A BIG KICK.

A tenderfoot from the far east stepped into our office yesterday, and demanded to see the publisher of the paper. The editor, the proprietor, the foreman, the business clerk, the devil, (all being one individual) responded to the inquiry. We (you can easily see why the newspaper man says "we") in our usual dignified manner explained that we were the august personage that presided over the columns of the great family journal, the HEADLIGHT.

Tenderfoot.—Well, I am here to tell you what I think of you. Here I am, nearly three thousand miles from home—came all the way across the continent—only to be disappointed. Will start for home tomorrow, and thought I'd just drop in and give you a piece of my mind.

Editor.—What have we done to bring forth your maledictions?

Tenderfoot.—Why, sir, you have misrepresented this country in a shameful style. Before I came here I expected to find a different state of affairs altogether.
