MORE WIND

ANOTHER AMENDMENT OFFERED TO THE REPEAL.

Senator Blackburn wants the Seigniorage Sold for Gold.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—In the senate today Blackburn, of Kentucky, submitted an amendment to the bill repealing the silver purchasing clause of the act of 1890. It strikes out the Voorhees substitute, leaving the bill as it passed the house, and then provides for free coinage of silver of American production. The secretary of the treasury is authorized on the first day of each month to establish seigniorage to be charged for the following month, which is to be the difference between the market price of silver bullion and the value after coinage. This seigniorage is not to be coined but to be sold by the secretary of the treasury for gold to be used for the purpose of maintaining the parity of gold and silver.

Near the North Pole.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 3.—The steamer Jeanie, the tender of the Arctic whaling fleet, which arrived from Hershel islands yesterday, brings news that Captain Potter, of the steam whaler Newport, reached 84 deg., north latitude, the most northerly point ever reached by man. The Newport wintered at Hershel islands, and this summer, aided by the open sea, which was particularly free from ice, worked her way north while in pursuit of whales to 84 deg., within six degrees of the north pole. There the trip was stopped by ice, but it is the opinion that had the Newport been supplied with dogs and sledges, the north pole could easily have been reached by traveling over the ice. The Newport left San Francisco in the spring of 1892, wintered at Hershel islands, which is 69 deg. 50 min. north, and on the 14th of July 1893 started northward after whales. She proceeded to Cape Bathurst and cruised along the edge of the ice past Prince Patrick island and then north. The Newport was formerly a coasting steamer and registers only 218 tons. As a reward for her captain's daring in going so far north, she took 25 whales. The Greeley expedition, which in 1882 reached 83 deg. 20 min., has up to this year held the record for penetrating the nearest the north pole. The Newport will spend this winter at Hershel island with the rest of the whaling fleet.

A Lover's Crime.

JAMESTOWN, Ind., Oct. 5.—Oscar Darnell took Miss Lizzie Manner out for a buggy ride Tuesday evening. He proposed to go to another place and get married. They drove to Lebanon, but the girl did not want to marry unless her parents were willing. They started to return home and reached a point one mile from Jamestown; still she refused to marry him unless the ceremony could be performed at home. He drew his gun and shot her in the mouth. After the shooting he cut her throat and dragged her to a strawstack in a field. Here he tried to revive her, but she remained unconscious, and he carried her to a house close by and awoke the family. Darnell returned to the strawpile after a doctor had arrived and shot himself. He was lying dead when found. The girl is still alive and revived enough to tell what is known of the case.

The Storm-King's Work.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 5.—The storm horror continues to grow in the frightful loss of life and property hour by hour as reports come in, though it is believed that approximately the full details are now at hand. In Point a la Hache county the death list is swollen to 80, with a prospect of reaching hundred before all are heard from. At Shell beach and St. Malo island the loss is about thirty. In Mississippi sound and vicinity probably a score are reported. Chantouler island was swept away, with a great loss of life and property. The loss of life in Cook Bayou country will approximate 200. The country is swept clean of houses, and scores of fishing smacks were destroyed. The news from Grand Isle this morning places the loss of life there not above twenty-five, all negroes; property damage \$100,000. At Cheniere the population was about 1400 and the loss of life is 900 to 1000. Seventy-two were drowned in the Chinese camps on Bayou Senet and Bayou Andre. It is estimated the aggregate loss of life in the storm is between 1500 and 2000. The property loss is several millions. There were 200 or 400 fishing craft, of which half were wrecked. This cripples the oyster industry, and an oyster famine for a time in this city is looked for. Fifty-seven bodies were found in the vicinity of Grand Prairie, and at the old quarantine station at Payou du Font ten more were drowned. Coffins are out of ques-

tion, and the unidentified are buried in trenches. The suffering of the survivors is being relieved as much as possible and a second shipment of supplies was sent this morning. Dead bodies are floating around on every side. The situation is unparalleled in the history of the South.

Train-Robbers Caught.

TACOMA, Oct. 5.—The last one of the Northern Pacific train robbers was captured this morning near Kalispell, Mont. Four robbers were taken and a fifth man was with them. One robber, John Chipman, was killed. The captured men are: Charles Jones, alias Kincaid, wounded; Ben Hall, alias Ben Mattocks, shot through the thigh and not expected to live; and Charles Brown. The name of the man caught with the robbers is unknown. The report to Assistant General Superintendent Dickinson says the men were taken to Kalispell this afternoon and from there will be taken to Livingston for trial. The bandits can be tried on three charges—robbery, murder of two of the posse and robbing a United States mail train. The captors will get the \$3000 reward.

Immense Lumber Raft Built.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 5.—On the next trip of the steamer National City to this port from Coos Bay she will probably have in tow one of the largest cigar shaped rafts that has ever come to this city. The raft is 625 feet in length, with a beam of 45 feet and draws 16 feet of water. There are 3515 piles in the raft, aggregating 4,100,000 feet of lumber. The raft has already been constructed and is ready to be towed here, but as the draught of water on the bar would not permit the raft being brought over, high water is waited for. The raft is consigned to San Francisco Bridge Company. It is not likely that a second raft of the same dimensions will be built, as there is too much difficulty in bringing it here.

Popular Mrs. Dolph.

