The Elmore came in the bay Sunday, but owing to the heavy fog on the bay was unable to come up to this city until Monday afternoon. She had several passengers including Alfred Williams, the druggist, who had been out to Portland on a business trip, and J. E. LaForce, D. D. S., dentist, who will be in the city some time doing professional work. She will go from this place to Portland this trip where she will undergo repairs and be fitted with a new propeller, and will probably not come to Tillamook for about ten days. Due notice will be given to the patrons of the boat of the time she will sail for this port.

The steamer Augusta arrived in the bay Tuesday morning after a somewhat prolonged trip. She left Astoria Sunday morning but owing to the foggy weather was unable to make the entrance to the bay with any degree of safety and Captain Schrader with his customary caution decided to keep well out to sea until the fog lifted rather than place the lives of his passengers in any jeopardy. There were a number of passengers on board who report having had an enjoyable trip after the spell of sea sickness was over. Captain Schrader made everybody as comfortable as possible his only regret being that he could not furnish a wider range of vision. The Elmore which left Astoria shortly after the Augusta was also delayed by the fog but was fortunate in being at Tillamook far when the fog raised for half an hour and gave her time to cross in.

The Forest Grove stage is making regular trips twice a week over the Wilson river road and is giving excellent service. Last Saturday the stage left Tillamook about 4:30 A. M. and reached Forest Grove in time to enable the passengers to go to Portland on the train leaving Forest Grove at 4:02 and arriving Portland about 5:50. If such service can be maintained the enterprising manager of the stage, Mr. H. D. Jones of Forest Grove will be sure to have a full load of passengers nearly every trip. How to travel from Tillamook to Portland in one day without any degree of discomfort has long been an unsolved problem to Tillamookers, but now it has been proved that with a good road over the mountains, like the Wilson river road, and a well-equipped stage line a Tillamooker can travel from his own native wilds even to the haunts of civilization between the rising and the setting sun. Success to the new stage line.

A Mrs. Williams in Portland is a religious enthusiast of a certain degree. She is a doctor without drugs. The viewers appointed to view road from Woods to Sand Lake having failed to meet on the day appointed, ordered that they meet, view and survey said road on the 26th day of July and make return to the court at its next regular term in September. Ordered that the court adjourn sine die.

Fatal Accident.

On Thursday noon an accident happened at Nehalem that resulted fatally to Captain Wagner, of the schooner Del Norte, of San Francisco. The captain was on the sidewalk near Gold's store and being somewhat under the influence of liquor he leaned or staggered against the railing, which gave way with his weight and he fell heavily on the rocks below, a distance of about ten feet. He was picked up and taken to the schooner, which was lying at the mill wharf. As he did not complain of being hurt no medical aid was then called but Friday. A dispatch was then sent calling Dr. May, of Tillamook, who immediately started for Nehalem. He found the captain so severely injured, that his assistance was of no avail and death ensued Saturday morning. As no arrangements could be made to embalm the body for shipment to San Francisco, it was buried at Nehalem Sunday afternoon but will probably be taken up and shipped to San Francisco at some future time. The deceased leaves a widow and family one of whom is first nurse on the Del Norte. The Del Norte has made several trips to Nehalem this summer and Captain Wagner had made many friends in that part of the country, who were shocked to hear of his untimely death, and all extend their sympathy to the bereaved family. Louis Wagner, mate of the schooner will take charge of the boat on her trip to San Francisco.

The Telegraph Line.

Mr. W. S. Ronyon now has charge of the telegraph line, the lease to R. C. Turner having been cancelled. During the past week the line has been damaged by timber fires in the mountains. It is a very difficult matter to keep this line in working order as it runs through a heavily timbered country for over forty miles and is continually liable to breakage by falling trees and limbs, land slides, and other accidents usual in such a country. This makes the expense of keeping the line up very heavy and it is to be hoped that the efforts to make the line as serviceable as possible will be encouraged by a proportionate increase of patronage. The methods used by the promoters of the line and the manner in which they conducted the business were very unsatisfactory to all concerned, the patrons not getting as good service as they should have had and the employees working under great disadvantages. It is not necessary to enlarge on the advantages of having telegraphic communication with the outside world, they are obvious to any but the most confirmed misanthropes, suffice it to say that the best way to secure reliable service and cheaper rates is to extend encouragement in the shape of liberal patronage.

Brought Back.

Among the passengers on the steamer Augusta was Bertha Hiatt, toe young girl who was induced to go out over the mountains in company with a member of a traveling show. It appears that when Mr. C. E. Reynolds was in Portland he chanced to see the girl on the streets when she expressed herself as being very anxious to get back to Tillamook. The dazzling expectations of city life had proved to be without any substantial foundation and she was wandering about without any clear idea as to where she was or what to do. She was even uncertain as to where her room was. She states that the fellow who took her out represented that he had plenty of money and that in a short time he would send for her folks so they could all be together. This story found favor with the mother, who, according to the girl's own story endorsed the fellow's proposition that she should go out to Portland with him. Then the usual course of events followed, and in a few days her companion disappeared and the girl was left to do as best she could for herself. In the course of her wanderings she met Mr. Reynolds and told him of her position. Mr. Reynolds kindly interested himself in her behalf and took her to the steamer Augusta where he represented the case to Captain Schrader. The captain, with his characteristic generosity immediately offered her a passage to Tillamook on his boat, which was then about ready to depart, and from that time her troubles were over. Mr. Reynolds now regrets that he did not take her to the Boy's and Girl's Aid Society or some such institution in Portland and interest the authorities in her behalf, which would perhaps have been more beneficial for the girl than to bring her back to Tillamook among her old associates. What they are has been the subject of public comment for some time, and it is perfectly evident that the mother is far from being a fit custodian of her children. It would be a good thing for the city if the authorities investigate the matter and see if something cannot be done to place the children where they will be under better influence.

Murder near Astoria.

Mrs. Carolina Hanson was murdered in a patch of raspberry bushes near her home Wednesday evening. She was found face down, her skull crushed in, and the head resting in a pool of blood, which was still warm. She was a quiet, good old woman, against whom no mortal could be expected to hold either enmity or jealousy; and neither lost nor gain could have incited her slayer to the dreadful deed. The scene of the murder was the family residence on Bear Creek, 10 miles from the city. There were no tramps or desperate characters about, and the evidence at the corner's inquest is conclusive that her killing simply amounted to wanton murder.
Her husband, John Hanson, was arrested on suspicion and placed in jail at Astoria. He afterwards confessed to the crime but gave no reason for committing the awful deed.

It has been a very happy one, because they are two men everybody has confidence in. The examiner will be at the Oregon National himself, making that bank his headquarters.
