The Oregon legislature met Monday. This paper will keep you posted in regard to all the important proceedings.

Last Sunday, large, beautiful scriptural pictures were given to the members of the Sunday School at the M. E. Church.

Bert Severance has returned to Forest Grove to college. Frank Severance, his father, accompanied him as far as Fairdale.

A man is traveling over this county skinning cattle. Many of the farmers are having the hooks amputated from their bovine.

On Friday the telegraph line was again open between this place and Nehalem. The familiar click of the instrument began again.

F. H. Adams, representing G. G. Wickson & Co., has sold an excellent creamery plant to the Tillamook Dairy Association.

Jim Wilson was brought before Judge Maubley a few days ago and fined \$11 for striking Blake Thompson across the posterior with an oar.

G. W. Wallace and A. Bunn succeeded in getting a good many of their logs out of Beaver creek, and into the Nestucca, during the recent freshet.

The mail carrier on the Nehalem route reported the Nehalem river booming Tuesday, at Fish Hawk, water run over the bridge.—Clatskanie Chief.

Bayard Taylor's widow is going to tell in an article which she has written for The Ladies Home Journal what it means to be "The Wife of a Literary Man."

The machinery of the William's mill at Bay City has been painted recently to preserve it from the effect of the elements. Capt. Dodge had charge of the work.

Another judge is needed in this district. It is thought the present legislature will provide one; also, that this county will have two terms of circuit court each year.

A Rebecca lodge will be organized here to night. On Saturday afternoon a party will go from this place to Bay City and assist in organizing a Rebecca lodge there.

Mrs. H. B. Morgan went out on the Augusta. She will go to Forest Grove and visit for a while with Geo. L. Smith and family. Mr. Smith's youngest child is quite ill.

With the increased wagon road facilities for getting into Nestucca, via Slab creek, also via the new road up Big Nestucca, that county ought to take a boom.

Rev. W. H. Dierdorf has fitted up the Babbidge building in Bay City as a reading room and place of meeting for the Christian Endeavor Society. The society had a pleasant social there last Monday evening and will hold its meetings there hereafter. J. H. Bridgeford was elected president of the society, and Miss May Elliott secretary.

The Monmouth Tribune died on Friday last, aged nine weeks. Monmouth, by the way, is rapidly becoming a flourishing newspaper burying ground.—Statesman.

B. H. Bunn has come to this city to take charge of the tinning and plumbing department of Tuttle & Robson's hardware store. Mr. Bunn is an expert in his trade.

The Elmore came in Sunday evening and came up to Tillamook Monday morning, bringing in several passengers. She left the same day, and expects to return here at once.

County Court convened Monday and commissioner's court began Wednesday. Judge H. F. Holden and commissioners J. H. Bridgeford and W. H. H. Carry were present.

The action of the County Court in closely scrutinizing all bills is to be commended. Several bills have been rejected of late, and no doubt the court has done the right thing.

The steamers R. P. Elmore, Augusta and W. H. Harrison started to pass out over the Columbia bar Dec. 28, but were obliged to turn back on account of the stormy weather.

Ed. Hallock was elected an honorary member of the fire company here at the last meeting. Ed. belongs to the company in Astoria, which has made the best record in the North West.

The firm of Truman & T. F. Harris has made an assignment to Geo. Cohn. It is thought none of the creditors will lose anything. The liabilities are about \$4000, the assets being about the same.

Deputy Sheriff Carl Hunt has been over the county recently posting notices of levy on delinquent real estate. Those who neglect paying their taxes will find a bill of costs against their property.

There is a movement on foot to cut the Siletz reservation from this county, and with it and a portion of the west end of Benton county, form a new county with Newport or Yaquina City as the county city.

Our return postal cards are coming in at a surprising rate, and the result of our experiment is very gratifying so far. There are some interesting features in some of the answers, of which we shall discourse next week.

The snow was four feet deep on the east side of the mountains last week, and it was utterly impossible to do anything towards repairing the telegraph line. As soon as the snow subsides, the line will be put in operation again.

The Supreme Court has decided that the ballots on which Pierce's name was printed twice should be counted, though the ballots did not conform to the law. This elects Pierce presidential elector of the people's party.

At the annual meeting of Wide Awake Hook and Ladder Co. on Tuesday night C. N. Drew was elected president, N. P. Roberts chief, C. E. Nelson first assistant, J. H. Bower second assistant, Geo. Cohn treasurer, and C. H. Freas secretary.

Bay City Lodge A. F. & A. M. No. 102, elected and installed the following named officers Dec. 24: Miles Warren Worshipful Master, J. H. Bridgeford Senior Warden, Alex. Mc-Nair Junior Warden, J. E. Sibley Secretary and R. Sturgeon, Treasurer.

Pacific Lodge 105 I. O. O. F. of Bay City has elected the following officers for the ensuing year, and the installation will take place Saturday night: J. H. Bridgeford Noble Grand, O. Young Vice Grand, J. J. Pye Recording Secretary, and W. C. Morton Treasurer.