Popular Mrs. Dolph, wife of the Senator from Oregon, is said to be one of the most popular women in Washington society. Although she is middle-aged, and has a son and daughter married, she retains much of the beauty which made her a belle on the Oregon farm where Senator Dolph met her. Her black hair is unstreaked with gray, her dark eyes have the brightness of youth, and her whole face sparkles with life and energy to which years have only given greater depth and graciousness. Altogether, she is in appearance and manner, just what every patriotic American citizen thinks all middle-aged American women should be.—Detroit Free Press.

Sailors Lost Money.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 6.—Creditors of the sailors of the United States steamship Corwin are indignant at their impetuous condition. It returned from a long cruise in the Arctic a few days ago. Owing to the heavy gambling which prevailed on the cruise, men returned to this port without available funds. The boatswain, whose duty it was to suppress gambling, was the only man of means, he having won all the wages coming to the men.

Big Order for Postal Cards.

FIRMINGHAM, Conn., Oct. 5.—Although ex-Senator Daggett's postal card contract expired Oct. 1, an order for 120,000,000 postal cards was received at the factory yesterday. The third assistant postmaster general came here the other day from Castleton, where he had inspected the plant of the new contractors, Woolworth & Graham. It is said that all the samples submitted by them have been rejected.

A Northwest Coast Fair.

TACOMA, Oct. 5.—A movement has been successfully started to hold a general Northwest coast fair in this city during the month of August, September and October next year. All the coast states and Idaho, Nevada, Montana, Alaska and British Columbia will be invited to participate. The buildings of the exposition here are to be enlarged for the purpose. Subscriptions to a fund have already been made.

Cascade Forest Reserve.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—President Cleveland has signed the proclamation setting apart a large tract of land as a forest reservation, under the act of March 3, '91. The reservation will be known as the "Cascades forest reservation." It extends from the Columbia river 200 miles southward, about 20 miles in width, taking in the Cascade range. Hereafter no settlement will be allowed within its boundaries.

Queen of the Ocean.

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—The steamship Lucania arrived from Queenstown tonight, making the passage time 5 days 13 hours and 25 minutes which completely eclipses all former records and makes the Lucania undisputed queen of the ocean.

GARNERED IN.

BY THE HAND THAT RULES THE SCISSORS.

Salt blown from the ocean during the recent hurricane has destroyed trees and plants about Niantic, Conn.

The mink is one of the most cunning of animals, and will steal fish and game from hunters for its own use.

The sun throws vertical rays on the earth's surface only upon an area equal to about thirty-five square miles at any one time.

The Victoria Railway bridge over the St. Lawrence at Montreal, Canada, contains 3,000,000 cubic feet of masonry work and 10,500 tons of iron.

The first notice of the use of coal is in the records of the Abbey of Peterborough, England, in the year 850, which mention an item of twelve cartloads of "fossil fuel."

When irritated, the sea cucumber, a species of hothuria, can eject all its teeth, its stomach and digestive apparatus, and reduce itself to a simple membranous sac.

Gloria, which is now extensively used in the manufacture of umbrellas and dress pieces, is a product of silk and wool of fine quality, its high degree of luster being due to the silk which it contains.

In Germany, when the vote of the jury stands six against six, the prisoner is acquitted. A vote of seven against five leaves the decision to the court, and in a vote of eight against four the prisoner is convicted.

In digging a well in Carroll County, Missouri, recently, a farmer claims to have found at a depth of sixteen feet, a stream of water in which were floating numbers of white walnuts, together with leaves from the trees.

The great steamships plying between Australia and England are provided with freezing machinery, by which mutton is preserved and delivered in London in fine condition. Australian flowers, preserved in ice, are also carried to London.

It is understood that the Crown Paper Company of Oregon City will soon erect a wood pulp mill on the Willamette at the mouth of the Molalla river. The company wishes to be able to manufacture the pulp needed in its own pulp mill. It now buys all the wood pulp used.

Some two months ago the secretary of the interior made an order that all patents to land in quadrant that were tied up when the suits affecting titles in that tract were commenced, may now be signed and delivered. Some of these deeds are now arriving at the Oregon City land office.

The greatest naval review of modern times was by Queen Victoria, in 1851, at the beginning of the Crimean war. The fleet extended in an unbroken line for five miles, and comprised 300 men-of-war, with twice that number of store and supply ships. The fleet was manned by 40,000 seamen.

Killiknick, or kiniknick, which Indians are in the habit of mixing with tobacco, is rapidly becoming extinct. Several plants have received this name, but they have no right to it. The true herb is the inside bark of a young willow, and, when smoked alone, makes a mild and pleasant smoke.

It has been proved that in a patent lock with an average sized key having six "steps," each capable of being reduced in height twenty times, the number of changes will be 86,400; further, that as the drill pins and the pipes of the keys may be made of three different sizes, the total number of changes would be 2,592,000.

English trees seem to be utterly puzzled by the weather this year. An old horse chestnut is now reported with a full crop of nuts on some of its branches and a second crop of blossoms on the others. Other trees shed their leaves during the drought in the beginning of August, and have now put on a fresh growth of them.

The annual report of the Boston Fire Department attributes the cause of a number of fires in that city last year to "smoking in bed," and it has a subdivision in which the origin of the fire is set down to "careless smoking in bed." Where the line can be drawn is not obvious to the ordinary mind, but it may be to the Postonian.
