For the first time since Sam Smith has carried the south mail he failed to arrive Tuesday night. The rivers were impassable even for Sam who has to swim his horses every time he crosses Nestucca in winter time. He has a bad rode but manages to make it on time generally.

The Lizzie Pien sailed from Nehalem to San Francisco in four days and is expected back daily.

E. E. Selph will soon have the finest business offices in town. He has had the upper story of the HEADLIGHT building partitioned off into three rooms and will have them carpeted and furnished in comfortable style. His law library is arranged in elegant book cases made of Tillamook cedar by Nels Thompson.

The men stayed at the Irwin logging camp till the water covered the stove in the bunk house. Then they made a bridge to the higher ground with their benches and came to town. They got their cattle out Friday. A team of horses belonging to the cook are there yet and a man goes to them daily with a boat and feeds them.

Jim Ryan cut his foot very severely with an ax yesterday while working on the lighthouse road. Dr. May was sent for and went out to the camp immediately. The foot is cut clear through leaving one toe hanging only by the skin. The doctor bandaged it up as well as possible though it is doubtful if he will be able to save the toe.

It is a curious fact that tho' Eugene Field has written over five hundred poems he has never written a love song. "I don't know exactly why it is," said the Western poet recently in explanation, "except that I was married when quiet young, and I did not begin to write poetry until after my marriage." Mr. Field has now written his first love-poem, which he calls "Will You be My Sweetheart?" and has given it to the Ladies' Home Journal for publication.

With the arrival of Mr. Faraday from San Francisco, it was expected that the Cooperage Co's difficulties would be about ended; but it seems as if there is yet considerable to be done before the creditors will be satisfied. We understand that the men employed at the mill are to get checks for their work up to the present time, and these checks are to be paid: 40 per cent. cash, 40 per cent. in 60 days, and the balance in 60 days from that time. The wages from this time on to be paid monthly.

The old Leinenweber cannery went down in the storm Saturday night. This was an old land mark in Tillamook bay having been built about 14 years ago. The piling have been in bad shape for a long time many of them being eaten quite off by sand lice, and as parts of the building have been going down at different times during the past six months none were surprised to hear that it had all gone down. The machinery was sold to the Elmore Pkg. Co. about a year ago and all taken away. The building lodged against the Hobsonville wharf and if the tide does not carry it out to sea the Elmore will tow it over to Garibaldi.

News of another sad drowning reached here this morning. Alice Page, the 10 year old daughter of Fred Page, was drowned in Killam Creek yesterday. The girl left home in the morning intending to go to her uncle John Hull's place across the creek. As she did not return in the afternoon her mother got uneasy and sent the children to see why she did not come. Mr. Hull returned with the information that she had not arrived at his place and a search was instituted which resulted in finding her hat in the stream. At last reports her body had not been found. Everyone will sympathize with Mr. and Mrs. Page in their sad bereavement. Mrs. Page's father, it will be remembered, was drowned only a few weeks ago in Wilson river.

The Storm and Flood.

On Monday night the storm which had been brewing for several days struck Tillamook with full force and proved to be the worst one that has been felt here for some years. The wind blew a perfect gale and made many buildings shake as if they were about to collapse, for heavy winds are so infrequent here that buildings are not built to withstand a wind of more than ordinary force. The rain poured down in torrents and the rivers were reported to be rising and people were not surprised when the water came up to the bridge over Hoquarton slough at noon Tuesday. However during Tuesday afternoon the water rose rapidly and very soon was nearly up to Cohn's dock. As there was a large quantity of goods in the warehouse liable to be damaged by water there was a general stampede to get them stored away in the upper story. This was successfully accomplished before dark, by which time the water was several inches over the dock. By Wednesday morning the water was all over the flats north of town, and boats and logs that had been insecurely fastened were serenely meandering through the woods to the music of rushing waters, and regardless of fences or trespass notices. The top railing on Cohn's wharf was just visible and those who were fortunate enough to capture their boats were able to tow them in and make them fast to the sidewalk around the city hall and other places on that level. Part of the bridge over the slough was afloat. The new bridge over the Willson river, built at a cost of \$1300 swung around and both ends of it are now at the same side of the river which detracts from its usefulness to those who wish to go to Bay City overland. It will probably cost \$500 or \$600 to restore it to its more proper position. Many small bridges must have been taken out but it will be impossible to estimate the damage until the waters subside.

Drowned at Dry Stocking.

