ANOTHER PHASE

SILVERITES AND MANUFACTURERS POOL ISSUES.

To Defeat the Tariff Bill and have Free Silver.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—The speech of Senator Cameron in favor of free coinage of silver continues to attract attention here, not only because it is a startling and unusual attitude for a republican senator from an eastern state to take, but also because of events that are crowding on the heels of that speech in Pennsylvania. At a meeting of the republican league at Reading yesterday an attempt to censure Senator Cameron for his course was defeated by a two-thirds majority.

Explanation of the failure to censure Cameron and, indeed, of the attitude he has taken, is furnished by intelligence that has reached here to the effect that some members of the Manufacturers club of Philadelphia are engaged in circulating a petition to the senate looking to consolidation of the interest of protectionists and free silverites, many signatures being procured. The scheme is to defeat the new tariff bill and give to silver; first—free coinage upon payment by owners of seigniorage absorbing three-fourths of the difference between market (London) price of bullion and its coined value; second—prohibition of importation of foreign silver for coinage purposes except as a seigniorage that will absorb all the difference between the market price and mint value; and third—an international monetary conference, including all nations of the world except the old monometallist countries, for the purpose of arriving at an international agreement.

The scheme is to unite the interests of silver and protection and by this means to prevent adverse tariff legislation and secure more liberal silver legislation. But its successful operation would mean the breaking down of party lines, perhaps, and entire readjustment of party policies.

Lessons in Courtesy.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—The lie passed at the opening session of the house this morning between Morse of Massachusetts and Fithian of Illinois. Morse in a brief speech attempted to justify his course in filibustering yesterday. He charged Fithian with being solely responsible for the refusal of the house to permit him to print in the Record newspaper extracts attacking Pension Commissioner Lochren. Fithian replying, said that Morse had endeavored to induce him (Fithian) to withdraw his objection to printing by coming to him and intimating that he (Morse) would, as a member of the committee on buildings and grounds, help Fithian get through any public building bill in which he might be interested. "That is absolutely false," shouted Morse, striding menacingly toward Fithian.

"If the gentleman from Massachusetts denies the statement, I have proof that will satisfy any member of the house. My colleague Goldzier heard the conversation," retorted Fithian.

Morse backed against the rail and replied meekly: "What the gentleman says has the color of truth" (laughter) "but the construction he places on it is unqualifiedly false."

"If the gentleman denies my statement," yelled Fithian, shaking his fist angrily at the Massachusetts man, "he is willfully lying himself."

The house was then in an uproar. The speaker pounded vigorously for order, declaring both out of order. This closed the incident and the debate on the bill to repeal the federal election laws was resumed.

The Gilmour Tragedy.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 28.—The discomfiture of the police at the marriage of Dr. West and Miss Staley, and the consequent suppression of her testimony has set the police hunting for a woman whom, it is claimed, Dr. West previously married and a divorce from whom is not on record. It is learned that of two children born to the doctor by the Kennedy woman one went East some years ago. It is believed the money West drew from the Safe Deposit belonged to this child. Added interest is lent to the case by the story of Mrs. Dr. Wenzel, who says the Dr. for a long time had been dosing his supposed wife with opium in the hope of sending her to the lunatic asylum. He was one time heard to say to a female caller, now thought to be Miss Staley, his contract wife, "Oh, never mind her. I'll have her in an asylum pretty soon." He was then warned by the doctor's daughter that if any ill befell his wife he would denounce him. The fact that Mrs. Kennedy disappeared coupled with the further remark of the doctor when told a woman belonging to a female had been found in his yard

is taken as significant. The doctor then said: "Oh, you'll find the whole skeleton next." "Little Jack" McGrury arrived from Los Angeles this morning and is stopping in Oakland. He was brought up as a witness for Dr. West. McGrury is not in custody. He admits he was intimate with Miss Gilmour, but did not know he was responsible for her condition.

Mine-Owners Justify Themselves.

LONDON, Sept. 28.—The federation of mine-owners have published a manifesto concerning their attitude to strikers and strikers' committees. In it the mine-owners justify themselves for the reduction of 25 per cent. in miners' wages, and refuse to discuss any compromise measures with the men. The arbitration which has been suggested by many disinterested persons is rejected. The mine-owners adduce figures to show that the cost of labor is two-thirds to three-quarters of the total cost of raising coal, and argue from this basis to prove that in times of depression like the present they must reduce wages or do business at a loss. The last words of the manifesto are: "When the miners' representatives shall be armed with full power to negotiate the owners' committee will be ready to meet them. The owners can do no more."

Prizefighters sent up.

PORTLAND, Sept. 28.—Seven prizefighters have admitted their guilt in the criminal court and were fined \$1000 each. They were William Mahan, Dudley Evans, Frank Kelley, Joseph Bertrand, L. Flaherty, principals, aiders and abettors in the fight between Mahan and Dudley Evans, which took place in the Park theater last month. All were released on bail. In passing sentence Judge Munly said that he would be lenient, as this was their first offense. Nine prizefighters and participants in prizefights are now under sentence of \$1000 or one year in the penitentiary. Dudley Evans and Frank Kelley are under sentence of \$2000 or two years imprisonment. It is doubtful if more than one or two will be able to pay their fines. P. F. Ryan, the last of the pugilists, is still in the county jail.

The News from Rio.

PARIS, Sept. 28.—A private cable from Rio Janeiro, from an American source, denies that the rebel warships were silenced by the fire of the forts. He declares the position of the rebel ships was such the forts could not reply without peril of damaging Rio, and that the forts' ammunition was so reduced they were compelled to reserve what little munitions they have to repel the attack on the forts themselves. He asserts that all dispatches so far have been colored, either in behalf of the government or the rebels. The only hope for Rio is in the intervention of the foreign warships. Great Britain has cabled its representative for facts, and on this report will depend the action of the British war vessels there.

The Astoria Murder.

ASTORIA, Ore., Sept. 28.—John Hanson was found guilty at midnight tonight of the wilful murder of his wife, Carolina Hanson. The jury was out for an hour. The courtroom was packed to the doors all day, and while the case for the defense was one of the weakest that has ever been pleaded, Senator Fulton made the most of it and lost no chances. The defense set up was "chronic alcoholism," and a good deal of medical testimony was introduced to prove that Hanson committed the crime while suffering from that disease. Judge McBride will reserve the sentence until next Wednesday, and before that time the defendant's attorneys will move for a new trial.

Sheep poisoned by Hundreds.

BOISE, Idaho, Sept. 28.—The Idaho Wool-growers' Association has offered a reward of \$500 for the arrest and conviction of the person or persons who have been poisoning a large number of sheep of late in Owyhee county, or who hereafter distribute poison on the range. The state will probably add to the reward. Hundreds of sheep have been killed by eating saltpetre or a mixture of salt and strychnine sprinkled over the ranges. The sheepmen charge the cattlemen with the wholesale poisoning.

White Caps in Arkansas.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Sept. 28.—White-caps are terrorizing the farmers of southwest Arkansas. What is supposed to be the same gang that threatened to burn all the gins in Missouri and north Louisiana where the farmers persisted in ginning and selling cotton is now in this state, and it is said many threatening letters have been posted in Union, Miller and Lafayette counties. They all warn the farmers not to gin and sell their cotton at present prices, else their machinery will be destroyed. The farmers are preparing for any emergency.
