The Garibaldi cannery had to shut down a short time Wednesday as the supply of tin had run out, but the Str. Harris came in over a rough haul that day bringing a quantity of tin, and the cannery is going again.

At present, the fishermen are making large catches of silverside salmon every night, and though they are getting only 15cts apiece for these fish, they are now making good wages, as many of them are catching from 100 to 150 fish per night, and there is no limit to the catch this year.

Of all the maps we have seen, whether published recently or not, the boundary line of Tillamook county is radically and grossly misrepresented. All of them without exception show Nehalem to be in Clatsop county, and the post-office department, misled by these maps, probably recognizes Nehalem as a part of Clatsop county. The error is too great to be excusable.

The W. C. T. U., of Tillamook, will hold regular meetings on the first and third Thursdays of each month, at the M. E. Church at 3 o'clock P. M. All are invited to attend. We are doing what we can to bring about the glorious consummation for which Christ died, and we call upon every lover of God and humanity to speed us on our way with their prayers and their co-operation.

Mr. Mont Parker, of Iowa, nephew of Newt C. Parker, of this place, is here on a short visit. He was here twenty-three years ago, coming in over the Harris trail, as there was no wagon road to Tillamook then, and at that time he says there were only two or three houses where the city now stands. He says at that time he never expected to see a bustling city, with electric lights and other metropolitan advantages of this place.

There was a tidal wave here last Tuesday. The tides run much higher than usual, and much higher than the tables in heat for this time. We hear of no damage in this locality, but on Nehalem a number of fishermen had their boats swamped, and some of them who supposed they were sleeping high and dry, found themselves disturbed by the flood. Tidal waves are sometimes the result of an earthquake, and earthquakes, as far away as Central America or the Sandwich Islands frequently make a noticeable difference in the tides here.

A reporter of the Times interviewed Messrs. Marsh and Kepp upon their return from Wilson river and found the elk story was genuine. They had killed two fine elk that would probably weigh seven hundred pounds apiece. The road is nearly completed and will be the best mountain road in the state, and by far the best way to reach the coast by wagon.

The boys had a very pleasant trip, stopping at Walt Smith's, on Wilson river, catching a great many fish, some of the front being twenty inches in length and weighing over three pounds. Salmon are also running up the river, one of which they caught on a hook and succeeded in landing. There are a good many bear out there and Isaac Smith and Mr. Kepp gave one a chase, but began was a trifle too active and got away. One of the most enjoyable features of their trip was packing in the elk from the mountains to the house. The boys speak highly of Walt Smith's as a place to stop. Mrs. Smith is a good cook, and Walt is a good instructor in a solo and company. —Forest Grove Times.

The Lighthouse Road.

The following letter will be of interest to the people of this city:—
OFFICE OF U. S. LIGHTHOUSE ENGINEER,

COR. SEC'Y BOARD OF TRADE.

DEAR SIR:—In the month of March 1891, you addressed me a letter relative to the construction of a wagon road from Cape Meares Light Station to Tillamook City via "Short Beach," to which I replied under date of March 12, 1891, to the effect that I had reported upon this matter to the Lighthouse Board and was then awaiting further instructions. My recommendations to the board were as follows:—"It is admitted that the original cost of making a road along this route will be more than along either of the others mentioned, but the advantages both to the Lighthouse Establishment and to the people are very much greater. In view of this latter fact, I would recommend as follows:—That the petitioners, citizens of Tillamook County, cause the road to be 'viewed out' as a county road, from the edge of the Lighthouse reservation, near the buildings on Cape Meares, to Tillamook river, that is, take all the necessary steps to give a clear right of way and declare it a county road; that I be then authorized to construct this road by contract at a cost not to exceed \$20,000 dollars, or to expend not to exceed that amount on the construction of the road, commencing on the Cape Meares end."

It appears that there was some legal objections to carrying out these recommendations, and before I could be authorized to spend the money in this manner additional legislative action on the part of Congress was necessary. Through the instrumentality of your representatives this action was taken in the Smully Civil Act, approved August 5, 1892.

The next step in this project is for your citizens to "view out" the road and have it declared a county road, as suggested in my recommendation above quoted. I will add that the line has been given over by a surveyor from this office, and his stakes and marks will aid in the work, and upon the ground. Further information can be obtained from this office. As soon as this viewing out process is consummated I am ready to advertise for proposals for the construction of the road, so far as the amount allowed will suffice.

