Efforts are being made in Washington county to send on exhibit to the Mid-Winter fair.

As the lists of awards at the World's Fair are published Oregon comes more and more to the front. When her resources are more fully developed few states will equal her and none will excel.

The Pacific Lumberman gives the receipts of lumber during the past month at San Francisco from Tillamook bay as 964,000 feet. This is the smallest amount shipped from here for some time.

Wilson, of Washington, has introduced a bill appropriating \$375,000 for two revenue cutters for the Pacific coast. Robinson, of Pennsylvania, has introduced a bill to abolish the office of naval officer at all ports of entry.

An editor of a paper in Kansas wants sealed proposals for 50 cents worth of coffee, a twenty-five pound sack of flour, and a straw hat. He says that this is the way the town merchant does when he wants a little job printing.

Clatsop county's assessment roll shows a gross value of property of \$4,364,292. Exemptions, \$66,954. Total taxable, \$4,298,338. As equalized by the county board, \$3,404,672. Last year the total taxable was \$5,403,522.

The voting on the amendments to the repeal bill which have been taking place in the Senate this week do not necessarily mean that the end is near, because the voting began upon the understanding that speech-making should be allowed to continue within due limits. Such are the multifarious peregrinations of the procrastination of the senate.

Californians are now confident of the success of the Mid-Winter fair. Many of the Chicago exhibits are being sent direct to San Francisco. As there will not be room for all only the choicest are being sent. The persons in charge are much annoyed by parties applying for positions. Most of these people only want the offices in the hope of being able to spend the winter in San Francisco without cost to themselves.

The total number of admissions to the World's Fair up to Thursday last amounted to 20,627,166 and it is expected it will reach between 22,000,000 and 23,000,000. The attendance at the Centennial was 9,788,181 and at the Paris Exposition about 27,000,000. The general depression in business all over the world had its influence on the attendance at Chicago. Given a season of ordinary business prosperity and the attendance would have easily reached thirty millions.

Grant county's warrants are being called in up to January 1, 1893. This is going Tillamook several times better.

The Corvallis news states that the editor of the Chehalis Valley Times disagreed with a neighbor about the Sunflower and whipped the fellow. Being short of funds the newspaper man will edit his paper from the county jail for 20 days. The justice who pronounced the sentence will hear from his nibs in a future issue. He is promised a royal roast.

Freed from the persecution of dunning creditors and deprived of the solace of blaming it all on the 'devil' his jiglets ought to be able to do the justice up brown by the time he comes out.

The Salvation Army at Astoria is being considerably annoyed by toughs and it seems as if the police are tardy about putting a stop to the disgraceful attacks. The members of the Army may be eccentric in their manner of spreading the Gospel but they certainly have the merit of following most literally the dictates of Christ's teachings. In the slums of large cities their influence has already been felt and they reach people and do good where no others could. It is an everlasting disgrace that in professed Christian countries these people are subjected to such persecutions.

It is fortunate for the American people that such instances of priggishness as that exhibited by the faculty of Princeton are extremely rare. If it is beneath the dignity of a divinity student to play football, or any other manly game, of what earthly use is he anyhow? Some of the best and noblest divines of modern times were famed in their young days as athletes and the fact that they joined in the college games detracted neither from their dignity as divines nor from their influence as men. It will be strange if public opinion does not force the faculty to quickly retract their decision.

The great battleship Oregon was launched with becoming ceremony at San Francisco Thursday. The launching was accomplished at noon in the presence of 50,000 people. The Oregon is what is technically known as a sea-going coast-line battleship, and is the most powerful ship in the United States navy. Her dimensions are as follows: length over all, 348 feet; load water line, 300 feet; breadth, 69 feet, 3 inches; draught, 24 feet; displacement, 10,298 tons; maximum horse-power, 9,000. She will have a maximum speed of 16 2-10 knots, and will carry a crew of 460 men. Her cost, exclusive of armament, is \$4,000,000. As a fighting ship the Oregon will be capable of defending herself in any position. She can concentrate the fire of six heavy guns on any point of attack, and her supplementary batteries are sufficiently powerful, if focused upon a given point of attack to crush in five-inch armor.

