The schooner Maggie C. Russ carries about 300,000 feet of lumber and has a crew of eight men. This is her first trip to Tillamook her principal run being between Humboldt and San Francisco with redwood lumber.

The California & Oregon Cooperage Company's mill is still under attachment but the mill is running right along. The schooner Maggie Russ is lying at the wharf ready to load as soon as the lumber is released from attachment.

Mr. George Squires has taken charge of the Winfield House at Bay City and will run it in his customary first-class style. Mr. Squires always furnishes excellent accommodations as is well known to Tillamookers and traveling men.
Prof. E. K. Barnard arrived in the city Monday to prove up on his homestead, and left yesterday morning for Tacoma. He has been engaged as principal of the public school at Lake Park, a small town about 8 miles from Tacoma.
The channel at Dry Stocking bar is already showing improvement as a result of the jetty recently built. The Garfield can now go over at nearly any stage of the tide, while formerly there were several hours on each tide when there was not enough water.
The electric light works at Baltimore were burned Saturday and the city was plunged into darkness. The sparks were carried over the city by the strong wind and the city jail took fire. The prisoners were all taken out under a strong guard and no lives were lost.
The Harrison had the misfortune to break her propeller going down the bay Friday and had to go on the beach to fix it. She went out Sunday morning. Besides considerable butter she had on board a load of lumber from this city and about fifteen passengers.
The French and Russians are embracing each other at Toulon and the French are making themselves hoarse shouting "Vive la Russie." This is looked upon as very significant in case of European troubles, but English and Germany do not seem to be very much scared about it.

The semi annual statement does not show the expenses that were allowed at the recent term of county court, including the circuit court expenses. In the ordinary course of business these expenses would have been included in the October statement but owing to the adjournment of court until October the bills were not allowed till after the statement had been filed. These bills amount to about \$4000.
Oregon City has organized a Free Reading Room Association, the directors of which are soliciting free copies of newspapers throughout the state. The object is a good one and our sincerest wish is that they may in course of time become strong enough financially to be able to pay a regular subscription. Tillamookers who are called to Oregon City will find the HEADLIGHT at the Free Reading Room.
Salmon eggs were at a premium last week. After the rains and the high waters the rivers were swarming with trout and everyone who could beg, borrow or appropriate a hook and line and salmon eggs went fishing, and as a rule succeeded in catching a fine string of fish. In fact everybody caught so many big ones that the most inveterate fish-story teller had to refrain from relating about the fish he caught when he lived in Happy Holler.
The rebellion is not yet suppressed in Brazil and the rebels seem to be getting the best of it. The rebel ship Aquidaban, Meilo's flagship opened the bombardment of Rio. The bombardment was a very destructive one and many buildings were badly damaged. The buildings occupied by the Rio News and the American Bible Society were wrecked and many foreigners were killed and wounded. The government is suppressing the reports of the casualties.
Frank Severance has moved his logging outfit to Sugar-loaf mountain, east of town, where he will conduct logging operations during the coming winter. A dry flume, about 80 rods long, will be built from the river up the side of the mountain into which the logs will be rolled with jack screws. Once started, the logs will slide down into the river before a man can say ta-ra-toom-de-ay. The timber is said to be the finest that was ever cut for Tillamook mills.
Our Hebo correspondent speaks of the Nestucca people needing a bridge across the Big Nestucca. Such a bridge would be of great benefit to the whole county, especially in the winter time when the roads over the mountains are impassable. There is seldom any snow on that route and if there was a bridge teams could go to and from the Valley at any time. Last winter when the snow was so deep in the mountains that mail had to be carried by men on snow shoes, Mr. Smith, the Dolph mail carrier, brought eleven sacks to Tillamook from Dolph over the Nestucca route in a lumber wagon. When the rivers are up the people of the south part of the county are practically cut off from the county seat, and much of their trade which should be done in this city, is taken to Sheridan and McMinville. A bridge over the Nestucca is one of the most needed improvements in the county.

Saturday evening's overland when she pulled into Salem, says the Statesman, looked as she had about as many tramps aboard as she had passengers. The blind-baggage and the tender was simply one mass of men nearly forty, some of them (so thick were they) having their hands full to hold on. A few were obliging enough to allow the fireman to operate the water tank but the majority of them stuck right to the train as it they feared, were they once off, they could not have gotten on again. They were a desperate and hard looking lot of fellows but Salem was lucky and the entire outfit went on through.

