The U. S. Lighthouse Board has accepted the tender Columbine, constructed at Cleveland, Ohio, under contract, and is now fitting out at New York for service on the Pacific coast.

A man named Coleman, serving a sentence for robbery in the Oregon state prison, is supposed to be the real murderer of Dr. Cronen, and will be turned over to the Chicago authorities when his term expires.

Alexander Pergmen, the anarchist who tried to kill H. C. Frick, the superintendent of the Carnegie Iron Works, at Homestead, Pa., was sentenced to twenty-one years at the penitentiary and one year in the work-house.

Postmaster-General Wanamaker has decided to issue what will be known as the Columbian series postage stamps, the same height as the present series, but twice as long, in order to properly display the illustrations. They are intended to commemorate the discovery of America by Columbus.

In Tennessee there is a law against working on Sunday. Some Seventh-day Adventists rested on Saturday and worked on Sunday. They were sent to jail and forced to work in the chain gang along with vicious criminals. At the same time the local newspapers giving an account of the affair contained an advertisement stating that a Sunday excursion would be run to a neighboring locality. Trains run regularly and a large number of section hands and railroad men pursued their work on Sundays as well as other days. Yet the constitution of the United States guarantees equal rights and liberties in religion and everything else to all American citizens.

Mr. J. G. Fargo, of Genesee Co., N. Y., in his interesting communication under the head of "Genesee Co., Dairy-men," states a pregnant truth connected with improved dairying when he says: "Besides, as we learn more about our cows, we lessen instead of increase the number of the herd." On our trip to Delaware Co., N. Y., the other day we were asked by a thriving dairyman what would be the effect on the market if everybody took our advice and strove to keep only cows that would produce 300 pounds of butter a year. It is an old question, one we have been asked hundreds of times. Our answer was: "Such an effort on the part of any dairyman will reduce his number of cows fully one half. Hence the amount of butter made will not increase very much, but on the amount that is made the dairy farmer will realize at least one third more profit. The moment a man keeps one cow to produce the same amount of butter two cows did before, he makes nearly a clean profit on the keep of one cow. The gross amount of butter is not increased,

but the gross profit is. This is a consideration of economy that we have been struggling long to get our readers to adopt. "Less cows and better ones" should be the motto of every man who wants to make the largest profit possible on his business.

At Ottawa, Province Ontario, Canada, the minister of marine has ordered Captain Copp to hand over the sealing schooner Rosie Olsen to her registered owners in Victoria, B. C. The Olsen was among the Canadian sealing vessels recently seized by the Russians off Copper Island. After changing her name to the prize, the Russian authorities gave her to Captain Copp on condition that he would carry 17 of the sailing crew taken prisoners back to British Columbia. On her return to Victoria, her original owners claimed her. Captain Copp refused to give her up. The minister of marine, in effect denies the right of Russia to confiscate the sealer or dispose of her. His action is expected to hasten a settlement of accounts between Russia and Great Britain.

Captain O'Brien and his watchman, Wm. Holmes, were rescued from the wrecked whaleback Wetmore after being on her ten days. They were taken off Tuesday, Sept. 27, by Captain Bergman, of the Umpqua life-saving crew. It was a hard matter for the life-savers to reach the ship, but they worked hard and managed to get a line on board which the men tied around them and jumped overboard. The men were very much worn-out from exposure, and when they saw the life-boat upset on Friday, they gave up all hope of ever getting ashore. They had a hard time of it, and for the last five days had only one meal a day, and yesterday morning they divided the last biscuit they had for yesterday's meal. They suffered terribly with cold, and had to stand in water to their knees.

A gentleman well known in business circles, who returned from Astoria recently, said to a Telegram reporter the indications were that the Astoria enterprise was about to collapse. He said: "The trouble is a lack of funds. From ten to fifteen miles of the road has been graded, and altogether about \$300,000 has been expended. But I learn that the contractors refuse to go ahead until more money is in sight. The contractors have done their work well, and have paid for labor and material. I find that the report of the Southern Pacific being back of the enterprise is not generally believed. The current impression is that the projectors of the enterprise bit off more than they can chew. It is a bad time to sell railway bonds in the eastern markets. The real estate boom which the projectors of the enterprise expected to precipitate didn't show up. It flattened out early. Captain Flavel is about the only man who has pulled anything out of the pot, and he was not a subscriber to the railroad subsidy. Luck just hit him off-hand. He unloaded his property at a big price and got over \$100,000 of it in cash. It will be a great misfortune for Astoria to have her railroad enterprise nipped in the bud, but perhaps new hands will take hold of it and put it through some day."—Telegram.

Base Ingratitude.

Governor Pennoyer recently said in a speech:

"It is true, however, that in advocating these measures now, I find myself outside of the political organization to which I formerly belonged. But this is neither my fault nor my misfortune. It is the fault, if not the misfortune, of the late Democratic party, which, having abandoned its principles, now ought by right to abandon its name. A great political party has at last proved recreant to all traditions, and forswearing fealty to the cause of the people, has knelt in blind idolatrous devotion at the shrine of the man whose sole distinguishing character is his subservience to the demands of the monometalists. Careful investigation, however, discloses the fact that this devotion is really not to him as he has neither personal qualities, intellectual endowments, nor political sagacity to win homage. The real reason of his potency is the fact that his candidacy is demanded by the money power. The Chicago convention turned its back upon all its traditions, and made a most profound salutation to a great Joss set up by the devotees of monometalism and bank rag money."
