A pleasant feature of the yacht race was the good feeling that has existed regarding the race and its management.

There seems to be no more doubt as to the feasibility of building cigar-shaped rafts and towing them long distances.

Lord Dunraven and his staunch little craft have won many admirers in America if they did not carry off the cup.

It seems as if the senate was returning to the ancient method of trying the merits of a new measure by the physical skill and endurance of its champions, and the silver senators are coming out ahead.

Five hundred horses were suffocated in a fire that broke out in the Wallace street barn of the Chicago City Railway Company Thursday. It was impossible to get the horses out and cries of pain were pitiful in the extreme.

Geary is still fighting for the enforcement of the Chinese law, but it seems as if the sickly sentiment of the Eastern people will be too strong for him. The evils of the competition of coolie slavery do not seem to count for anything with the Eastern people.

Many people would like to know what has become of the \$800 apportioned to Tillamook county as her share of the Five per centum fund. The apportionment was made some time ago but none of the money has yet been received by the county treasurer.

The Union Pacific is now in the hands of a receiver. It is estimated that for nine months the company must show a loss in the gross earnings compared with 1892 of 4,643,000 dollars and an estimated net increase of 3,631,777 dollars. The stagnant condition of business in the West is the chief reason of the deficit.

Another log raft was recently launched at Fort Bragg, Cal. The raft was built in eighteen days, was 350 feet long, 34 feet wide, and 24 feet deep, and will make, if sawed into lumber, 674,538 feet, not counting the wastage. The timber is sawed up in the Union Lumber company's mill in San Francisco.

An editor of an exchange is now a haunted beast, roaming the land and with no place to lay his head, all on "account of an error made by his make up." That person in some way got a marriage notice and a grocer's local mixed, the outcome of which read as follows: Mr. John Jones and Miss Mollie Smith were United in the holy bonds of matrimony at 40 cents by the quart or barrel. The bride was attired in codfish and mackerel while the groom looked splendid in home-made soap, at 20 cents per quart. Mr. Jones is an esteemed saur kraut and he has a new invoice of hams at 15 cents per lb., Rev. Brown officiated.

It is estimated that the recent rains destroyed over 5,000,000 bushels of wheat in Palouse, Potlatch and Hangman regions, and all that is harvested will have to be marketed as rejected wheat. At Tacoma 18,000 sacks are now lying in the warehouses so badly damaged it will be unfit for milling purposes. The inspectors blame the farmers for carelessness in harvesting and threshing the crop.

The immense raft that was built on Coos Bay has not yet been towed out, as it draws so much water they are afraid to take it over the bar. The Coos Mail states that the parties in charge are looking for a good place to beach it, thinking that the great weight of the mass will have a tendency to flatten it out, and that it will be from two weeks to a month or more before it can be taken out. Work upon the construction of a new raft has begun and the defects in the first one will be avoided.

The Vigilant won the American cup in three straight heats. The last heat was sailed in a gale, blowing 30 miles an hour with a heavy sea running. The Englishmen thought their boat would be superior in such weather and it is quite possible that the splitting of her spinnaker when near the end of the race, caused the loss of 40 seconds the time by which the Valkyrie lost the race. Such a slight difference in time over a 30 mile course leaves very little choice in the merits of the boats, though it is said the English boat was much better handled than the Vigilant.

We have yet to hear of a county in Oregon with as little indebtedness as Tillamook. Douglas county has nearly \$172,000, Yamhill has \$23,000, while Tillamook has only \$14,400. The state tax is all paid up except about \$2,000 which is the difference between the levy made by the county and that made by the state. The county warrants now being called in were issued three years ago but over \$10,000 in new warrants were taken in by the sheriff for taxes this year, so that warrants issued since that are not all outstanding against the county. Other counties are calling in warrants that were issued as far back as 1887.

Another awful railroad wreck has fallen to the lot of Michigan. This time the air-brakes refused to work and the only explanation the engineer can give is that some miscreant must have tampered with the valves on the coaches at the stopping place before the disaster. The investigation will probably show some different explanation as it hardly seems a likely one. There is something radically wrong about the method of running trains close behind each other which can only be remedied by the adoption of the block system, when there would be time to stop a train before it reached a train in the next block, even if the air brakes refused to work.

