AFTER THOUGHTS.

It is in order now to have better fire protection.

There was much loud talking that meant nothing.

All places should have a pump and hose as at Fearnside's.

Ground was broken for new buildings on Tuesday morning.

In a few months Tillamook will be a better town than it ever was before.

The Tillamook Lumbering Co. lost heavily on electric light wires and poles.

Let everybody take hold to repair the damages by Sunday night's fire.

It was amusing to see parties scratching around in the ashes to find imperishable articles.

It is an absolute certainty that the fires started were incendiary. It will happen again if nothing is done.

The escape of Hadley's residence and barn was miraculous. Two barrels of water on the roof of Mr. Hadley's kitchen saved several buildings.

The faucet to a thirty-gallon barrel of kerosene in the rear of Hadley's had been turned open, and the oil run out in a deluge. This is why the flame shot to the sky with one flash.

The 4th of July celebration and races will probably be postponed for a year—that is, the energy of the people will be devoted to other things principally for the present. The dance in Hadley's hall will be held somewhere else.

If a man has an honorable, legitimate and visible means of support, he is not likely to be accused of crime. Those who have not these things are criminals. This town has no use for such a class. It is a good time to get rid of them.

The slightest wind would have destroyed the business houses that were left. At one time we would not have given fifteen cents for the buildings on the south side of First St. At that time we valued our office only for what we could carry out. A brisk wind would have given no time for that.

There are drunken bums who have been in the habit of sleeping in vacant houses and sheds. They are liable to carelessly start a fire any time. The marshal should henceforth put them in the cooler or drive them out of town. They should not be allowed to hang around the town at all.

It is about time to order a few lazy, worthless, good-for-nothing fellows out of town. It should be done on general principles. You can't do them an injustice by making accusations against them, as they are of the class that is guilty of and responsible for nearly all crime. Out with them.

There was a spirit of neighborly generosity shown to those who were burned out. What few business places that were left were made to accommodate as many as possible. It is to be hoped that the old neighborhood prejudices burned with the fire.

This town does not ask charity in its present misfortune, in the usual sense of the word on such occasions, but we should like to see those who have capital act liberally in advancing the necessary funds for the people to re-build. The opportunities for safe investment here are most excellent.

There are several schemes advanced to provide protection against fire for the town since the most of it is burned up. Some advocate the purchase of the steamer Improvement, thinking that she may be fitted up with pumps and in case of fire moved up and down the slough in such a manner as to protect the town effectually. Others think that a scow in the slough, with a fire engine and several feet of hose would be the thing. A bet-scheme; perhaps, is to lay water mains over the principal streets connected with the mill. The mill keeps up steam all night, and all that would be necessary in case of fire would be to connect the hose at the proper places and play the water onto the fire. This would not cost the city over \$1000 so we are told, and would give the best protection possible. It would save the people enough in insurance to pay for the outfit in a year. The insurance companies make much lower rates when there is protection against fire, besides insurance rarely covers the actual loss, and it is better to prevent fires altogether, if possible, no matter what is the cost. Something should be done at once. Why not call a meeting at an early date to discuss the matter and make provisions for protection?

and 5th.

Everybody turn out

July 4th.

One quarter mile and repeat race, for ponies owned in Tillamook at the time, fourteen hands or under, entry \$2.50, purse, \$10.00.

Second race, one half mile and repeat, entry \$5.00, purse \$40.00. One half of the entry added to the purse.

Third race, 600 yards and repeat, entry \$5.00, purse \$30.00. One half of the entrance money added. Open only to horses three years old or under.

July 5th.

First race, 600 yards and repeat, entry \$5.00, purse \$30.00. One half of the entrance money added.

Second race, single dash of a mile, entrance \$5.00, purse \$30.00. One half of the entrance money added.

Third race, single dash, one quarter mile, entrance fee \$5.00, purse \$12.00. One half of entrance money added.

Purses will be divided as follows: $\frac{2}{3}$ to the first horse and $\frac{1}{3}$ to the second.

In all races not less than 3 to enter and 2 to start.

No money given for a walk over.

Distance flag in all repeat races will be fixed at one hundred feet.

Ride catch weights.

Entries must be made with the secretary of the Tillamook Fair Association on or before eight o'clock P. M. of the day preceding the race.

Races must be run under the control of the judges appointed by the Association. The Association shall have the right to control the horse and riders and to change riders as on regulation tracks in case of any unfairness.

Oregon Stamp is three-fourths Clydesdale; was foaled May 10, 1887, bred by D. Grierson, Salem, Ore. Sire, Mass n Forward; G. Sire Merry Mason (1222, S. C. S. B. J. Dam, Bet. by Merry Mason; Grandam Bet. Lionhart and George, known as the Hubbard Mare. Oregon Stamp has taken four 1st premiums at Oregon State Fair. He is a mahogany Bay, weighs 1750, 17 hands high, gentle, shows good movement, is sure in beating colts.

Terms: \$12 to insure, for single mare, and \$10 each for 2 or more.

Payable when the mare is known to be with foal, changes hands or is taken from the owner. Can furnish pasture for mares if desired.

C. L. P. is 15 1/2 hands high and weighs 1250 lbs.; a beautiful bay with black points. He has a good clean leg, with powerful muscular development. He began developing natural trotting action at an early age, and had been handled would no doubt trot very fast. He was driven but a short time on a farm track and trotted a full mile in 2:32. His colts all show fine trotting action and a two-year old trotted last year better than 3:30. He is kind as a kitten, perfectly level-headed and pure gated.
