasting lumber vessels can handle anything over a 120-foot stick. Cut here, there is no limit to size except such as is imposed by the trees and the capacity of the saws.
The late Mervyn Donahue had his attention attracted to the system while in New York in 1889, and formed a company, including Louis Sloss, Jr., and R. P. Hammond to put it into execution on this coast. Col. Donahue's death caused the matter to be dropped, and it was not picked up again till last year, when Fort Bragg lumbermen gave it a trial. The first raft was built in April and launched in May, but there was something at fault in the construction, and when it struck a reef a mile from Fort Bragg it went to pieces, and the Noyo only succeeded in saving the two ends, amounting to about two-fifths of the 2,000 logs employed in construction.
The raft was built under Mr. Robertson's direction, and proved a success from start to finish. It struck shallow water when launched, but was not shaken, and was easily towed off with the first big tide.
It took one derrick, five men and a boss three weeks to build, and forty-five tons of chain entered into its fastening. The core and radial cables are of two-inch oval-linked iron, and the outside wrappings, at distances of about six feet, are of one-and-seven-eighths-inch chain of the same sort, set up with screws so tightly that they cut into the wood. It was not rigid with steering-gear, as stated, but its successors will be, and Captain Driscoll says that he will personally take the wheel if sailors cannot be found who are willing to go on the big cigar.—Lumberman.

Several subscriptions that have been running quiet a while have been stopped, and the accounts placed in the hands of an attorney with instructions to bring suit if not paid promptly. No newspaper can afford to send out papers without pay, and do advertising or job work for nothing. Responsible parties who are in the habit of paying their debts as fast as they can, need have no fear, but those who try to get out of paying what they owe entirely, had better look out.
In one case a man had the audacity to order his subscription stopped when he was in arrears over a year, saying he would pay it as soon as he got the money. Now the man referred to is known to have the means to pay his debts, yet getting out of it whenever he can, and has no intention of paying. He, with some others, will have the opportunity of paying costs of a suit and getting his reputation made known to the public, and those who manage to evade paying by keeping their property in some one else's name, will have a judgment hanging over their heads that will prevent them from acquiring property in their own names, and let the public have a chance to find out that it is not safe to trust them.
It has been found necessary to take vigorous measures in these cases, as some people think they are safe in ignoring small accounts, and that no one will bring suit to collect them, but we have concluded that the best investment we can make is to haul a few of the worst ones over the coals, even if it does cost something to pay attorney fees.

The HEADLIGHT has just received new presses, machinery, type and other material, and as soon as they can be placed in operation we hope to be able to print a much better paper than we have in the past, and to execute job printing in a better manner and with greater facility.
The additions to our already large outfit, consists of three new presses, a large one for newspaper and large poster work, a small, rapid running press for job work, and a proof press. They are adapted to steam power, and we hope soon to utilize that force to operate them. We also have added a large paper cutter, and various other labor saving appliances too numerous to mention.
A new dress of type will be used on the paper, and new job faces are among the acquisitions. In fact, we have a new outfit, almost entirely, the new fixtures costing over one-thousand dollars. They were purchased of the well-known press-manufacturers and type-founders, Palmer and Key, who hold forth in Portland, San Francisco, Los Angeles and Galveston. They furnish all the printers' type for this coast.
New and commodious quarters have been secured for the HEADLIGHT office, in the building across the street from the present location, on the ground floor of the new building erected by the Tillamook Lumbering Co. The new office will be comfortable, convenient and rather more elegant than our present quarters.
As soon as the new presses are running and we get through moving, the paper will be improved in many respects. The quality of paper used henceforth will be a good grade of book-paper, and the typographical work will be improved, besides, the reading matter will receive more attention as the labor saving appliances will give us more time to devote to the news service. A large stock of the best quality of printers' stationery has been received, and with the new presses and material, we can turn out plain and ornamental work of all kinds imaginable, in the latest styles of the art, and quite speedily.
As soon as things are in running order we shall be glad to have our friends and patrons to call and see our new outfit and new quarters, and give us whatever encouragement they can in the enterprise.
We have tried hard to build up a good paper that would be a credit to the county, and believe we are beginning to succeed.
As we have been to great expense, any favors in the way of increased patronage will be appreciated, and we are sincere in expressing our sense of obligation to those who have patronized the HEADLIGHT so liberally in the past.

AMMONIA OR ALUM.
How to Detect Them.
Ammonia and alum are the most common adulterants used in the manufacture of baking powders. The government report shows that a large percentage of the baking powders on the market contain either one or the other, or both these pernicious drugs. Ammonia, particularly, is in very general use. This wholesale use in an article of daily food, of one of the most injurious poisons is simply criminal. Slow ammonia poisoning produces disease of the stomach, and is particularly injurious to the complexion. The presence of ammonia or alum in a baking powder, however, can easily be detected.
To Detect Ammonia.
Mix one heaping teaspoonful of baking powder with one teaspoonful of water in a tin cup; boil thoroughly for a few minutes, stir to prevent burning, and if ammonia is present, you can smell it in the rising steam. Or, place a can of the suspected powder to down on a hot stove, for a minute or two, then take off the cover and smell.