Very few people realize the extent to which newspapers are drawing upon the world's timber resources for pulp material for the papers upon which their editions are printed. It is estimated that the white paper for the daily supply of the several editions of the New York World requires all the marketable spruce lumber fit to cut which grows on seven acres of average spruce forest. The Boston Globe's edition requires the growth of three acres of New England spruce forests. The wood pulp now used in the United States requires about 2,200 cords of spruce daily, or 1,700,000 feet of spruce logs every twenty-four hours, amounting to 500,000,000 feet per annum. That amount of lumber now going to waste as soon as the newspaper is a day old, used to suffice to build houses intended to last half a century or more. The pulp drain upon spruce forests uses up the mature timber of 1,000 acres a year.—Newspaper Man.

Late dispatches contained the very gratifying announcement that the awards have been made in the department of agriculture and that Oregon has secured twenty medals to Washington's four and California's twelve. Up to date Oregon has also been awarded eight diplomas in the horticultural department, several in the fisheries, educational, and mining departments; and she has received a diploma for the most comprehensive collection of commercial woods, collective exhibit of salmon, nuts, prunes, and cherries.

We are informed that the Light-house Board has recommended that a whistling buoy be placed at Tillamook bar. Now it rests with the department at Astoria when it will be placed in position, and it is of the utmost importance that the work should be done as soon as possible! The increasing importance of Tillamook's shipping has rendered the establishing of a whistling buoy on the bar necessary. As long as people were content to wait for a clear day or a smooth bar for boats to pass in and out, perhaps a whistler was not absolutely needed—a boat could stay in the bay or stand off shore as the case might be and the delay was of no consequence, but that time has gone by, and with each month the need of having regular boats is more plainly realized by the merchants here. As one of the lighthouse tenders is at present laid up for repairs it may be a short time before the buoy can be placed in position but the matter should be so represented that Capt. Fahrenholt will use all due diligence in doing the work. Much credit is due to Capt. Tatton, of the Elmore, for his efforts to secure this improvement, as it was chiefly through his representations that the Astoria Chamber of Commerce interested itself in the matter.

Now that the industry of butter making in a systematic manner is fairly started, the attention of progressive Tillamook farmers will soon be turned to the methods followed by eastern dairymen to promote an increased yield of milk and butter from the cows. There is no doubt that more more profit can be made by winter dairying, and some of the farmers are already making arrangements with this object in view, but to carry on a successful winter dairy it will be necessary to put up a considerable amount of feed. Hitherto it has been of Tillamookers that cattle could pasture here nearly all the year round, but it will be found that, in order to get the best results, it will be necessary to feed the milk cows during the winter months. Of all the methods for preserving feed for future use none have been found so cheap or successful as silos. So beneficial have they proved that eastern dairymen consider them an indispensable adjunct to a modern dairy.

To the dairymen of this county this is a matter of considerable interest and it would be well for the dairymen of this county to investigate the matter during the coming winter so as to be able, next summer, to make a few experiments. The silo in itself is an inexpensive structure, the necessary points being to make it air tight and to provide a convenient place from which to take the ensilage. The amount of fodder that can be preserved in a small silo is surprising to anyone who has never investigated their workings. A crop of hay is altogether dependent upon a period of dry weather to ensure its preservation, but in putting up ensilage the weather does not make any material difference. Cattle are very fond of the product, preferring it to hay or any other dry fodder and even in some cases to grass. As the farmers of other sections have found silos to be of such benefit in their business the matter may be investigated with much advantage to the farmers here. To compete successfully it is necessary to use the most advanced methods and of these the silo has proved itself one of the best.
