HAWAIIAN TREATY.

THE TERMS OF ANNEXATION INDICATE FAVORABLE ACTION.

The President's Message—Foreign Comment.—Before the Senate.

The president's message to the senate, accompanying the treaty, is as follows:

"I transmit herewith, with a view to its ratification, a treaty of annexation concluded the 14th day of February, 1893, between John W. Foster, secretary of state, who was duly empowered to act in that behalf on the part of the United States, and Lorin A. Thurston, W. R. Castle, W. C. Wills, C. L. Carter and Joseph Marsden, the commissioners on the Hawaiian islands. The provisional treaty, it will be observed, does not attempt to deal in detail with the questions that grow out of the annexation of the Hawaiian islands to the United States. The commissioners representing the Hawaiian government have consented to leave to the future and to the just and benevolent purpose of the United States the adjustment of all such questions. I do not deem it necessary to discuss at any length the conditions which have resulted in this decisive action. It has been the policy of the administration to not only respect, but encourage the continuance of an independent government in the Hawaiian islands so long as it afforded a suitable guarantee for the protection of life and property, and maintained a stability and strength that gave adequate security against the domination of any other power. The moral support of this government has continually manifested itself in most friendly diplomatic relations, and in many acts of courtesy to the Hawaiian rulers.

The overthrow of the monarchy was not in any way prompted by this government but had its origin in what seems to have been a reactionary measure and revolutionary policy on the part of Queen Liliuokalani, which put in serious peril not only the large and preponderating interests of the United States in the islands, but all foreign affairs, and, indeed, the decent administration of civil affairs and the peace of the islands. It is quite evident that the monarchy has become effete, and the queen's government so weak and inadequate as to be the prey of designing and unscrupulous persons. The restoration of Queen Liliuokalani to her throne is undesirable, if not impossible, and unless actively supported by the United States, would be accompanied by serious disaster and the disorganization of all business interests. The influence and interest of the United States in the island must be increased, not diminished.

"Only two courses are now open, one the establishment of a protectorate by the United States, and the other annexation, full and complete. I think the latter course; which has been adopted in the treaty, will be highly promotive of the best interests of the Hawaiian people, and is the only one that will secure the interests of the United States. These interests are not wholly selfish. It is essential that none of the other great powers secure these islands. Such a possession would not consist with our safety and with the peace of the world. This view of the situation is apparent and conclusive that no protest has been heard from any government, and I think there is a general concurrence in the opinion that the queen ought not to be restored. Prompt action on this treaty is very desirable. If it meets the approval of the senate, peace and good order can be secured in the islands under the existing laws until such time as congress can provide by legislation a permanent form of government for the islands. The legislation should be, and I do not doubt it will be, not only just to the natives and all other residents and citizens of the islands, but should be characterized by great liberality and high regard to the rights of the people and all foreigners domiciled there. The correspondence which accompanies the treaty will put the senate in possession of all the facts known to the executive."

Legislative News.

The populists say their house will go right ahead making laws, no matter what the courts may do; that senate will continue to recognize the house, and the governor will sign the bills passed by it. Should they be declared invalid by reason of having been passed by an illegal house, then the populists say the blame will rest upon the courts. In case such a thing comes to pass, the state institutions, colleges, asylums, schools, etc., will have to close.

All show of force is to be withdrawn and everything is to remain in status quo till the courts decide the habeas corpus case, to be brought through the arrest of the clerks of both houses to test the question of which house is the legal one.

Owing to the irregularities of the mails it has been impossible to ascertain just what action has been taken by the Legislature in many cases, but the following is the best information on hand:

A small portion, $\frac{1}{4}$ to $1\frac{1}{4}$ miles, on the north of this county has been added to Clatsop.

The boundary between this and Washington county remains unchanged.

Lincoln county, with Toledo on Yaquina bay as the temporary county seat, has been formed. The west end of Benton and the south end of Tillamook, all of the Siletz reservation, form the new county.

The Tillamook charter, as amended, is a law.

Sebastian Hardman's relief bill passed. This is a measure to reimburse Mr. Hardman for money he paid the state for land which turned out to be government land, and for which he had to get title from the government.

The bill for a health officer on Tillamook bay failed.

The fate of Merrill's relief bill for Maxwell is unknown here.

Tillamook county is to have two terms of circuit court; in May and November.

The World's Fair and military appropriations were passed over the governor's veto.

The new pilot bill, Astoria having two commissioners of three, is a law.