The mail did not arrive from Nestucca last week until Thursday. The high water between Grand Ronde reservation and Willamina caused the trouble, as it left the carrier from Dolph to this place without a mail pouch. The water has been very high on Nestucca river also.

At the I. O. O. F. election here the following officers were elected for the next term: Percy Hiett Noble Grand, Al. Perry Vice Grand, N. P. Roberts Recording Secretary, Wm. Eberman Permanent Secretary, Wm. C. King Treasurer. The installation will take place next meeting.

The Supreme Court of this state has decided that the act of the legislature exempting certain railroads from paying taxes for twenty years is unconstitutional and the sheriff of Benton county will collect \$30,000 taxes from the Oregon Pacific railroad. Other railroads will be obliged to pungle up back taxes.

The Portland produce price current, of Dec. 29, gives the following prices: Oats 43 to 45 cts.; potatoes 80 to 85 cts.; Onions 90 cts. to \$1.00 per sack; Eggs 35; Green apples \$1.00 to \$1.50; Chickens \$3.50 to \$4.00; Butter—brine 30 to 35 cts. per roll; choice dairy 65 to 70 cts. per roll. The above are wholesale prices.

A peculiar accident occurred on Beaver creek Christmas eve. Mr. Thacker and wife were going home from the Christmas tree and were on horse back. The stream was swollen, and in fording it, their two year old child fell into the raging stream. It was pitch dark, and there seemed no help for the child, as it could not be seen or found for a few moments. Finally the current took it to the bank about forty yards from where it fell in, and the frantic father happened to be there just as the child came close to the bank, and it was rescued safe and sound.

Recorder's Court.

On Monday L. Crenshaw and Dave Howard had some trouble about the building next to the Larsen House, and both were arrested by the city marshal and taken before Recorder Drew. Crenshaw was fined to the extent of the costs, amounting to four dollars. Howard was being tried Monday night and during the progress of the trial he took occasion to step out of doors. He came back all right the first time, but went out again. He didn't come back this time, and as the court couldn't proceed with the trial very well without the prisoner, it was adjourned. Howard had been turned loose on his own recognizance prior to the trial, and it was not supposed he would try to get away; in fact after he appeared at the trial he was not placed in the hands of the marshal. Howard came back Tuesday morning and was anxious to find the court, though he left shortly after for parts unknown. He said he left the night before because he was tired and sleepy, and that the attorneys had got into a tedious controversy which would take them all night. His leaving settled the controversy, and there was a kind of blank look on the court and officers when they found the object of their action was gone. The court, the marshal and prosecuting attorney were without a prisoner, and the attorney for the defense was minus his client. It is understood there is a state warrant issued for Howard's arrest, and the chances are that the Recorder will fine him heavily for contempt if he comes back.

The cause of the trouble in the first place was that Crenshaw and his son claim to own the saloon building by Larsen's Hotel. Chas. Nelson claimed to own it, or part of it also, and sold it with the stock of liquors to Frank Daugherty and Dave Howard. It seems that Howard sold his interest in the whiskey to Frank Daugherty, and Frank sold the liquor to C. B. Hadley. Howard still claimed possession of the building, but Crenshaws were putting in a door in the side. There was about to be a contest inside the house between Curt Crenshaw and Howard, when L. Crenshaw rushed to the door to go in. Howard met him at the door and struck at him with a bottle. Crenshaw drew a gun, made Howard drop the bottle and put him out of the building.

The matter as to who owns the building will be settled in the courts later on. Mr. Crenshaw, in defending himself of the charge of carrying concealed weapons, said he was ordered to do so by the U. S. authorities, he being a mail contractor. Mr. Crenshaw stated that an attempt had been made recently to rob the mails.

LATER—Howard came to Recorder Drew's house yesterday and tried to adjust matters, but his first trip was unsatisfactory. He is expected to return and still further negotiate, though he has managed to keep out of sight of the mar. had all the time. Some of his friends are helping him to elude the marshal.

James Quick.

A Short Sketch of this Old Pioneer's Career.

James Quick was born near Woodstock, Shenandoah county, Virginia, in 1817. About six years later his parents moved to Ohio, and at the age of 23 he was married. In 1852 he, with his family, crossed the plains, and the next year settled in Tillamook county on the place where he resided prior to his death. He came to this place by way of Grand Ronde and then up the beach to Netaris; his household goods being brought in on a small schooner. Mr. Quick was sheriff of this county in its early history, and was always a prominent figure in local politics. He had considerable to do with building some of the schooners that served this port in early times, and did much to advance the interest of this section. In 1870 he began the construction of the Trask river road, and a few years later, by the help of a \$10,000 appropriation from the state legislature, completed the road to Yamhill county.

Mr. Quick's wife died about five years ago. Three of his sons, Thad, Charles and Warren are dead. W. Quick, residing near this place, being the only son living. Four daughters still survive: Mrs. Wm. Johnson, living near this place, Mrs. Haines of Hood River, Mrs. Sanders of East Portland, and Mrs. M. V. Stillwell of Hubbard.

