STILL GRINDING.

DISCUSSION OF THE REPEAL STILL INTERESTS THE SENATE.

A possibility of another International Monetary Conference.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—When the repeal bill was taken up, Voorhees asked the unanimous consent for the general debate to close on the 25th inst. The amendment will be debated until the 27th under the five minute rule. Teller objected, Allison, republican, addressed the senate on the bill.

In his speech Allison said the United States could not continue to purchase silver without seriously endangering the standard established in 1873, and bringing the nation to a silver standard. The Brussels had made more progress respecting the solution of the silver question than had been made at all prior conferences. If the United States would undertake the policy of restoring silver by international arrangement, it would be accomplished within a reasonable time. The parity between the two metals would be restored and silver would practically be rehabilitated. That was the solution of the question.

George, of Mississippi, asked whether there was any sentiment in Europe in favor of the reassembling of the monetary conference. Allison had no doubt that the public opinion of Europe was that the conference of nations should be assembled to deal with the question, and in that statement he did not exclude England. He believed if patience were exercised; if the question were dealt with in a statesmanlike way; if the senators would dismiss from their minds prejudices and party leanings and deal with the problem as a great question involving the whole country, its integrity and its interests, the time would soon come when silver and gold would travel side by side.

A Curious Complication.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 14.—Judge Morrow this morning denied bail to the five Los Angeles Chinese now here awaiting the decision of the United States supreme court on their appeal from the district court's decision denying them writs of habeas corpus. This makes a curious complication. The Chinese are at present confined in the Alameda county jail, though according to Judge Ross' decision they cannot be imprisoned, as they have committed no crime. They cannot be deported because of their appeal. The Chinese will bring suit against Marshal Gard for false imprisonment. If he releases them he will be guilty of contempt of court of the northern district of California, which has refused them bail. If he does not release them he is liable for damages, on the ruling of the district court of southern California that they are not criminals and cannot be imprisoned.

Charges of Fraud.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—John Swope, of Pennsylvania, one of the stock holders of the Northern Pacific Railroad company, on behalf of himself and other stockholders has begun on action in the supreme court against Henry Villard, Charles L. Colby, Colgate Hoyt, and Edwin H. Abbott of the Northern Pacific railroad, Thomas F. Oakes, Henry C. Payne, its receivers, and the Chicago and Northern Pacific Railroad company to make restitution of the millions of dollars which, it is alleged, the company was deprived of by means of fraud.

County Judges in Hiding.

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 14.—The county judges of Dallas county, Missouri, following the precedent set by their predecessors in their own county, and by the St. Clair county judges, refuse to issue a tax levy to pay bonds of the county, amounting with interest to \$500,000, pledged in the aid of a railroad that was never built, which levy was ordered by United States Judge Phillips. Two of the judges are now hiding in the brush, seeking to escape United States deputy marshals.

Oregon Stage Robbed.

KLAMATH FALLS, Sept. 13.—The highwayman, who held up the Ayer stage Sunday afternoon, stopped the same stage yesterday. He relieved two Chinese passengers of \$90 and returned to the driver two pension drafts, part of the spoils of his first adventure. The express box and mail pouch he left untouched this time.

Religious Intolerance.

WALLA WALLA, Sept. 13.—A sensation was caused at the Catholic cemetery today by the attempt of Father Flohr to prevent the burial of George Thomas recently found in the Spokane river, on the ground that he was not entitled to christian burial because he committed suicide and was not a communicant of the church. Father Flohr consented to

the burial on the condition that no religious services be performed. Hearing that a protestant clergyman had been invited to conduct the services Father Flohr appeared at the grave upon the arrival of the corps and attempted to fill it up. A brother of the deceased took the shovel from him and insisted on the right to bury the remains in the family plot. The priest finally yielded on condition that the body should be exhumed if so ordered by the bishop.

A Grateful Barber.

Down in South Minneapolis there is a barber named Hans. The other day he found himself a victim of financial depression and seemed on the eve of a crisis. He was able, however, to borrow \$2 from his friend, the shoemaker, and with this financial assistance he tided over his difficulties. His gratitude to his friend, the shoemaker, knew no bounds, and he was scarce able to find words in which to express his obligation. "Johan," he cried, "Oh, mein Johan, if ever your fader and moder die, if ever you are hungry or haven't anything to wear, just come to me, Johan, and I will shave you for nothing."

Forest Fires.

Terrible forest fires are raging in Northern Wisconsin, extending from Shawano, Lincoln and Portage counties on the South to Lake Superior on the north, and westward from Marinette and Oconto counties to Sawyer, Barron and Chippewa counties.

Millions of dollars worth of property has been destroyed and hundreds of settlers have been rendered homeless. It is also believed that many persons have perished. Railroad bridges and telegraph lines have been destroyed on the Wisconsin Central road and in many places trainmen have to bandage their faces while running through the burning districts. Many small towns have been destroyed and it is impossible to estimate the loss at present.

Revolution in Brazil.

Revolution has broken out in Brazil and the insurgents have bombarded Rio. Great anxiety is expressed among officials at Washington concerning the safety of the lives and property of American citizens. The cruiser Charleston put into Montevideo, Uruguay, and after coaling, which will take a day, she will immediately proceed to Rio, about 3½ days distant. The Detroit has left Hampton Roads for the scene of action. A number of people have been killed including an Italian sailor for whom an indemnity of \$5000 was paid. The president and troops were driven out of Rio Janeiro and are now encamped about 12 m. from the city. The insurgents are being reinforced from all sides and are confident of success.

Standard Oil Trust.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—The Standard Oil trust has been dissolved. Certificates amounting to \$59,210,000, 62 per cent., have been turned in. It is charged that all of the twenty concerns in the trust still remain under the control of a few persons who directed its affairs and as long as such condition of affairs exists, the result will be the same as when it was operated by a board of trustees.

A School Director Knocked Out.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 14.—At a meeting of the board of education last night, Director Dowling struck Dr. Decker, another director, under the ear with his fist, knocking him to the floor. The meeting was hastily adjourned.

The Cholera in England.

LONDON, Sept. 13.—There was another death last night from cholera at the port of Grimsby, and today another death from the disease is reported from Hull.
