AT CHURCH.

Sunday is a lively day in Portland. The saloons are open, and have a good patronage. In order to avoid the crowd and jam, the editor of this paper went to church. It was not packed so full but what we found it comfortable, in fact had nearly half a bench to ourself. At the saloons the chairs and tables are all full, and others. At church it is different. As we entered the church the doorkeeper handed us the enclosed programme, or announcements of services, as it were. It was at the Taylor St. M. E. Church, the oldest and leading Methodist church in the city. Rev. Charles Edwards Locke, D. D., is pastor. Following is part of the programme:

Rev. Locke is a pale-faced, worn looking individual, and judging from his language he is a man of education and culture, but his discourse was in such a sing-song, whing-whang tone that we lost respect for him. It was affected. Why will preachers persist in whining, drawling and bellowing in front of their constituents? Why not talk natural? It sounds better and has more effect. In fact it is easier done and sounds more honest. Rev. Locke seems to be in ill health, as many other preachers. This is the first time we have been to church for several months. To tell the truth we didn't care for the sermon or affected prayer, that the parson made. We expected to hear the preacher say something scientific or elegant but were disappointed. The moral and religious lessons intended to be conveyed were smothered with affection and graceful gestures. Mr. Locke should study practical life. He ought to ride across the mountains through the mud a few times every year, as ye editor did recently, in order to tone himself down to business. His prayer sounded as if it were for show—to be heard by the congregation—and to express his knowledge of the proper pronunciation of "last," "trespass" and other words which should be pronounced with the broad sound of "a." The music was good and was worth hearing. A large choir sang eloquently; but in some respects its sound was mercenary. The "offertory," by the preacher, was a rambling discourse which tired the

most ardent church member—perhaps they wouldn't admit it. Preachers should preach humanity, not ethereal sentiment. The singing of the choir was the principal feature, (sometimes it is spelled "choir.") They were experts in their line. One woman who seemed to be the star had a peculiar thrill, a ri-yi-trala, and a high-toned cadence which was superfluous.

This is the only fault we have to find with the choir. She sang to be noticed. We like modesty—in fact we are the embodiment of modesty ourselves. We read the responsive services in the Psalms as did the rest of the congregation, and taking it as a whole were very much interested in observing the rendition from the salutary to the benediction.

WHY NOT?

The Chinese vice-council at San Francisco in speaking of the Geary law says: "We will submit peacefully to the laws of the country, and before May 5th next we shall issue warning to the Chinese to acquiesce in imprisonment, if need be, but never to resist. What we expect is that an arrest will be made, and then the matter will be at once taken to the United States supreme court, and that tribunal will enjoin the enforcement of the law until its constitutionality is determined. We know, and our lawyers know that the nearer the day comes for the enforcement of the Geary law, the more afraid of it are the men who framed and advocated the measure. I believe they realize it will never stand the test in courts, and they know as well if the attempt is made to enforce the law before its constitu-

tionality is determined the United States may be asked some questions by the nations of the earth that will be hard to answer. With affairs in the Hawaiian islands in their present condition, an international embroglio with China, upon the question of treaties, is not desired by Mr. Cleveland nor his cabinet."

The Northwestern Lumberman of Chicago, treating of the growing scarcity of white pine for shop work, suggests several woods to fill its place, and says of this Coast's woods: The two western woods that now seem likely to become important factors in the factory trade are spruce and red cedar. The former is a light, soft wood, easily worked, but not strong, with a close, straight grain. It has been used to some extent by one of the local sash, door and blind factories with satisfactory results. The red cedar is more brittle than spruce, rather coarse-grained, but easily worked and very durable. It meets with some favor in this market as a finishing wood, but is hardly as desirable for factory work as spruce. Yellow or Douglas fir is claimed by some Pacific Coast mill men to be an excellent finishing wood, but it is too heavy to admit of shipment East in competition with spruce and cedar. Its commercial value is greatest for construction purposes.