I will be obliged if you will interest your Board of Trade or your influential citizens in this matter to the extent of taking their preliminary steps. The road will certainly be a great benefit to this portion of your county.

Wilson River Road.

EDITOR HEADLIGHT:—The grade of the Wilson river wagon road is now completed, and a crew of fifteen bridge builders, under the supervision of A. G. Anderson, architect and builder, are now constructing the best and one of the largest bridges in Tillamook county. This bridge is situated twenty nine miles east from Tillamook city, and spans the upper Wilson river. The bridge is 182 feet long, 16 feet wide; the main span 131 feet long; 4 stringers 14x16 inches, 1.0 foot long, of solid fir timber; the trusses are 12 feet high, 12x12 inch solid fir sticks; top truss caps, 81 feet long; second caps, 47 feet long; third caps, 26 feet 6 inches long; truss rafters, 12x12 inches, 23 feet long. The stringers are supported by 20 draw bolls 15 inch 3 inches long, making a very durable and substantial bridge. Each stick of timber is set out on the ground with whip saw and broad-axe. Amount of lumber in bridge 47,000 feet, bearing capacity 122 tons. This bridge is being built much cheaper by having expert workmen, who can take the standing timber within 100 feet of the location where they are to form the bridge, than would have been possible if it had been necessary to haul the material 27 miles from the nearest sawmill. The cost of construction will be about \$2000. Mr. Runyon and his foreman, Mr. A. H. Wilson, on the road work, and Mr. A. G. Anderson, bridge builder, have proven that a good wagon road can be built through almost any country, no matter how rough its topography may be. This was a big undertaking, and its completion will be a boon to the valley people, lovers of ocean beach scenery, the angler and the sportsman. The Wilson river and Tillamook bay abound in the finest beauties, excellent nowhere in numbers or quality.

The forest scenery is beautiful, and big game is plenty, a black and brown bear, elk, deer, wild cat and panther being often taken.

The bridge will be completed about Oct. 10th, when the road will open for through traffic. The toll for a vehicle drawn by two horses will be \$2.50 for through ticket, or half way and return.

The Cannery at Garibaldi.

Just now Garibaldi is a scene of great activity and life. The cannery is being operated to its full capacity. The rattle of the machinery, the chatter of the Chinamen, and the wailing shrieking of the sea-gulls, as they flap their wings and dart from one place to another picking the offal from the salmon-cleaning, shows Garibaldi in a different aspect from the usual sleepy little sea side hamlet.

In the morning the upper bay is dotted with sails. The fish boats are starting to take the previous night's catch to the cannery. They take their turns in delivering fish at the cannery wharf, and a man stands inside counting the fish and throwing them back out of the way with a gaff. Here is where the work of canning begins. Several Chinamen are dexterously cutting off the heads of the salmon, their fins and entrails are removed deftly and neatly, and the fish are washed. The process of washing or sliming, is gone through with three times before the fish are carted from the wharf-house to the cannery. There they are washed, scraped, and thoroughly cleaned again, and it may be truly said that no food product is prepared, manufactured, or put up with any more scrupulous regard for cleanliness and purity than canned salmon, even though the work is done by Chinamen, especially the way it is done at Garibaldi. The fish are then placed on a gang knife, which cuts them into sufficient lengths for the cans, and then the cans are carefully filled by hand, this process being considered better than the machine process, as the filling machine crushes and grinds the salmon steaks into a pulpy mass, and injures its appearance and sale in the market. There is labor saving machinery at every step, however, in the cannery, and some very expensive and ingenious contrivances are used. Forty-eight cases are salted at once by a handy device, the filled cans are then rapidly passed through a washing machine, and then fed into the capping machine which places on the caps and crimp them with turning accuracy. The cans roll out and down a long incline, passing along troughs of solder, and are delivered in another part of the building where they are tested by being dipped. They are then put into the retorts and cooked for an hour. After being taken out, the cans are vented by a small mallet with a prick on it, after which, a drop of solder covers the hole, and they are again placed in the retorts and cooked three-quarters of an hour longer. The process of testing the cans for the purpose of taking out a spoiled or defective can, is done over and over, and at every turn, so it is next to impossible for any bad ones to be packed. After the last cooking process, the cans are allowed to cool over night, and are then dipped into a vat of lacquer or varnish, which preserves the can from rusting. Of course, in all these processes, trays are used, so a large number of cans are handled at one time. The labels are next affixed by hand, very speedily, however, and the cans are packed into boxes or cases of forty-eight cans. The labels are a very pretty design, and are marked "Jumbo, packed at Garibaldi, Tillamook Co., Oregon, by the Elmore Packing Co."

