

County Court Proceedings

Court met the second day of January, and on the 4th the Commissioner's court was begun, Judge H. F. Holden, and Commissioners W. H. H. Carry and J. H. Bridgeford being present.

On the 4th F. Lyster to board, clothes for H. L. Tucker for 1 year at \$13.00 per week rejected.

On the 4th report of H. McDermott, on expenditure of \$20 for Hyatt to be approved.

In the matter of the road petition of Crane, et al, the claim of \$75 damages by A. Rose was referred to A. L. Alderman, Alfred Dean and Theo. Jacoby to appraise damages, if any.

In this case the following bills were allowed to persons engaged in the work of viewing out the road:

D. 7 is ordered to expend not to exceed \$50 on the bridge by L. G. Freeman's place to make it safe at present, and J. H. Bridgeford is appointed to superintend said repairs.

To San Francisco and Return.
T. B. Handley and his son C. B. Handley returned to Tillamook by the steamer Elmore last Friday. A HEADLIGHT representative found Tom that evening sitting on Lamb's rustic bench and proceeded to interview him in the latest style.

Yes, we had a pretty rough trip down. Six days out; and five of them in a gale, but the Truckee is a good sea boat and her captain both skillful and vigilant. We were very comfortable at all times.

No, I did not enjoy San Francisco at all. The weather was awful; rain, fog and cold all the time. This is the first evening I have seen since leaving Tillamook when one could sit out of doors in comfort.

Times? Yes, hard times everywhere. I should think every business in San Francisco, and Portland too, seems to be trying to sell out at cost. I saw more good men out of work and heard of more distress than I ever knew on the coast. The city has not gone ahead much since my last visit. There are a few fine buildings, and plenty of evidences of wealth cheek by jowl with abject poverty. It is the poorest managed large city in the country, bad streets, patchwork sidewalks and poor lights prevail, and still they pay enormous amounts of money in all departments. The streets are lit by poor gas lights at 11 cents each per night, costing nearly twice as much per month as we pay in Tillamook for incandescent lights of four times the power.

Came home by steamer Willamette Valley via Yaquina, Corvallis, McMinnville, Portland and Astoria. Did not see any place I liked as well as Tillamook, either for climate or business.

Charlie came home with me to spend the winter and try to recuperate his health. There was no foundation for the report that he had got into a scrape, excepting that while he was in San Francisco a man named Handley was in a shooting scrape and the similarity of names was enough for busy bodies to guess out a great yarn. I don't care about discussing his family affairs as they are hardly my business and certainly not yours, but I have no doubt they will all come out right in the end. We are both glad to get back to the quiet and comfort of Tillamook, where people have enough to do without rushing, and all are well enough off if they only knew it. Hurrah for Tillamook!

He preached several times at Beaver school house, and the people turned out in larger numbers than was ever known before in that place. Rev. Morgan says the farmers there are enthusiastic about their new creamery, and that work is progressing rapidly on the road to McMinnville, via the upper Nestucca.

Commendable Enterprise.
The Salem Statesman has issued a splendid 44 page annual, in pamphlet form, and it is replete with fine illustrations and facts regarding Salem. In it is an excellent photo-engraving of Gilford Stillwell, and a short sketch of his life which we publish.

Gilford Stillwell was born in Yamhill county, Dec. 2nd 1852. His father is Capt. W. D. Stillwell, who removed to Tillamook in 1870. Gilford went to work at the penitentiary as a guard in 1882, under A. Bush, superintendent, W. P. Miller, warden and Geo. Jackson, deputy warden. In the big break of July 3, 1883, Mr. Stillwell took an active part. There were twelve or thirteen men in the break, four of whom were killed and two wounded; the balance got away, but all were finally recaptured except one. The governor of Oregon, Mr. Stratton, superintendent of the penitentiary, and George Collias, warden, thanked Mr. Stillwell after the break for his bravery and coolness. He resigned in December, 1883. He went to California about two years after this and got a position as guard at San Quentin prison. Most of the time he served on all the guard duties, and was taught the use of the Gatling gun and cannon. He came back to Oregon and took his present position as guard on May 8th, 1891. He is a member of the Masonic and K. of P. orders.

Oretown.
A wool-picking was in progress last Wednesday evening at Mr. Sutton's home. Willing hands pulled the white, fleecy wool while stories and gay laughter went 'round and 'round.

Saturday evening a surprise party was given to Mrs. Christensen. Card-playing and dancing were the amusements of the young folks who so happily watched out the Old and rung in the New Year.

No mail from anywhere was received at this office for one whole week. The carrier complained of high water in the Agency creek but as we have since learned that the mail was brought from Grand Ronde to Dalph and not taken to this place we very severely condemn our accommodating carrier. Complaints have been forwarded to headquarters but it is very doubtful whether any attention will be given to the matter.

The body of the young man, Earl Commons, who was drowned in the bay a few weeks since was found on the South Beach at this place last Thursday and Mr. A. Commons, uncle of the deceased, was immediately notified. He, in company with a few kind neighbors, placed the body in a hastily constructed coffin and bore it to the Oretown cemetery where it was buried, Rev. Jones officiating.