PERSONAL.

Capt. F. A. Dodge went to Astoria on the Augusta.

Edw. G. E. Wist, Wm. Tubens and Peter Nelson, of Nehalem, and C. H. Worthington, of Folley, were in this city the first of the week.

David Hadley went to Astoria on the Augusta, and will take passage on a steamer bound for San Francisco, where he will remain for a while taking in the sights.

C. F. Hobart is back from Nestucca, where he has been running a saw mill. He and Cras. Elliott will operate their mill near Dallas until spring, when he will again return to the Nestucca region.—Polk Co. Itemizer.

Geo. Shotwell, who had his arm broken on the North Yamhill road last fall, has not yet regained use of his arm, and another surgical operation was necessary. On Tuesday Dr. W. J. May, asisted by Dr. Patchen cut the flesh away from the fractured bone, cut and reset the bone. It is thought the bone will grow together in good shape now.

Nehalem P. O. is now a distributing office. Arrangements have been made to have the route to Onion Peak extended to Barbra, just across the line in Clatsop county, and a route will be established to Blythach on the South Fork. Nehalem has now a daily mail from Hobsonville, which is in effect, a daily mail from Tillamook city.

A. W. Severance has gone to Portland and has taken the new city charter with him. It is supposed that the amendments will be passed as we hear no objections excepting as to raising of the tax limit from two mills to five mills. We understand that the Hequarton bridge by the mill is to be placed on the county's road work. We doubt if this is good policy, however, as there is a feeling among some of the farmers that this city is not doing enough to keep up the roads leading here. We are not in favor of anything that will increase this feeling.

Cheese Factory at Beaver.

The farmers of Beaver and the Upper Big Nestucca are building a cheese factory, and expect to have the building, 24 x40, finished in a few days. It will be located near Beaver P. O., and it is thought about 250 cows will furnish milk for the institution. The promoters are ordering good machinery, and no doubt will make the enterprise a complete success, as M. Foland, an experienced cheesemaker will operate the factory. Mr. Foland makes cheese every year on his place, and this year the 32 cows he kept averaged \$7.50 each for the cheese product, and he was out little expense for hired help or feed. He has found a ready market for his cheese, and the house that has handled his cheese has encouraged him to take an interest in the factory, and agree to buy at a good price all the cheese made at the Beaver cheese factory.

Yamhill County.

No mail arrived from Portland from Thursday afternoon until Monday evening and the distance is less than forty miles by the railroad. There certainly was some bad management of the affairs of the railroad company, as it seems to us they could have sent a train out if they had tried very hard. The mail from Tillamook, a distance of over forty-five miles, arrived every day, and was carried on horse back, and sometimes on the back of the mail carrier. It took several men and horses to keep the road broke over the mountain as there was about five feet of snow on the mountain. It seems to us that if that mail could be gotten through the mail from Portland should have arrived here at least once a day.

As I have not been long in Tillamook county, it does not become me to have much to say to the public, but I am in sympathy with all other teachers in the work and wish them success, also, with parents who are striving to give their children a good education. I am not acquainted with other parts of this county. I am favorably impressed with the descriptions given in your paper. I find here a good foundation for a large settlement, school and society. The greatest drawback is the inconvenience of getting to and from here, and a good wagon road opened to Tillamook city would be a great help to Sand Lake neighborhood.

There are only about one hundred inhabitants in Sand Lake settlement, and they are so scattered that it is very inconvenient for them all to get together at any public gathering. There were sixty met at the school house on Columbus day, and fifty-five on Christmas. A very nice little tree was beautifully decorated with over three hundred presents. The congregation joined in singing for a while out of Gospel Hymns and after religious exercises, we were favored with speaking by some of the little folks and larger girls and boys, also by Mr. and Mrs. McGhee with appropriate Christmas songs. After the distributing of presents all pronounced it a success and went home well pleased.

Christmas Day all the young children and old children too met at the school-house to secure the many tokens of love that Old Santa Claus had placed on the tree for them. Chinese lanterns and candles lit up the pretty toys and trinkets, while many happy, smiling faces peeped here and there. The time passed pleasantly and all seemed happy.

The settler up Slab creek, who started with the intention of traveling the newly viewed county road to the valley, found himself lost at night in a dreary place, and was compelled to walk on a log back and forward all night to keep from freezing to death. Newly viewed roads are not generally fit for foot passengers.

The viewers and assisting party who went up Slab creek to view out the new county road, had a very serious and almost dangerous experience. Not knowing, previously, the ground they had to cover, they were entirely unprepared for the hardships they had to endure. There are no settlers out through those mountains, and consequently, the whole party, without planks, tent or food, were compelled to sleep on the hard ground with rain for a cover. They sent back a man for food and afterward subsisted upon bread made from flour and water. Finally the end of the route was reached ten days after starting and they returned, a sorry looking crowd, by way of Dolph on the old toll road.
