The "Frisco Store" will take any amount of good solid packed butter or pickled pork and pay the highest market price for same.

The electric light company have been busy this week fixing up their wires and switches. Louis Johnson does the chumming.

The Augusta sailed with about two tons of creamery butter for Mark Cohn & Co., Portland, who are now handling all their output.

Many farmers would be willing to pay 75 cents a day and board to men who will do steady work slashing and clearing land.

The dance last night at The Alderman was well attended and everybody had a good time. Dave Hadley was master of ceremonies.

J. H. Jackson is doing very well considering the serious nature of his injuries. Mr. Jackson's many friends will be glad to hear this.

The Elmore went to Siuslaw with supplies and fishermen for the canyery at that place instead of making her regular trip to Tillamook.

The Augusta was on the beach at Garibaldi Wednesday. She ran into a net and had to go on the beach to have her propeller cleared.

The Eastern Star Lodge will give an entertainment in the skating rink next Thursday night, August 31. A good time is assured everyone.

Captain Symons, of the U. S. Engineer Department arrived in the city yesterday and is staying at The Alderman. He will inspect the work at Dry Stocking bar.

The Harrison arrived in Nehalem Saturday with goods for the merchants and loggers there. She will tow out the Eureka as soon as that schooner is loaded.

The Truckee sailed for San Francisco Friday evening, taking a full load of lumber from Holstonville. She brought in considerable freight for Tillamook this trip.

This is a good time to burn slashing, and the smoke that hangs between here and the mountains shows that many ranchers are taking the opportunity to clear up land.

Cohn & Co. will begin next Monday to enlarge their present store and have a separate boot and shoe department, which will be stocked with the largest assortment this side of Portland.

Judge Bellinger in Portland rendered a decision Tuesday in the "quadrant land case," upholding the former decision declaring the land forfeited. The railroad company will again appeal the case.

The special term of school conducted by Mr. Freas is very successful. More pupils attend than were expected and extra seats had to be carried in. The directors have engaged Mr. Freas to teach the next regular term.

The band boys will have an excursion to Netarts Sunday. A wagon and four-horse team has been chartered for the use of the band and about all the rigs in town are already engaged to carry their friends.

The Mystic Entertainment of Prof. Stinson did not draw a very large crowd Friday night, and Saturday night the audience was so small that no attempt was made to carry on the performance. It must be hard times.

T. J. Lucy, of Woods, was in this city last week. He reports Woods prospering, and says there are a large number of campers on the beach near there this year. A sidewalk has been built from the town to the beach.

The Augusta came in Saturday with a cargo of freight and a few passengers. Capt. Schrader made a quick trip as he only left Tillamook Monday evening. After unloading the steamer sailed for Portland Tuesday afternoon.

Some miscreant is again rousing the ire of our citizens by poisoning cats. Several of these animals that were highly prized by their owners have been destroyed, and it will go hard with the guilty one if he can be detected.

We are in receipt of a circular letter from the Oregon School for Deaf Mutes stating that the school will re-open for the next regular term Wednesday, Sept. 13. Parents are requested to return pupils promptly on the opening day.

The saw mills at Bay City have run steadily for some months, and the prospects of that place are brightening up notwithstanding the dull times. The merchants there are doing a better business than they have for some time.

The state school appropriation which should be distributed to the various counties the first of August, has, for some unknown reason, not yet been distributed. A thousand dollars spent in this county at the present time would be a material help in relieving the prevailing stringency.

The Hook and Ladder Company have received a number of communications from parties desiring to sell fire engines, and George Cohn examined a large hand engine when he was in Portland. A meeting of the company will be held to decide what steps will be taken in the matter.

The Elmore towed seven fish boats from Astoria yesterday, but after crossing the Tillamook bar the tow line broke and four of them were carried out to sea by the tide. It was reported they drifted ashore at Cape Meares and will be hauled over the sand spit and launched in the bay. No damage was done.

Work on Dry Stocking bar is nearly completed and considerable work has been done at Junction. After about 250 more piling have been driven the driver will be laid off until it is ascertained how far the appropriation will go. A greater part of the piling cut near Bay City was rejected on being delivered at the works.

The Elmore cannery is now in operation. There are 22 home boats and 13 from the Columbia engaged in fishing and the average catch so far is from 10 to 15 fish to the boat. It is expected the catch next week will be larger as there is so much phosphorus in the water at present. The fish are all very fine and large. W. W. Ridehalgh is again in charge of the cannery.

Captain Schrader and Claude Thayer succeeded in raising \$136 for the purpose of cleaning the snags out of the Hoquartion Slough. Captain Schrader will have charge of the work which will probably be done with the pile driver as soon as work at Junction bar is completed. This work is greatly needed and the amount raised is enough to do it effectively.