The case of the Northern Pacific Railroad vs. J. L. Patterson, treasurer of Gallatin county, Mont., now in the United States supreme court at Washington, is of considerable interest to the people of Tillamook county and it will be well to watch the decision carefully. There are many thousands of acres of railroad land in this county on which no tax is paid and a decision against the railroad company in this case would mean several hundred dollars a year added to the treasury. The tax this year amounts to upwards of \$800 and if this and about the same amount for 1894 can be collected it will be of considerable help to the finances of the county. The county court is making a determined effort to collect this money now. Settlers and parties who own timber lands are assessed and pay their taxes but the railroads have hitherto succeeded in bluffing out of it. It is bad enough to have a railroad claiming the choicest land in the county without letting them get out of paying taxes.

As compared with last years summary the assessment shows an increase of 17,929 acres of land acres of land valued at \$151,727 more. Increase in numbers of town lots 497 valued at \$8,273 less. Improvements are valued at \$23,320 more. Merchandise and implements at \$26,324 less. One more horse or mule is assessed at a value of \$2,222 more. Money, notes, accounts, shares of stock etc. are assessed \$109,219 less. Household furniture, carriages, are valued at \$20,315 more. Cattle have increased 778 and in value \$3,635. Sheep show an increase of 276, valued at \$55 dollars more. The increase in the gross valuation is only 110,176 dollars more than last year but the exemptions are 221,417 less leaving a total increase of value in taxable property of \$331,683. The number of polls is the same as last year.

TURPENTINE FROM FIR.

Several months ago The Lumberman called attention to the feasibility of extracting turpentine and other liquids from fir trees. This belief was based on the fact that certain species of fir trees are full of pitch and resin. Prof. Fernow, chief of the forestry division of the Agricultural Department, was written on the subject. His reply was that he did not believe that trees in the Pacific Northwest contained any great amount of turpentine. San Francisco and Port Angeles capitalists, however, differed with him, and organized a company to extract turpentine, fir balsam, creosote and other liquids from fir stumps and mill refuse, and within the next few weeks the first turpentine oven on the Pacific coast will be ready for business. E. Ewald, general manager of the Port Angeles company, has kindly furnished us with a description of the plant. The wood is roasted in an oven, which is 24 feet high, has two walls of brick and a space of two feet between them. The receptacle for the wood is 36 feet in diameter and has a dome on top of it. A system of iron pipes are enclosed in the brick walls through which the necessary heat passes. The process is the invention of Ferdinand Kirstein, who has had 15 years of experience in the distillation of turpentine in Germany. As said before fir stumps and refuse from sawmills constitute the raw material. Mr. Kirstein claims that out of 50 cords of wood he can produce 25 barrels of turpentine, 10 barrels of fir balsam, 35 barrels of wood tar and creosote and 2,500 sacks of charcoal. Turpentine, 40 cents per gallon; fir balsam, \$2 per gallon, wood tar a 20 cents per gallon and charcoal at 20 cents, making a total of \$1,980 as the result of one burning. The cost of the burning is put at \$645. It can be seen at a glance the immense profit in the business, provided of course Mr. Kirstein's process is what he claims it is.—Puget Sound Lumberman.

THE CO-OPERATIVE PLAN OF FAILURE.

Several weeks ago the Auld Shingle Co., of Ballard, entered into an agreement with its employees to work the mill on the co-operative plan: The arrangement was that the employees should aid in other work besides their own special line and for a time they did this willingly, but it was not long before some began to complain that they were doing more than their share and objected to being taken away from their regular work to help in other ways. After returns were received on the product, the bill for shingle bolts was to be paid, then the manager's and book keeper's salaries, and out of the balance the workmen were to be paid by the union scale. If there was anything left it was to be divided pro rata among all the managers and employees. The company was to be paid 10 cents per 1000 shingles for the use of the mill. The scheme did not work and was given up last week. A dozen mills in Washington are working on the co-operative plan.
