The steamer A. B. Field formerly running to this place, was wrecked in Smith's river, California, last week. During a freshet in the river her lines broke and she drifted against rocks, being an entire loss. The crew escaped only with the clothing they had on at the time.

A movement is on foot, and with all appearances of success, to build a new salmon cannery at the head of the bay near Dry Stocking tar, and a few Tillamook capitalists with some moneyed men in Portland will back it. There are good reasons for believing the project will be successful.

Captain Schrader, of the steamer Augusta, now contemplates editing and rebuilding the steamer Harrison especially for the Tillamook trade. The Harrison has less draft than the Augusta, is shaped so she can make better time, and will serve the interests of this place quite well if the proposed improvements are made. Captain Schrader will try to do something to hold his trade here.

Wm. C. Hyatt died Friday and was buried Saturday. He was a noted character in his time, and in his earlier days was quite wealthy, being a successful miner. He wrote poetry quite often, and was the originator of "Hyatt's Compound Bitters" which had a large sale here. Of late years he has been unwell and has been failing fast for the last year. He leaves a widow and four children.

The bill for two terms of circuit court for this county failed, so we find out at last, and we are informed that Judge Geo. H. Burnett is responsible for it. It is reported that a legislator from Salem stated on the floor of the house that Judge Burnett thought two terms per year here was unnecessary and that if it did become necessary he would appoint another term. A similar assertion lost Judge Boese the support of the Republicans of this county. On the other hand, we are informed that Judge Burnett claims that he did not work against the bill.

Pugilistic
On Tuesday night, in Hadley's hall, there was an exhibition of pugilistic science, such as has never been witnessed before in Tillamook.

At first there was a little sparring match between R. Leabo, brother of the engineer of the Augusta, and Wilbur Stillwell. Leabo had more science and had the best of it, though Wilbur showed himself to be strong and active.

Then Clark Hadley and Royal Stillwell had a little set-to, in which Royal showed himself to be very quick and agile, though Clark was too heavy and strong for him.

Next came the principal affair of the evening. Leabo and a Tillamook country preacher were matched to spar with gloves for a purse of \$5. They boxed for six rounds with some big worn-out ten-ounce gloves. The rev. was very spry and showed a good deal of science, but Leabo was too much for him, being much heavier, and the purse was awarded to Leabo. The reverend made some scientific swinging blows, but Leabo got in some knock-out punches towards the last. Leabo has had some experience in the ring in Portland, and is known there as "Billy the Kid," so it is said.

The preacher was at one time a boxing master, has had some training under Jack Dempsey, and fought a Nigger in Portland about a year ago, though unsuccessfully. His reverence will fight a little, however, if pushed, is a pretty good man physically and is no slouch of a preacher.

Abe Coln was referee, Dave Hadley time-keeper, and J. J. Stoddard kept tally. Chas. B. Handley acted as second for Leabo, and Wilbur Stillwell for the preacher.

Quite a large crowd of the local sports were present, and it is the intention to make pugilism one of the attractions of Tillamook. An athletic club will be organized and contests of this kind will occur frequently.

House Burned.

J. H. Smith, who lives on the L. J. Ooley place at Pleasant Valley had his home burned Sunday evening with all its contents.

Wm. Bays who lives near that place was arrested charged with setting fire to the house. Mr. Smith and his wife were at the school house attending church at the time, and Bays came rushing in and reported it. It is claimed that another party who passed by saw Bays running from the house, and also that an empty oil can, from which oil has been recently taken, was found near the house. A warrant was sworn out by Mr. Smith and Sheriff Edwards arrested Bays. As Bays could not give bonds he was placed in the jail until his hearing yesterday afternoon, which came off before Judge Mauley.

Judge Cooper appeared for the prosecution and T. B. Handley for the defense. After several witnesses were examined Mr. Handley moved to dismiss the case for want of sufficient evidence against the defendant. Judge Mauley granted the motion and discharged Bays.

It is alleged that Bays made threats against Smith on account of previous difficulties, and that at one time Bays tried to shoot his wife, Mrs. Bays, who is the mother-in-law of Smith, chasing her away from home with a Winchester, though Mrs. Bays had taken the precaution to remove the cartridges before. It has been but a short time since Bays and wife were married, but they had parted and she was living at Smith's hence the trouble which led to the suspicion.

Bays says: "I was at church and as I was going to preach, I started for Snackford's to get some writing done. When near the house I saw the fire and then I went back to the school house and reported the matter to Smith. I can neither read nor write and loved my wife dearly. I would not burn the house as some of my jewelry and papers were in the house."

An Eloquent Address.

Armstrong will begin at once the erection of a large creamery on the Nehalem, the milk from a large number of cows having been assured, and they have purchased a fine plant from Ogden & Townsend, who will handle their butter. L. Parrish of Miami has purchased a small creamery outfit and will buy milk from his neighbors. Hathaway & Son of Kilchis are in the business too with a good outfit. The cheese factory project at Beaver is going along all right, and at Woods the people are making arrangements to operate the creamery there.