Garibaldi presents a lively appearance again. The cannery began operation Saturday. Mrs. Bosley keeps the mess house in the Gallon building, and Chas. T. Hill has opened a hotel in the Anderson house. Capt. Richardson has moved into his building, and Peter Byron will open the Bay View house for the benefit of the traveling public. Mr. Parks, the storekeeper, is doing a good business in his line. The saloon was discontinued some time ago.

Mr. Gustaf Wilson, while on the beach a mile or two above Tillamook bar, a few days ago, picked up a bottle, half buried in the sand, containing a note written 19 years ago. It was tossed from the ship Roslyn Castle, and the note was evidently written by the captain in an idle moment. It stated that the Roslyn Castle was bound from Otago, New Zealand, to Portland; that it had been a dead calm for 24 hours, and that the ship was no nearer her port than eight days previously, and that Oregon should be a land flowing with milk and honey, as it was so hard to reach. British Vice Consul Laidlaw, on being shown the note, said the ship arrived here in October, 1874, and that the writing corresponded with that of her captain in his possession. The ship is now at Tahiti and under the flag of that island.—Oregonian.

On Saturday a sheriff's jury was occupied in hearing the case of W. D. Stillwell vs. S. A. Roberts et al. The case was virtually to protect the sheriff in attaching the hardware of N. P. Roberts on notes held by Capt. Stillwell against S. A. Roberts, who, some time ago transferred the business to N. P. Roberts. Capt. Stillwell claimed this transaction was not bonafide, but that it was made merely to defraud the creditors. The jury brought in a verdict to the effect that S. A. Roberts is still owner of the store.

B. C. Lamb, Tuttle & Robeson and Alfred Williams employed George and Johnny Day to dig a hole under the sidewalk in front of Lamb's store. By the aid of two conspicuous sign-boards, three small boys and his own well-known persuasive eloquence Mr. Lamb succeeded in convincing the passers-by that in due course of time the hole would be a well, that it would probably be twenty-five feet deep, that a powerful pump and 150 feet of hose would be put in, and that the public would be at liberty to make free use of the water to damp the enthusiasm of a fire or the band boys who practice after 10 o'clock at night.

On Friday last Rev. H. B. Morgan was severely injured by falling from the roller way between the mill and the wharf. Mr. Morgan and Mr. Olmstead, book-keeper at the Dry Stocking works, were taking some lumber from the mill to the wharf when some means the lumber ran off the track and crowded them off the trestle work. Mr. Morgan fell heavily to the ground about 12 feet below and though he succeeded in walking part of the way, he finally gave out and had to be taken home in a buggy, and has since been confined to his bed. Mr. Olmstead caught one of his legs in a brace and hung there for a while until assistance came, fortunately sustaining no serious injury.

Among the passengers on the Augusta yesterday were Bertha B. Hiatt, aged 14, Ada Hiatt, aged 9, and Lizzie Hiatt, aged 7 years, who were on their way to Portland where they will be taken care of by the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society. Judge I. T. Manly, with his characteristic kind-heartedness has for some time been corresponding with this society whose object is to care for fatherless and destitute children until suitable homes can be found for them, and at length succeeded in interesting them in behalf of this family. The county court pays the cost of their transportation to Portland, and Capt. Schrader kindly consented to see to their safe arrival at their destination.

The Russian Jews have acquired a large body of land in Clackamas county and will buy more. They own a half section of the Wm. Potter claim; a half section of the J. H. Moore claim; about 200 acres of the Wm. Fordyce claim; the Orr Cutting place of a half section, and south of the Fordyce claim of half section. Most of this land has been cut up into small holdings on which Jewish families are located. A millionaire named Schlorina Kritzewsky is expected to bring about 250 families of his co-religionists from Russia to this country, with the object of permanent settlement. They are not paupers but of the middle class, being thrifty and having some means. These already located intend to build a synagogue next summer, in which they will no doubt be financially assisted by their Portland friends.—Oregonian.

For the past week Mrs. Helen A. Harbord has been delivering temperance lectures in the M. E. Church. The meetings were well attended. In connection with these meetings an entertainment was given last evening in the skating rink that was enjoyed by all who attended it either as participant or spectator. The band generously gave their services and furnished excellent music. The entertainment opened with a grand march and was followed by "Milkmaid's Convention." This was very amusing and brought forth some decidedly original methods of caring for cows, milk and butter. The entertainment closed with a song by the milkmaids. After this a large number partook of coffee and cake that was furnished by the milkmaids at a very small charge, and a pleasant hour was spent in a social manner. Considering that only two days were taken to prepare the entertainment it was very successful.

