In color it was about equally divided between black and white, and in size it was as large as an average sized Shepard dog. Although hit three times, much to the chagrin of the hunters it escaped. The men say they never saw anything like it before.
The Ladies' Aid Society of the M. E. Church will give an experience sociable at the G. A. R. hall, Friday evening, March 17. Admission 10 cents. Lunch will be served extra. Everybody earn a dollar by nickels and dimes and then go to the sociable and tell how you earned the money. You will then turn the dollar over to the society. It is said that the amusement will be cheap at ten cents, the admission price. Everybody invited.
A young man named Cummings was arrested at Gales Creek, Thursday, on the complaint of a man named Powell, charging him with an attempt at rape. His daughter, it appears was walking through the snow to Gales City; Cummings who was hauling shingles, and who was going down by there as soon as he had finished loading, offered her a ride, which she accepted. She claims that in helping her upon the wagon he took improper liberties with her and she refused to ride with him. Cummings was given a preliminary trial before the justice of the peace and put under \$500 bonds to appear before the grand jury. He has always been an excellent reputation and his acquaintances are unable to explain the matter, as they are loth to believe him guilty of any impropriety.—Forest Grove Times.
Pugilism is done for in New Orleans. Fitzsimmons will not get his \$37,000. He will get \$15,000 or \$20,00 in cash, all that is available, and good paper for the balance. There will be no more contests in the Crescent Club ring, and perhaps no more in that of the Olympic Club, though the Bowen-Borke match is scheduled for the first week in April. The clubs will go to general athletics and rowing, and die unless their social sides are strong enough to bear the financial loss of such shows, which have long ago ceased to pay in richer towns than New Orleans. The women of the city are organizing an anti-pugilistic league as they did an anti-lyric league, and the leading papers editorially denounce the contests. The next legislature does not meet until May, 1894, and the city authorities are with the clubs, both Presidents Noel and Dickson being members of the city council; but the best opinions are that neither club will fly in the face of public opinion and that pugilism in New Orleans is done.—Oregonian.
Deplorable Accident.
Dr. Horace Patchen lies at the point of death, unconscious and paralyzed from the effects of a blow received in a friendly boxing bout with Eugene M. Keys. Some of the boys about town were in L. L. Stillwell's livery stable boxing for sport, and Dr. Patchen and Mr. Keys put the gloves on just for fun. Dr. Patchen received a couple of heavy blows on the head and neck, though the blows did not seem hard enough to be serious, and the gloves were almost like pillows. He quit boxing however, saying he had enough, and started to put his coat on, but fell unconscious, and has remained so ever since. He was carried home and his brother physicians were summoned, and they report him in a very precarious condition. His neck is partially dislocated and there is a hemorrhage on his brain. An effort to reduce the dislocation of the neck was unsuccessful. It is a very sad affair, and no doubt will cast a damper on the pugilistic ambition of the boys around town.
LATER: It is contemplated to take Dr. Patchen to Portland per steamer Augusta, where proper appliances may be found to bring sufficient tension on his neck to reduce the dislocation. At present he seems to have partially regained consciousness, but is speechless and almost wholly paralyzed.
The Debating Society.
The Athenian Society is formed and is in working order, the constitution and by-laws having been adopted. Abe Cohn is president pro tem and C. H. Freas is temporary secretary.
At the meeting the following profound question will be discussed and perhaps definitely settled:
"Resolved, That the destruction of wild animals by man in the United States is a benefit to the people."
C. H. Freas, Dr. May, F. R. Beals, Tom Coates, A. P. Wilson and G. O. Nolan will champion affirmative.
Abe Cohn, W. F. D. Jones, Arthur G. Beals, Daniel C. Bowers and E. O. Nolan will appear in the cause of the negative.
This is one of the politico economic questions of the day, and some decided policy should be determined at once. Those who wish to become at once edified and enlightened on the subject should not fail to be in attendance, as the forensic talent of the county will be represented.
The meeting will begin promptly at 8 o'clock P. M. next Monday in the court house.

Shipping Intelligence.
The Augusta arrived in the bay Tuesday evening with a large cargo of freight and the following passengers: A. W. Severance and wife, W. S. Runyon, Dr. T. H. Mesrole of the HEADLIGHT, R. Mahany, a son-in-law of James Tene, with family, Capt. Schrader's family, Patrick Moore of Brownsville, two commercial travelers, Sig. L. Cohn, representing Dittenhoff & Co. of Portland, and others.
