OPIUM SMUGGLING.

STEAM SCHOONER LOUIS OLSEN
IMPLICATED.Mr. Wm. Olsen's Suit with Capt. Haritwen
Or Long Charley.

The news that the notorious smuggling
schooner Halcyon had been purchased
by E. B. Marvin & Co., the Victoria
merchants who intended fitting her out
as a sealer, conveyed with it, the idea
that smuggling on a large scale has been
successfully broken up, but such it ap-
pears is not the case, says the Port Town-
and Daily Call.

The Halcyon's successor, it had been
learned, is the speedy little schooner
Louis Olsen, which can skim over the
sea nearly as fast as the Halcyon, but
has the advantage of the latter by having
auxiliary steam power that it may do
its work on a calm night as effectively
as with a good breeze.

The Olsen, which has always been re-
garded as an honest coast sealer and has
passed for a long time without suspicion
being attached to her, was formerly
documented at this port and is a steamer-
screw of 56 tons burden and is owned in
Astoria. She was built in Victoria in
1889 and was originally the British
steamer Dolphin, running to the Frazer
river.

The first knowledge which the custom
authorities had of the contraband work
was when she was seized a little over a
month ago by the British custom officers
at Victoria for entering that port without
clearance papers from San Francisco.
Further information was given of the
vessel by a Victoria newspaper, which
stated the Olsen and the schooner Cor-
nelius had left that port each carrying a
cargo of Chinese and several tons of
opium to be smuggled into this country,
and wound up with the advice that "our
Southern cousins had better keep their
eyes peeled for them." The custom
officers of this port evidently received
additional information, for with a great
deal of secrecy they did keep their eyes
"peeled," which accounts for the nume-
rous and sundry secret expeditions of the
"Volcott." This vessel and her energetic
commander, Cap. T. F. Tozier, have
been the worry of local newsgatherers
for the past two months. She steams
around Marrowstone every once in a
while "on the way to Seattle for coal,"
and next morning is reported either at
Victoria or at Cape Flattery, graining.

The Olsen's movement also explain the
trips of the cutters Corvin and Lear out
of San Francisco recently, for now the
news comes that the industrious "sealer"
has left Victoria with another large
cargo of opium and Chinese, and again
the custom officers are on the alert for
the bothersome will o' the wisp.

It is believed the Olsen is playing a
double smuggling act bringing dutiable
articles both into this country and into
British Columbia. It is supposed that
after a cargo of opium and Chinese is
landed on this coast a return cargo is
taken to some point in British Columbia.
This cargo consists of cigars, liquors,
playing cards, cutlery, etc., on which
there is heavy duty there. How long
the vessel can keep up her success-
ful career is for time to tell, but she is
believed to have earned for her owners
several small fortunes, Chinese pay \$100
each to be brought here and several tons
of opium at \$10 a pound profit make a
very paying business. It is certain that
there are other smugglers besides the
Olsen and the Cornelius which have not
been heard from, and as none of them
have ever been captured Uncle Sam will
have to increase his fleet of cutters to
protect the coast or remove the duty
from opium to stop the smuggling.

The San Francisco Chronicle says:
Captain Charles Haritwen, or Long
Charley, as he is known in sealing circles,
is in the city and has been since the
steam sealer Louis Olsen arrived from
the Japan seas about three months ago,
after a successful sealing cruise. Capt.
Haritwen has a disagreement with Wm.
Olsen, the owner of the Louis Olsen, and
a suit for \$1350 for wages resulted. Judge
Morrow of the United States District
Court decided the case in favor of Cap-
tain Haritwen a few days ago for the full
amount, but Olsen has since given notice
of appeal. Capt. Haritwen denies that
he has had anything to do with the
steam sealer since he got back. He has
been around the sealing headquarters on
Clay street daily for three months. When
the Louis Olsen slipped away from her
moorings in Oakland creek and surrepti-
tiously put to sea she was commanded
by a man named Deering, formerly mate
of the steamer Haytien Republique, who
came down from Portland to take charge
of her. Since then her seizure and re-
lease at Victoria, B. C., and her doings
as a smuggler are well known. There
was a rumor on the water front yester-
day that the Olsen had successfully
landed her last opium cargo along the

northern coast, and that part of it had
already reached this city. The import-
ations of opium from China for two
months have amounted to nothing with
the exception of a consignment valued
at \$300,000 which came on the Belgic on
her last trip three weeks ago.

Fight in a Church.

