COUNTY PAUPERS.

At present the county is not paying out much to support paupers or to help indigent persons, in fact there never has been any particularly great outlay in that direction. The truth is, very few have needed assistance from the county, most every one here being able to secure the necessary means of life in some way. This county is fortunate in this particular, and it speaks well for the thrift of the people and the productiveness of the county.

There are, however, a few who have asked and obtained aid from the county. It is the duty of the people to support those who are so unfortunate as to have no property and who are incapacitated from making a living. The law provides that it shall be done, but it does not permit the county court to give assistance when the recipient has property or the ability to earn a living. The act of giving aid to unworthy and undeserving persons, however, encourages shiftlessness and improvidence. Every measure of this kind should be closely scrutinized before it is allowed. We suggest that the county court here investigate a few cases where aid has been given. We hear reports that lead us to emphasize this suggestion.

In one case, a man who owns a good place on Trask river, has been allowed \$28.75 for board, while he was undergoing medical treatment here. The recipient is unfortunate in having a broken arm that has been a long time in healing, but he has considerable property—much more than hundreds of other taxpayers in the county. He has our sympathy, but allowing him money sets a bad precedent. Any family that is short of funds and has a good deal of sickness has the same right to secure aid from the county. Anyone who owns a good ranch, deeded land, with no mortgage against it, enough of it clear to make a living, and stocked with cattle, ought not to ask assistance, even if he is unfortunate in some particular.

In another case a woman is boarding here and being treated at the expense of the county, when her husband, an able bodied man, is getting wages for his work in Bay City all the while. Just think how many people could claim assistance on better grounds!

Another case: A family of shiftless people in this town are without funds, a member of the family is sick, and provisions and food are furnished by the county. All right so far, but it is said part of their allowance is taken up in expensive and unnecessary luxuries, and that a herd of able bodied male relatives may be found eating with them most of the time. These male relatives really should be earning something and supporting the family; they should be bringing down potatoes and other provisions to the family, instead of eating what they have got. Now, it seems that this method will not encourage worthless loafers to go to work!

It would be a capital idea to purchase a poor farm. This would settle the question. Some people would rather go to work than to go to a poor farm, and there wouldn't be a free lunch counter at the poor house for every dead-beat who comes along. Those that did need help could be kept much cheaper, and a poor farm ought to be almost self-supporting.

Senator Denny has introduced a bill that seems to be meeting the general approval of all who have seen it. It is for an act to prevent a person from trespassing upon any enclosed premises, or lands not his own, being armed with a gun, pistol or other firearm, and to prevent shooting upon, or from the public highway. This bill provides that it shall be unlawful for any person, other than officer on lawful bus-

ness, being armed with a gun, pistol or other firearm, to go, or trespass upon any enclosed premises or land without the consent of the owner or possessor thereof. It shall be unlawful for any person to shoot upon, or from the public highways. It shall be unlawful for any person, being armed with a gun, or other firearm, to cause, permit, or suffer any dog, accompanying such person, to go, or enter upon any enclosed premises without the consent of the owner or possessor thereof, except dogs in pursuit of deer. Any person violating the provisions of this act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by fine not less than \$15 nor more than \$50; and in default of the payment of the fine imposed, shall be committed to the county jail of the county in which the offense is committed, one day for every \$2 of said fine.

SHERIDAN BANK FAILURE.

The failure of the Sheridan bank makes it obvious that some strict regulations regarding such institutions should be made by Oregon's law-makers. The following from the Statesman shows how disastrous the failure has been to Sheridan people:

Sheriff Warren and Mr. Apperson, of McMinnville, went over to Sheridan Saturday, and opened the "busted" bank which was under the control of the United States Banking company and found in the vault about \$2,300 in money and notes. The bank contained deposits of various amounts from nearly all the widows, school clerks and prosperous young men in the county, and the populace are considerably excited over its failure. The return of President Baldrige is as much desired in Sheridan as it is at Gervais. From a man who was in Sheridan yesterday, it was learned that the liabilities were about \$20,000 and the assets \$2,300, including the house and fixtures. Attachments have been issued to cover the assets already, as the amount of deposits was fully \$20,000. "When the bank was closed," said the gentleman, "Cashier Reaves turned the keys over to Watchman Kenney, who guarded the vault until the arrival of the sheriff Saturday. Reaves, who is a brother-in-law of Baldrige, is highly esteemed by Sheridanites and opinion is divided as to whether he knew the condition of the concern was not sound. He seems deeply grieved over its failure and many are inclined to believe that he had nothing to do with it. Still it looks as if he could not help knowing its financial state."

From this it appears that Baldrige must have feathered his own nest in good shape, as the failure at Gervais was about as disastrous.

Senator Vandenberg has strong faith in the people's party love of reading pic-a-print stuck up on bill-boards, fences and trees in the country. He feels so sure that if itemized accounts of the county expenditures were thus cheaply served to the people, instead of being published in the newspapers, every county would gain enormously. The farmers would descend from their saddles and wagon-seats and rush up to the old fences, barns and stumps to read the No. 1 pic-a-print, he feels pretty sure. The only way to wake up such a mass of stupidity is to burn the moss off it. Vandenberg stands as the representative of all the stupidity in his constituency.—Klamath Star.

The state printer on Monday evening caught up with all printing of bills and expresses the hope that all new bills will be passed on to second reading without printing, as his force is tired out with day and night work. Bills now number 360 in the house and 212 in the senate.