Nehalem beach is truly a fine place. A person passing along the coast in a steamer would not notice that there is a beach at all, or anything but a range of wooded hills for the shore line. However, driving over the hill from Garibaldi, a beautiful stretch of sand beach, nine miles long, and averaging half a mile in width is brought to view. This makes a fine drive, and bathing, fishing etc., are excellent. But the peculiar and remarkable thing about this beach is that a person might drive up and down it for many times and never suspect that it was inhabited from Bar View House to the mouth of Nehalem. The beach rises gradually for a few hundred yards all along, and terminates in a sand ridge. This ridge is covered with pines or spruces and appears to be the limit of accessible country. The fringe of woods on this sand ridge, which is pretty near straight for several miles, appears to join into the mountains, and the passer-by would not dream that there was anything but jungles and canyons behind. But climb up the ridge and take a look! There you see a beautiful valley all along the base of the mountains behind the ridge. In some places it is wooded, and in other places there are beautiful little prairies. There

is a chain of lakes, the whole distance of this queer depression, and some of them are very beautiful and teeming with trout. One lake is over a half a mile wide. This land is all taken and occupied, and being effectively sheltered from the winds, makes pleasant and romantic homes, besides being very productive soil. The valley is from one mile to two miles wide. As the winds drift the white sands on the outside, all signs of paths or wagon tracks crossing the ridge are obliterated and this adds to the deception. Those who have not paid Nehalem beach a visit should do so.

HILLSBORO, Aug. 11.—Representative Keady, of Multnomah county, has been here for the past two days, in the interest of the Portland & Hillsboro Railroad Company. This company's organization was completed last Monday and the company proposes building and operating an electric railroad between Portland and Hillsboro for carrying passengers and general freight.—Statesman.

The establishment of such a road as the above to Hillsboro and Forest Grove would mean eventually a line connecting Tillamook directly with Portland. Across the Wilson river route the very streams which are now so expensive an obstruction would supply the necessary water power to develop the electricity needed on the line. It would be difficult to estimate the number of pleasure seekers which would make use of such a line. Not only during the summer but in those months of the year when sportsmen are eagerly seeking shooting grounds.

Lieutenant Charles Nelson, of Portland, a member of Company A, 1st regiment O. N. G., was shot in the back in a sham battle at Camp Compton last Saturday and died Sunday afternoon. After death it was found that a wad from a blank cartridge had hit Nelson with such force as to break two bones of the vertebra. He was buried with military honors Wednesday.

Mr. Sharp, special pension examiner, was at The Alderman Tuesday evening. He examined one or two cases and went away early Wednesday morning, but will return in ten days. From the searching nature of his examinations it is expected several pensions will be stopped.

The Creameries.

Some surprise is expressed at the condition of the finances of the people of this county in such a troublous time. Our prosperous condition is due to the fact that the mills have continued operation and the sales of beef cattle throughout the county and in no small extent the creameries now in operation in Tillamook city. Where formerly no farmer realized on his butter until the winter or next spring the patrons of the creamery are now receiving cash monthly to a considerable amount. The prices paid by the creamery enable the farmers to realize more on the butter than if they made their own.

The Fairview creamery has been shipping considerable butter at fair prices, and is fast making a reputation in the Portland market. At first they only shipped 300 lbs. each trip of the Elmore, this was increased to 500 lbs., and last week instructions were received from Mark L. Cohn & Co. to ship larger amounts as they were getting short. This is very encouraging to the enterprising farmers who are operating that creamery. The creameries are proving a vast benefit in another and a permanent way. Land owners are appreciating the direct profit of each additional patch of grass land. The consequence is earnest effort to clean out corners, old stumps and brush heaps and scatter grass seed in areas.

Wilson River Road.

At the meeting of the creditors of the Wilson river toll road held in Orr Nolan's office Tuesday afternoon a contract was awarded to W. S. Runyon to build two bridges on that road, one at the Jordan, and one across the Wilson river near Walt Smith's. The price for the Jordan bridge was \$250 cash, and the Wilson river bridge \$750 to be paid from receipts of the road. Work will be commenced on Monday next with a crew of eight men.

Grout & Woods, of Bay City, put in a bid of \$1937 for both bridges and A. G. Anderson put in a bid to build the Jordan bridge for \$400. The lumber for the Jordan bridge is already on the ground.

A new Buoy.

If the government would now send the Manzanita or Columbine to place a few buoys, one of which should be a whistling buoy, on the bar it would be a great benefit to this harbor. As it is now with only one buoy at the bar, vessels have to wait outside so sometimes several days until the fog clears off. There are plenty of buoys on the dock at Astoria that would be of much more use if they were placed on the different bars along the coast.