McARTHUR, O., Dec. 30.—Particulars
are received of a shocking affair at a
country church in Gallia county, where
revival services were in progress. Clark
Watkins caught his sister-in-law, Mrs.
Peter Watkins, walking with a man with
whom her name was unpleasantly con-
nected. He attacked him with a knife,
and both rushed into the church, when
a general fight stopped the services.
When the riot was ended it was found
that Peter Watkins was dead, Harris,
the woman's escort, fatally wounded,
Clark Watkins beaten almost to death,
James Glover's eye cut open, and half a
dozen others hurt. The church was al-
most completely wrecked.

The frame of the Portland Lumbering
Company's new mill, near the old water
works, is all up except the rafters, and
is a very substantial piece of work. It
will be covered in at once, but just when
it will be completed is not certain, as
there is no hurry for it. Governor Pen-
noyer says business is very dull in the
lumber trade, and he has started work
on the new mill principally to give em-
ployment to the old one. It has not yet
been decided what the equipment of the
new mill will be, but it will have all
the modern improvements and be first-
class in every respect. The old mill is
kept going, notwithstanding the sales of
lumber are light, and the grounds about
the mill and clear up along Water
street are being covered with huge piles
of flooring, siding, rustic and other kinds
of lumber.—Oregonian.

NEWS OF THE DAY.

The Work of the Sissors and Paste Pot.

Dr. Briggs has been acquitted of the
charge of heresy. The Presbyterian
church is getting more liberal.

The Willamette river has been on a
high mark again, but not high enough
to do any serious damage so far.

As the days go on only one place in
the cabinet is reported to be positively
allotted. That is the navy to Colonel
Daniel S. Lamont.

The lowlands along the Sacramento
river are inundated by the recent
freshets, and the valley has the appear-
ance of an inland sea.

The fool who attempted to thaw out
frozen dynamite this time resided in
Long Island City. The stuff exploded
and the man has now changed his
location.

The Mississippi river is frozen tight
opposite the city, and all business along
the river is at a standstill. From the
United States arsenal to Coronado the
river is gorged solid with ice.

Thursday night senator Gorman, of
Maryland, Mr. Whitney and Speaker
Crisp dined together, and then went to
the theater. It was the opinion of all
three that Mr. Murphy would be elected
United States senator from the state of
New York.

Minnie Ross, a cyprian of Eugene,
was arrested upon complaint of some
of the business men of that city as insane.
The court held that living with a dirty
Chinaman and beast generally did not
constitute insanity, so the woman was
set at liberty.

General W. S. Rosecrans, register of
the United States treasury arrived at
Redondo Thursday. He left Chicago
Sunday evening last. He stood the
journey remarkably well and is looking
strong. His improvement since leaving
the East has been marked.

This year there will be but two eclipses
and both of the sun. The first will be a
total eclipse on April 15th and 16th, in-
visible in North America. The other
will be the annular eclipse of the sun on
Oct. 9th, visible as a partial eclipse on
the sun's Southern limb in the Gulf and
Western states.

There are 34 creameries in Oregon and
18 just over the line in the state of Wash-
ington that sell their product in Port-
land. These creameries manufacture
two-thirds of all the commercial butter
used there, reckoned at 1,127,000 pounds
annually. This butter sells for five cents
per pound more than the average butter.

The prohibition party in Oregon is in a
fix. Not having, at the last election,
polled 3 per cent. of the entire vote cast
in the entire state, they can at the next
general election make nominations only
by assemblies of electors. This will
knock them out as a party and any
nominations they make hereafter will
be as assemblies.

In a letter to the state board of equal-
ization the assessor of Wasco county
said his aim had been to assess mort-
gages 75 per cent of their face. The
Malheur assessor says he assessed mort-
gages at their face. As usual the Mul-
nomah assessor took them at 50 per
cent, while nearly all the other counties
considered mortgages worth dollar for
dollar, and so assessed them.

Another stingiest man has made his
appearance. He lives in Albany. He
had lost \$10, which was found by a
traveling man who kept it three months
before he found its owner. He properly
returned it, though he never received
thanks for his kindness. The owner even
wanted the finder to pay ten per cent
interest for the three months. This
he would not do, and the owner is now
thinking of bringing suit for the interest.

Governor Pennoyer says: "The im-
pertinent interference of the president-
elect with the selection of a United States
senator from New York is both un-
precedented and alarming. If the New
York democracy bows to such dictation,
it will indicate that Mr. Cleveland has
not only become the boss of his party,
but the czar of the nation. The assertion
that I, at any time, attempted to dictate
to Mr. Cleveland in regard to silver or
any other matter, is entirely without
foundation. I have had no correspond-
ence, in any manner, for more than four
years, with Mr. Cleveland, and I would
never think of attempting to convert him
to any democratic policy or doctrine, as
I consider him a mugwump and a pluto-
crat past all redemption."