W. W. Riddle, the manager for the Elmore Packing Co., personally supervises every detail of the work, and every process is carefully watched until the fish are in the cases and boxed. The cannery is now doing fast work, and the Chinamen work twenty hours out of the twenty-four hours in a day. They are hired by contracting with one responsible Chinaman to do the seasons packing, at so much per case, and he hires his men to work by the piece. More than three thousand fish can be handled in a day, and about that many are being brought in by the fishermen every day, at present. The silversides being caught now are very fine ones, and are almost as good as the Chinook salmon. The pack of big salmon (Chinook) will be small here this year, as it was on the Columbia, but second, steel-heads on the Columbia, and silversides here, are more plentiful this year than ever, and the pack of salmon is greater than ever before. The pack of the Garibaldi cannery will reach a total value this year of \$50,000 if the present run of silversides holds out, and at the prices prevailing a few years ago would have been worth \$100,000. The company contemplates moving the cannery to the Elmore station near D. Y. Stocking bar before next season, in order to be nearer the fishing grounds, and to save the expense of driving new piling for the wharves every year. The trolleys do not work on piling so fast as at Garibaldi, the water being almost fresh at the station and the eggs that are thrown away in cleaning salmon will season and produce millions of young salmon if thrown out further up the bay, thus making a hatchery. There is a good townsite at the station, and lots will be surveyed out and offered for sale. It will be to the interest of Tillamook city to encourage the scheme of moving the cannery, as the plant will be improved, and the process of reconstruction will give employment to a number of men for a while. Garibaldi will miss the establishment sadly if it is moved, as it is the cause of considerable business for the people there during the fishing season, and while the cannery is there, Garibaldi can boast of having electric lights. A very complete electric plant, with arc and incandescent light has been put in to illuminate the establishment.

EDUCATIONAL.

Bay City schools opened Monday, with Mr. Geo. Kiger, principal, and Mrs. May Sturgeon in charge of the primary department.

TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION MEETING.

The Tillamook Teachers' Association met, according to announcement, last Saturday, at the public school building. Fourteen teachers were present. At ten o'clock, Supt. E. K. Barnard called the meeting to order. Organization was effected by electing E. K. Barnard chairman and V. A. Davis secretary. On motion, the chairman appointed Miss H. E. Pierce critic for the session. Mr. V. A. Davis then read a paper on the "Art of Questioning" which was well discussed. Mr. Wm. Brooks presented a paper on the "Legal Authority of Parent, Director and Teacher." This brought out an interesting discussion, and many valuable hints were obtained. Arthur Mason next introduced the subject of "Physiology and Hygiene." After discussion, adjourned until 1:15 P. M.

Upon assembling for the afternoon session, a song was sung and fifteen minutes were spent in giving quotations. C. H. Frens introduced the subject of "Civics" in Our Common Schools. A brisk discussion followed and much information was obtained. Miss Eva Ross read a brief paper on the "Thought Method in Primary Reading." The subject was fully discussed, and the speaker closely questioned concerning the method.

After a short recess, Miss H. E. Pierce read a well prepared paper on "Libraries for All Schools and All Grades." The paper contained good thoughts and drew forth extended discussion. Supt. Barnard presented the subject "Why and How to Grade the Common Schools."

A course of study has been outlined and will soon be placed in the hands of teachers. This is an excellent scheme, and every friend of education is urged to assist in raising the standard of excellence in our common schools.

By an oversight the report of the critic was omitted. On motion, adjourned until 7:30 P. M.

At the evening session, a musical and literary programme was rendered which was heartily enjoyed by all. The meeting was interesting throughout, and productive of much good. The next meeting will be held in Bay City on the last Saturday of this month.