The str. Truckee came to the bar Tuesday, and by some means struck on the sand, breaking her propeller. As the tide was going out, she drifted out safely and anchored. As the Augusta came in she spoke the Truckee and preliminary arrangements for towing her in were made. On Wednesday morning the Augusta went out, but terms could not be made. The Augusta wanted \$1000 for towing her in and the Truckee was willing to pay only \$100, so the passengers were transferred to the Augusta and the Truckee set sail for San Francisco, expecting to make repairs there.
The steamer Garfield struck a floating log Tuesday night, as she was coming up the bay with a load of passengers, and broke her propeller wheel. Small boats were secured and the passengers brought to this city. The Garfield will be repaired at once.
The steamer Polar Bear ran aground inside the spit while entering Nehalem Tuesday. She struck the spit, lost steering way, and the brokers landed her so far up that she was high and dry at low tide. One flange was broken from her propeller, but little damage was done otherwise. It got off safely at noon today.
Miraculous Escape.
Fire from the furnace in the mill set fire to a large pile of shavings, which were being used for fuel, Monday night about 12 o'clock. Watchman McCall, who acts as fireman and attends to the electric light machines could find no buckets or water handy, and the hose was beneath some lumber. He pulled the whistle vigorously, and a moment later the rapid jingle of the fire bell was heard. A few parties rushed to the mill and by smothering the flames and upset a barrel of water which was overhead, got the fire under control before the look and ladder truck could be got out, in fact the party that rang the bell did not ring out the No. of the fire ward and did not stay to tell the firemen where the conflagration was located. The fire was getting under good headway when stopped, and had there been another moment's delay, a great part of the town would have burned down, as there was a strong east wind and everything was dry enough to burn readily. The Mill Co. is putting in several more water taps, some more barrels inside and on top of the building, and will take greater precaution henceforth.
Darling's Case.
In an interview with C. P. Darling, of Nestucca, who is in the county jail in default of giving bonds for keeping the peace, having been charged with assault by his wife, he said:
"I am here unjustly. My wife swore falsely against me, and as I have no property to put up for bonds, I suppose I will have to grin and bear it. As soon as I can prove up on my place I can give bonds."
Upon being asked as to the report that he had served a term in the Wisconsin state prison, he declined to answer directly, saying, "It doesn't matter if the report is true; that cuts no figure in this case."
The reporter asked him if he and the woman he had trouble with were married. He stated that he had the marriage certificate in his cell.

The Mail Service.
The new man on the North Yamhill Leader does the editor of the HEADLIGHT up in the following sour-caustic style:
"The Tillamook HEADLIGHT of Feb. 23rd makes some very absurd remarks in regard to the mail service at this end of the mail route. We do not intend to enter into personalities or decri Tillamook people and Tillamook business, that is not the aim of true journalism, but will state a few facts for the consideration of the editor across the range.
About the time of which he complains one of the heaviest snow-blockades known in this section of the country for many years, held all the various lines of travel at its mercy, all communication by rail between this point and Portland being closed for three days, and even then the S. P. R. R., carried the mails past this point to McMinnville, and returned them the following morning.
Now, Sir HEADLIGHT, these are undisputable facts occurring prior to our taking charge of this paper, and we only desire to see justice done to all parties concerned.
Our postmistress, Miss Laughlin, has been an accommodating and efficient official, doing all in her power for the advancement of the public service; the mails were made up and ready for the carriers on time, and the office held open until after midnight in order to meet the demands of the route of which the HEADLIGHT complains.
Certainly the gentlemanly editor over the range can do no less than apologize in a gentlemanly way for the innuendoes he has so openly cast upon the official character of a lady."
It is the aim of the HEADLIGHT to give both sides a hearing, so that no injustice be done, however the article we wrote had no reference to the time of the railroad blockade, and was not written at that time. Furthermore, it is not our fault if the S. P. trains don't stop or deliver mail at North Yamhill. The proceeding is something like the North Yamhill P. M. sending North Yamhill mail to this place during the worst blockade. The Leader's article does not explain this, and it does not explain why we received New York papers of Feb. 10 before we received Portland papers of the same date. We can't see yet where an apology is in order.
Those Pictures.
Several papers have initiated the HEADLIGHT in giving humorous pictorial illustrations of the new administration, and some peculiar comments have been made. The Sheridan Sun says:
"The Tillamook HEADLIGHT in its last issue, tried to palm off a cut of E. E. Selph, formerly of Sheridan, for Grover Cleveland. Selph is a better looking man than Cleveland, but he hasn't got the same amount of offices to dispense to the public and therefore isn't so much in it except in looks. Well, the HEADLIGHT's gang were no doubt a swell lot, but they are an unknown quantity in the outside world, and Mr. Cleveland would have been hard up for figure-heads for a cabinet to think of any such bumpkins as are there represented."
