County School Superintendent Handley has appointed G. A. Edmunds, and W. S. Brooks as board of examiners at the coming teachers' examination.
M. M. Morin has sold his ranch to L. Johnson. Mr. Johnson is a recent arrival from Minnesota and is the right kind of a settler for this country.
The schooner Maggie C. Russ is still lying at the Cooperage wharf waiting until the affairs of that company can be settled so as to allow her to load.
Frisco Store has just purchased for cash three car loads of flour, and will offer the same for cash only; the very best flour on the market at \$3.35 per bbl. or 85 cents per sack.
The Elmore came in Saturday through a heavy fog, and went down to Garibaldi Sunday. She took on a load of shooks at Bay City Sunday evening and sailed for Astoria Monday morning.
A few snags have been taken out of the slough this week but the main work cannot be done till more powder is obtained and George Means' pile driver can be used, perhaps in a week or two.
Chris, the genial mate of the Elmore, was struck on the leg by a broken block while they were trying to pull the boat off the snag and was fortunate in not being laid up with a broken leg.

Mr. Faraday, of San Francisco, arrived on the stage last night. He represents the Oregon & California Cooperage Co., and will probably bring their affairs to a satisfactory settlement.
Wm. Olsen has gone to San Francisco and will try to have his case dismissed on the ground that there is no proof against him and that he has been punished enough by the placing of his steamer under \$10,000 bonds.
Recorder Drew has issued notices of the city election to be held December 4, when a mayor, five councilmen, treasurer and marshal will be elected. This is the first time a mayor has been on the list of Tillamook city officers.
There has been an extra large run of chums in the bay for the past week and some of the hauls have been extraordinary. Sumner Hauxhurst has been using a seine on Kilebis and sent in from 1500 to 2000 fish each twenty-four hours.
J. H. Bridgford, of Bay City, and Capt. Jacobson, of the Maggie C. Russ, are in the city today trying to make arrangements to load the schooner. Now that Mr. Faraday is here it is expected a settlement will be made today.
On his last trip to Portland Geo. W. Fearnside bought one of the largest stocks of dry goods ever brought to this city, and under the management of Miss Fearnside and Mrs. Wilson it is being displayed to the best advantage.

A. G. Reynolds has retired from the photograph business for the present and the rooms he occupied over the HEADLIGHT office are being fitted up for E. E. Selph who will use them as offices.

The lighthouse tender, Columbine, is reported to have left Yaquina for Netarts bay, where she will pick up the whistling buoy that drifted ashore here some time ago. It would be a good idea to leave it on Tillamook bar as she goes up the coast to Astoria.

W. C. King is still improving his cranberry ranch at Sand Lake. The Pacific coast cranberries have attracted much attention at the World's Fair, and a company has been formed with intention of investing \$100,000 in the business at South Bend, Wash.

A broken shaft in the mill is the cause of the city being deprived of electric lights for a time. The shaft was sent out on the Elmore Monday morning to be repaired at Astoria if possible. The streets appear very dark and dismal without their cheering presence.

E. A. Ross, engineer on the Elmore, while fishing for smelt at the Cape yesterday, caught the first specimen of man-eating shark that has ever been captured in the river. The fish was a very young one, about two and one half feet long, but with an unmistakable look of ugliness about it. Mr. Ross will have it preserved.

A party of hunters, consisting of Dave Hadley, John Barker, Morris Leach and Len Hiner went to Nestucca and returned after about a week's hunting. They killed nine deer, one of which they brought to town and distributed as far as it would go among their friends. They say Dave shot sixteen times at the deer but his friends ate the venison just the same.

Extra seats have been placed in the city public school. The applications for admittance have been so numerous that the children cannot be accommodated in the three rooms and it will be necessary to engage another teacher and use the other room. This is very gratifying to the directors and teachers, who have the school in charge and speaks well for their management.

Capt. Brownlee, of the Lighthouse department, arrived in the city Sunday and at once went out to view the new road. He returned Monday well satisfied with his trip. Mr. Withers, the engineer in charge, returned to the city with Captain Brownlee and reports working progressing finely. Part of the crew were laid off yesterday and the work will be carried on with a reduced force.

The cold mornings we have experienced lately reminded many people of the time when they lived in the eastern states and got out before daylight to go and husk corn. When the wagons rattled and the ears of corn went bat! bat! as they struck the sideboards. Of the frost on the husks that made their hands chafe and smart and left them in just the right condition for the keen edge of the frozen corn leaves to operate upon. Reminiscences of such experiences were in order.

Mr. J. D. Jones who lives in Tillamook county on the Big Nestucca river has been doing a lively business in salmon lately. His boys have been catching an average of 75 fish a day at Silver falls where Mr. Jones lives. From the Falls, a pack train has been run to Willamina every day, and from Willamina Mr. Jones sent wagons containing the Silversides to different parts of the valley. The rise in the river sent the fish up the Woods on the double quick, leaving the stream fishermen near the Ocean to hold the empty sack.—Sheridan Sun.