County Court.
County Court convened Monday, Oct. 9th, present Judge H. F. Holden, W. H. H. Cary and J. H. Bridgeford, commissioners.
Ordered that the supervisor of R. D. 8 cause stakes to be put on both sides of county road from Tillamook to South Prairie from a point about opposite Eli Olds' house to a point where the road makes an angle to the East on the banks of Trask river said stakes to be 2 rods apart to serve as guides during high water.
Application of R. T. Weatherly et al for road rejected there being no remonstrance on file for damages, and it appearing that viewers do not approve said road and that no plat has been filed.
In the matter of application of Benoit Provost for change in the county road ordered that W. D. Wood, M. B. Pettys and Frank Long be appointed viewers to meet with P. S. Brown and view and survey and lay out said road.
In the matter of road petition of A. Benshie et al ordered that report, plat and survey be recorded and that said road be opened.
Daniel Pierce appointed road supervisor R. D. 16 in place of S. D. Pierce deceased.
Ordered that Albert Harris be allowed to purchase 10.00 feet of plank for R. D. No. 14.
Bill of Geo. D. Biggs for haulage furnished Frank Harris laid over for consideration.
Resignation of E. K. Barnard as county school superintendent accepted and T. B. Handley appointed to fill the vacancy.
Proposition of J. V. Alderman and A. Arstall to build bridge across Howling creek continued.
Ordered that J. D. Edwards be given credit on tax roll the amount of tax assessed and levied upon lands sold and bid in by the county judge.
The assessor turned over the assessment roll for the year 1893, and the assessor proceeded to examine the roll carefully and ordered that the same be approved.
Ordered that the county clerk notify supervisor of R. D. 7 to fasten down the plank at south end of bridge across Stillwell slough or Wilson river cut off.
Ordered that the sheriff be allowed an extension of time for the return of the delinquent tax roll until the regular term of court held in January 1894 and ordered that the clerk attach a new warrant to each of said delinquent tax rolls for the collection of the tax remaining unpaid.
Ordered that as the levy mentioned above cannot well be made at this term of court, the same is continued till the regular term of court in January 1894.

Found Drowned.
The supposition that an unfortunate traveler had been drowned while attempting to cross a small branch of Wilson river as related in the last issue of the HEADLIGHT was only too true. The ill-fated man whose name was Samuel Sax was on his way from Portland to Tillamook and was unfortunately deceived as to the depth and force of the stream he attempted to cross. On Wednesday Mr. Reeler informed the neighbors of the circumstances and a search party consisting of W. J. Smith, Isaac Smith and a party of campers from Forest Grove went out to look for the body but without success. On Saturday Fred Page, son-in-law, of the deceased, and Sid Anderson of this city, arrived from Tillamook and accompanied by Robt Hicks went to the fatal ford, and after a short search found the body of Mr. Sax in a wrack-heap, about 400 yards below the ford. The body was without any marks or bruises except a cut on the back of the head. The watch in the pocket of the deceased had stopped at 11.45. The horse was found between some logs and had suffered from exposure and starvation so that it died while they were taking it to Glenora. The body of Mr. Sax was brought to this city Monday and buried Tuesday at the Johnson cemetery by the G. A. R. Post, he being a member of Summer Post No. 12, East Portland. The deceased was 65 years of age the day he was drowned and served in the 9th Wisconsin regiment during the war. Rev. D. McLachlan conducted the services and in his sermon paid a fitting tribute to the comrade who had answered the last roll call. The deceased was well respected and much sympathy is expressed regarding his sad death.

More Storms in the East.
CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—As a result of the fearful wind and rain storms, telegraphic communications with New York, Washington, Boston and a larger part of the south is next to impossible. Wires from the West are working after a fashion as far East as the Alleghenies, but the country on the further slope of the mountains is cut off almost as though it had suddenly sunk into the sea. Troubles with the wires began yesterday and gradually grew worse through the night, reaching a climax this morning in a condition of prostration. It is said to be about the most complete on record. The only case approaching a parallel, so far at least as wire communication is concerned was the extraordinary New York blizzard in which Roscoe Conklyn lost his life. That blizzard however affected a comparatively small stretch of territory; today almost the entire Atlantic coast is cut off and the effects of the storm are felt over 1000 miles inland.

Marriage.
On Sunday Mr. Charles Bester, eldest son of the late Stephen Bester, and Miss May T. West, daughter of W. T. West of Beaver were married at the residence of the bride's parents at Beaver. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Wade of this city. After the ceremony the wedding feast was taken over to the school house, where a number of people had met for religious services and had brought a basket dinner along and all partook of the repast in honor of the occasion. The bride and groom both have a large circle of friends throughout the county and congratulations and good wishes are extended from all sides.

McCreary Bill Passed.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—The house this afternoon passed the McCreary bill with the amendments offered by the Geary and Caninetti bill, as passed. It extends the provisions of the Geary law six months; defines Chinese laborers and Chinese merchants; makes mandatory photographic identification; requires marshals to carry out all orders of deportation and jailing Chinamen without bail pending execution of the deportation writ and excludes Chinamen convicted of felony from permission of register. Geary declares the bill as passed is perfectly satisfactory to the coast and, if enforced at the expiration of the time limit, will settle the Chinese problem. Those who depart will not be able to transfer their registration certificates and in the course of time all will disappear from these shores. The administration is also satisfied with the bill, so Chairman McCreary of the foreign affairs committee, avers.

M. E. Church Services.
At the quarterly conference of the M. E. church recently held in Tillamook it was decided that Rev. McLachlan should preach each month as follows: At Tillamook on the evening of the first and second Sundays, morning of the third Sunday and morning and evening of the fourth Sunday. He will preach at Bar City on the first Sunday morning and third Sunday evening. At Pleasant Valley and Long Prairie second Sunday morning, and on Nehalem on the fifth Sunday in the month. When Bro. Mac is absent the Epworth League will conduct services in the evening.

Launching of the Oregon.
Invitations to the launching of the battle ship Oregon were issued by the Union Iron Works. The war vessel will slide into the waters of the San Francisco bay on Thursday, October 26, at 11.45 A. M. A neat engraving of the new man-of-war is at the top of the caps, and underneath appears the lettering: "Christened by Miss Daisy Ainsworth representing the State of Oregon, and Miss Ruth Dolph, representing the navy, launched by Miss Eugenia Shelby, representing the city of Portland."
