RIGHTS OF ASSOCIATION.

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 20.—The supreme court of the state handed down today an important decision which has a wide bearing on labor and capital alike. The Northwestern Lumbermen's Association has a rule providing that no member shall sell goods at any place at prices lower than the retail dealers. The Bohn Manufacturing Company, one of its members, was accused of violating the rule and was notified by Secretary Hollis, that a circular of warning of the fact would be sent to all members. Bohn secured an injunction restraining the secretary on the ground that such a boycott would seriously injure his business. The lower court's order was today reversed by the supreme court on the ground that the Bohn Company, being a member of the association, should have conformed to its rules. The supreme court holds anyone, unless under contract obligations, or unless his employment charges him with some public duty, has the right to refuse to work for or deal with any man or class of men he sees fit, and this right, which one man may exercise singly, any number of men may exercise jointly. In the opinion, which is very lengthy, Judge Mitchell reviews the history of the case and says it presents one phase of the subject which is likely to be one of the most important and difficult which will confront the courts during the next quarter of a century. He adds: "This is an age of associations and labor unions. Confined to their proper limits they are not only lawful but laudable. Carried beyond these limits they are liable to become dangerous agencies for wrong and oppression. Beyond what limits these combinations cannot go without interfering with legal rights of others, is the problem which the courts will doubtless be frequently called to pass upon."

A LONDON ARTICLE ON FIR.

The Timber Trade Journal, of London, England, recently published an article on fir from which we glean the following: It still adheres to obsolete names for Fir, calling it Douglas Pine, Oregon Pine and even Vancouver (B. C.) Pine. It says that Fir is now beginning to be recognized as belonging to the high class timber of Great Britain and the continent. The indications point to a large consumption in the immediate future. Irrespective of its other merits, one of its chief advantages is the enormous size, enabling deals to be cut from the logs clear of sap in any width or thickness. It costs more to lay down a cargo of Fir in the ports of the United States on the Atlantic coast, than it does in English ports. One of the great difficulties in cutting decking from small logs is the inability to get it vertical grain; this is avoided in the big Fir logs. It is merely a question of time before it becomes as common as pitch pine in the English markets. It is especially valuable as a wood to be used in ship work on account of its non-corrosiveness when it is coated with iron. Most timber when bolted to iron has what is called iron sickness, that is it corrodes, and it is necessary to rebolt in time. Fir is not so affected and will hold bolts and nails so well that it is with difficulty they are withdrawn. Fir is lighter than pitch pine, another advantage it has. All are acquainted with Fir spars, square or octagonal, which in London form a special article of trade.

The advertisement is accompanied by a map which represents Tillamook Park as being right on the bay about where Hobsonville is and having three lines of railroads, one running through from Portland to Astoria and two terminating at Tillamook.

WHERE TILLAMOOK PARK ADDITION IS.

The plat of the Tillamook Park Addition to Tillamook was filed in the county clerk's office by G. W. Allen of Portland, early in April and was recorded as being in the N W 1/4 of N E 1/4, sec 16, Tp. 3 S, R 8 W. Tillamook City is in sec. 25, Tp. 1 S, R 9 W. Thus it will be readily understood that Tillamook Park Addition is about 20 miles from this city in a direct line and instead of being on the bay, as represented on the map, is away back in the mountains and not within twenty miles of navigable water even in a direct line. Any one who buys lots in that so called Addition will have to make a journey of at least 30 miles from this city to the headwaters of Nestucca river, through a mountainous country, part of the way with no road except a mountain trail, before he finds his property. We are informed that it is very doubtful if a man could get to the land on horseback. There are no railroads near it. The prospectus is a fraud of the rankest kind and we take this first opportunity of repudiating any and all connection it represents as having with Tillamook city and harbor.

In justice to the interests of this community, and to protect those who may be tempted to invest we warn the public of the nature of the proposition. Such a scheme is more detrimental to the interests of this city than even to those who invest. The more successful the swindle, the worse effect it will have, and our citizens should take steps at once to expose it and see that its promoters are brought to justice. The community cannot afford to let this fraud go any further, but should, and in fact does, kick most vigorously against having such a rank swindle connected with it.

That Tillamook has gained some prominence as a favorable place to invest is proved by the attempt of these swindlers to make use of the name, and it behoves all parties interested in its welfare to guard watchfully against any scheme that will tend to injure this city and surrounding country.

FOREST FIRES

The law concerning fires in Oregon forests reads as follows:

Sec. 4. Any person or persons who shall wilfully set fire to any wooded country, or forest belonging to the state, or United States, or to any person or persons, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction before a court of competent jurisdiction, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars, or imprisonment not exceeding one year, or by both such fine and imprisonment; provided, that nothing herein contained shall apply to any person who in good faith sets a back fire to prevent the extension of a fire already burning.

AGONY FROM DROPPING OF WATER.

A curious experiment is said to have been made on Wednesday in a place of entertainment in Vienna. An American acrobat bet a Vienna athlete a considerable sum that he could not bear having a litre of water fall upon his hand, drop by drop, from a height of only three feet. The athlete has an enormous hand, and everybody present believed that the American must lose his bet. When 300 drops had fallen, however, the athlete's face became red and he looked as if in pain. At the four hundred and twentieth drop he gave up, saying it was impossible to bear the pain any longer. The palm of his hand was swollen and inflamed, and in one place the skin had broken open and showed the flesh. Only a small portion of the litre has gone to make up the 400 drops.

DRIVING MILCH COWS.

The other day I saw a small boy on a small black pony, driving two cows from pasture at break-neck speed. Watch the boy that drives your cows to and from the pasture. It is a miserable bad practice to run a milch cow. Of all animals, she more than another, needs to be slowly driven and kindly treated. Driving the cow at an unwonted gait will result in less milk, and the milk will decrease wonderfully in cream richness, and is liable to be poisoned by fever from the cow, brought on by undue exertion and nervous excitement. It is not safe to feed such milk to little children.—Edwin Montgomery in Hoard's Dairyman.

To offset the order that no married women can find employment in the public schools, the Seattle board has made an order to take effect September 1, that all janitors in the public school buildings of the city must be married men. The single man now employed must get married before that time or lose their job. This is defining rights and privileges with a vengeance.

In clearing a street at Silverton, Wash., recently, a party of laborers found a large cedar log over which a hemlock had grown, completely enveloping the cedar. It is estimated that the cedar is at least 400 years old. It is well preserved, and shakes split from it were as sound as if the tree had recently been felled. The hemlock is about 150 years old.—Western Lumberman.