Ben. Higginbotham was in town last week and gathered up about 75 head of cattle, with which he started for Astoria Sunday morning. He goes by way of the beach, and will take the cattle across the Nehalem river on a scow. The river is about a quarter of a mile wide at the point of crossing, and as only about six head can be taken each trip, it is quite an undertaking, especially as the passage can only be made at dead low tide. A few weeks ago Mr. Higginbotham had to wait several days before he could take a herd of 95 across, on account of the storm that was raging at that time.

Rev. Hendricks has been here but a few weeks but he shows a considerable amount of gall for such a short acquaintance. Sunday night he humbly prayed "that Tillamook might become noted for its goodness and piety as much as it was now noted for its wickedness and iniquity." This prayer somewhat nonplussed the congregation who, though, gratified at his good wishes for their future welfare had decided objections to such assertions made about their character. It comes with ill grace from a stranger who has only recently come from Kentucky and who can know little or nothing of the people here. The only place we know of where Tillamook has such a reputation is North Yamhill and if Mr. Hendricks is wise he will not be influenced by what the residents of that place have to say about Tillamook. We have no doubt he will have reason to think before he has been here very long, that Tillamookers are pretty good people after all.

Repeal Has Passed.

After sixty-one days debate, the repeal bill passed the senate Monday by a vote of 43 to 32. The bill will be laid before the house again to-day, when it is expected the filibustering will begin again.

Carter Harrison Shot.
 CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—Another crazy crank has done his deadly work, and Carter H. Harrison, five times mayor of Chicago and one of the best known men in the West, lies dead at his home, No. 231 South Ashland Boulevard. Three bullets entered his body, two making wounds sufficient to cause his death. The murder was committed by Eugene Patrick Prendergast, a paper carrier who had declared that Mayor Harrison had promised to make him corporation counsel and had not kept his word. This, he said, was the only reason for committing the crime. Mayor Harrison, who but a short time previously had returned from the festivities of "Mayor's" day at the fair, was lying on the sofa in the front room. About 8:25 p. m. the door bell rang and when a servant opened the door the man rushed into the room where Harrison was lying and fired four shots at him, three of which took effect. The man then rushed into the street and disappeared. Mr. Harrison died in ten minutes.

Cows in the Fall.
 Sleeping on the bare, cold ground in the fall gives the cows rheumatism, they often take cold and contract disease which hangs to them all the winter, and in some cases proves fatal. They do not do so well at the fall and have not the thrift they would have, nor come out in as good condition in the spring, as they would have done had they had timely shelter and protection against wet and cold in the fall. It is false economy to neglect the cow at any season of the year. It is no gain to shorten the winter by keeping animals exposed to the vicissitudes of the fall weather and allowing them to make out a subsistence on frosted grass until snow falls. It means more food through the winter and later foddering and graining in the spring on a greatly reduced condition which it will take a good part of the summer to improve.—Statesman.

Land Open for Filing.
 OREGON CITY, Oct. 28.—Colonel Robert A. Miller, register of the land office, has posted notices in his office to the effect that tp. 4 n, r. 9 w, will be thrown open for filings at 9 o'clock November 14, and that sections 5 and 6, in township 3 n, r. 5 w, will be subject to entry November 16. Both of these tracts are on the Nehalem, and judging by the inquiries which reach the register's office from those desiring to file upon the land in the first named tract, it is a valuable part of Uncle Sam's domain, and will attract a large crowd when thrown open to entry.

Word has come from the Henry Mel-drum surveying party to the effect that the contract which was undertaken at the opening of season has become completed but that they were to remain out for several weeks yet to run some other lines which the surveyor-general wished done, so they may not be home before the middle of next month.

Fire at Dolph.
 On Thursday evening last the residence of Mr. Ernest Werner near Dolph was burned down causing a total loss of all the household furniture including a fine piano, valued at \$600, all the winter provisions, and clothing of the occupants. Mr. Werner, in trying to extinguish the fire, was overcome with the smoke and but for Messrs. Dunn and Craven, who discovered him in an insensible condition, would undoubtedly have lost his life. The house was one of the finest in that section of the country, and the loss is estimated at about \$3000, partially covered by insurance.

Elmore on a Snag.
 When the Elmore was coming up the slough last night after dark she ran on a snag this side of Dougherty slough and has not yet been able to get off. She had about 35 tons of cargo on board which is being loaded on a scow today and she will probably come off all right on tonight's tide. At present she is listed over heavily but is uninjured.

Our own Gid Again.
 The 20-round glove contest for \$300 a side between Denny Murphy of Southern Oregon and Gid Ely, of McMinnville (?) has been postponed indefinitely. The match should have taken place at Independence shortly, but the stake money is tied up in one of the suspended banks.

Mr. E. H. Stone has been over this week from his beautiful home on Big Nestucca, bringing with him a load of delicious honey for the Dallas market. Mr. Stone remembered the Transcript, bringing to it from their flower-garden a bouquet that would charm the eye of any lover of the beautiful consisting of night onto 100 varieties of roses, 17 varieties of dahlias, several kinds of lilies, bellotropes—in fact almost all the leading varieties of flowers. He also brought us a Japanese orange, from a tree of their own growing and which bears thriftily. The orange though not as large as commonly in the market, is sweet, juicy and palatable.—Dallas Transcript.