The jute mill bill passed.

The \$95,000 wagon road fund is to be distributed among the counties according to area.

The mortgage tax and exemption laws are repealed.

A new road law, optional with each county, has passed.

Jurors may be excused on account of sickness and are not obliged to serve over three weeks.

Persons who kill deer are not allowed to sell them. It is now unlawful to hunt waterfowl after sunset or before sunrise.

A bounty of \$3 00 is paid for the tails of sea lions at the county clerk's office.

Hereafter county warrants issued will bear interest at only 4 per cent.

Heavy penalties are provided for anyone who points firearms, loaded or unloaded, at another.

Parties may sue and be sued in a J. P. Court without an attorney, for claims not greater than \$20, and two arbiters may sit with the Justices in such trials. This enables anyone to collect a small debt without paying an attorney for drawing the formal papers.

An insane asylum to cost \$165,000 will be provided for Eastern Oregon.

The state board of charity is abolished.

Hereafter all small cities can incorporate before the county court.

H. B. Compson, I. A. Macrum and J. B. Eddy were selected as railroad commissioners.

J. A. Brown, John Fox and B. F. Packard were selected as pilot commissioners.

English Comment.

LONDON, Feb. 16.—The Daily Chronicle says at the Hawaiian question: "Mr. Harrison takes over-much for granted when he declares the leading powers would acquiesce in the annexation of Hawaii by the United States."

The Daily News—"If the senate rejects Harrison's treaty, the well-wishers of the Republic abroad will regard it as having escaped a serious danger. Americans have no advantage to gain which would counter-balance the perils of a republic beyond the seas."

State and General News Items Note and Comment.

The Legislature adjourned last Saturday morning.

Corbett has challenged Mitchell to fight for \$10,000 a side. Mitchell has arrived in New York but has not put up the money yet.

Senator Mitchell invites us by postal card to attend the World's Fair. As the Senator forgot to send us a check to cover our expenses, we mildly refuse to accept the invitation in the spirit it was tendered. While we are friendly to the Senator, an invitation without a check to cover the expenditures of the trip, is akin to the presentation of a pass to Heaven without a pair of wings.—Sheridan Sun.

A session of the whisky trust investigating committee was devoted to watching Expert Veasey produce liquors by distillation. By the use of essences, oil and coloring matter he in a few minutes produced whiskies, rums and gins similar to those sold as pure goods. The basis for this product was an odorless and colorless liquid, known to the trade as spirits, worth about \$1.30 per gallon. By the use of compounds worth one and a half cents he produced a gallon of liquor that will sell as high as \$4.

Captain Babbage is on record at this office as the first kicker. In our first issue mention was made of the boat commonly called the Warspite. The captain says that a few years ago he rigged the same boat out as a miniature man-of-war, and christened her the Constitution in memory of the famous old Iron Sides. Captain Babbage considers it, and justly too, very unpatriotic to change the good old name for one that is 'English you know,' and has been the terror of Behring sea to all American seafarers during the late controversy.—Yaquina News.

It is a well-known fact to lumbermen that the growth of California redwood ceases just north of the California boundary, and yet, on the above recommanees the redwood logs have been found along the beaches between Tillamook and the Columbia river, from Grays Harbor to Cape Flattery, and along the shores of Vancouver Island; and in 1888 drift redwood logs were found on Queen Charlotte Island, and on the Chimsen Peninsula and Wales Island, Alaska, between 54 deg. 10 min. and 54 deg. 40 min. north, having drifted 800 miles to the northward. The drift of the wreck of the bark Maria J. Smith for 250 miles, and a portion of the wreck of the St. Stephen, foundered off Cape Flattery in 1886, was cast ashore at about latitude 50 degrees. Many other proofs have been gathered, enough to fill a volume. Only one need be mentioned to indicate the velocity of this eddy current. In 1886 a Columbia river seine was found on the beach to the westward of Bonilla Point, Vancouver Island, with the name of the cannery attached, and the fish still hanging in the meshes. It must have been carried 150 miles in a few days.

Phil Armour as Mayor.

CHICAGO, Feb. 16.—It is quite possible the republicans may nominate Phil D. Armour for world's fair mayor. His name has been before the leaders, and they have decided to appeal to him to make the race. Mr. Armour was seen last night and said that if a representative body of citizens asked him to run, he probably would do so, and added: "I am pork-packer and not a politician. I think the result will show that I am a better packer than politician."
