AN UNJUST ESTIMATE.

The Oregonian estimate of Blaine is very unjust in that it leaves out all reference to his greatest services. But this was unavoidable. To have referred to a single one of his many great achievements would have been to defeat the purpose of belittling the greatest American the world has known in a quarter of a century.

Leaving all his great services in congress out of the question and coming down to the almost immediate present, Blaine has left a matchless record. So great a critic and intense a political opponent as George William Curtis has left on record his admiration of Blaine's "Twenty Years in Congress" and refers to the "brilliant ease" of its literary performance. It is the only great work of its kind produced in this century, and when it is remembered that it was written in the greatest haste of time, and under severe strains of excitement, divided in the middle by a canvass in which its author was defeated for president, it stands without a parallel in any age.

During his first premiership Blaine took up the herculean task of uniting the commercial and political interests of the American republics. His task was interrupted by the death of Garfield, only to be taken up with renewed energy when he went into Harrison's cabinet. The injection of the reciprocity feature into the McKinley bill was Blaine's idea along the same line, all culminating in the supreme underlying thought of driving John Bull and his commerce off the American continent. The editor of the Portland paper must have surely have some sort of dementia on this subject to attempt to write such a statesman as Blaine down as a small man.

It was Blaine's letter from his sick bed at Florence, Italy, that threw life into the Harrison campaign in 1888, and defeated Cleveland for the presidency. There was no life in the Republican party until his ringing appeal for an American tariff came across the water to infuse new hope in the waning cause and set the Republican millions marching on to victory. Blaine enfeebled by a long illness and five thousand miles away could do that with a few strokes of his pen, which all the editors of party organs, including Harvey Scott of the Oregonian, were unable to bring about. He made a Republican victory possible. No small man could do that. All the small men in the country were trying and some of them cannot forgive Blaine that he was so infinitely their superior.

Some editors never describe a great man unless they have themselves in mind. This is not the first time the Oregonian has revealed its tendency to fall into this error.—Capital Journal.

ROAD IMPROVEMENT.

The National League for Good Roads now assembled at Washington, is engaged in a work which should commend the hearty support of the people. In this State in particular the laws relating to the maintenance of public highways are ridiculously inefficient. The work in each road district is done with very little reference to adjoining districts. Any comprehensive scheme of improvement is practically impossible. Scarcely a mile of country road can be traversed without meeting holes, ruts, rocks and steep grades, alike incompatible with comfort in driving and destructive to vehicles and horses. The time and money annually expended in work upon the country roads, if systematically and efficiently directed would result in admirable roads throughout the State. As it is the effort and expense are practically wasted. Unquestionably the remedy lies in State control of road building and improvement.—N. Y. Press.