A Mr. Griffith Harry met his death last Sunday afternoon, near the Dry Stocking bar. He had been at work for some time for J. E. Howard, but had just left his job and his brother started to take him to Tillamook in a row-boat. The steamer Garfield was towing up a scow load of stone and seeing her the two men waited, and pulled in toward her with the apparent intention of getting a tow. The force of the down current was greater than they calculated upon and when the prow of the row-boat struck the scow Mr. Parry who was half kneeling, half standing on the bow of the row-boat, toppled off into the water. Everything that could be done to save the man was tried, Capt. Gabrielson springing into the boat that was towing astern of the Garfield and going at once to him, while his brother made frenzied efforts to get to the drowning man. The man came up only once for an instant, however, and was seen no more. His body has not been recovered although a continual search is being made for it. His companions speak very highly of the man, speaking of him as a pleasant and industrious young man. Deceased was a native of Merionethshire, Wales, and was 21 years of age. He had been in the United States about eight years, living in York state until two years ago when he came to Portland.

Thanksgiving Proclamations.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—The president today issued the following Thanksgiving proclamation:

"While the American people should every day remember with praise and thanksgiving the divine goodness and mercy which have followed them since their beginning as a nation, it is fitting that one day in each year should be especially devoted to a contemplation of the blessings we have received from the hand of God, and to a grateful acknowledgment of his loving kindness; therefore, I, Grover Cleveland, president of the United States, do hereby designate and set apart Thursday, the 30 day of the present month of November, as a day of thanksgiving and praise, to be kept and observed by all people in our land. On that day let us forego our ordinary work and employments and assemble in our usual places of worship, where we may recall all that God has done for us, and where, from grateful hearts our united tribute and praise and song may reach the throne of grace. Let the union of kindred and the social meeting of friends lend cheer and enjoyment to duty, and let generous gifts of charity for the relief of the poor and needy prove the sincerity of our thanksgiving."

SALEM, Nov. 1.—Governor Pennoyer tonight issued the following Thanksgiving proclamation:

"I do hereby appoint the fourth Thursday of the present month as a day of Thanksgiving to Almighty God for the blessings he has bestowed upon this commonwealth during the present year. God has indeed been most beneficent to our state and nation, and yet unjust and ill-advised congressional legislation having made gold alone full legal tender money, has so dwarfed and paralyzed business that the bounties of providence are now denied to hundreds of thousands of people within the national domain, who are not only without employment, but also without the means of procuring food, raiment, or shelter. While therefore, the people of Oregon return thanks to God for his goodness, I do most earnestly recommend that they will devoutly implore him to dispose the president and congress of the United States to secure the restoration of silver as full legal tender money in accordance with the policy of the republic, whereby our industries may be revived and the honest toilers of the land may procure their daily bread, not as alms, but as a reward for their labor."

The Repeal Bill.

As the bill which passed the senate is a matter of interest to all it is here printed: That so much of the act approved July 24, 1890, entitled: "An act directing the purchase of silver bullion and issue of treasury notes thereon, and for other purposes," as directs the secretary of the treasury to purchase from time to time silver bullion to the aggregate amount of 4,500,000 ounces, or so much thereof as may be offered in each month, at the market price thereof, not exceeding \$1 for 371.25 grains of pure silver, and to issue in payment for such purchases treasury notes of the United States, be, and the same is hereby repealed.

And it is hereby declared to be the policy of the United States to continue the use of both gold and silver as standard money of equal intrinsic value, such equality to be secured through international agreement, or by such safe-guards of legislation as will insure the maintenance of the parity in value of the coins of the two metals and the equal power of every dollar at all times in the markets and in the payments of debts. And it is hereby further declared that the efforts of the government shall be steadily directed to the establishment of such a safe system of bimetalism as will maintain at all times the equal power of every dollar coined or issued by the United States in the markets and in the payment of debts.

The Santander Disaster.

MADRID, Nov. 5.—The terrible disaster which wrecked the port of Santander and destroyed hundreds of lives, sent a thrill of horror throughout Spain. Every piece of news which reaches Madrid not only confirms the most sensational reports, but pictures the disaster in more vivid colors than hitherto. The story of the great disaster is as follows: The Cabo Machichaco, a Spanish steamship belonging to Bilbao, caught fire about three o'clock Friday afternoon. The origin of the fire is unknown, but was soon beyond the control of the ship's crew. The local fire department and a detachment of civic authorities was sent to the scene, and the leading municipal authorities aided in the effort to save the steamer. In the meantime thousands of people crowded to the quay and thronged the promenades contiguous to it. The fire quickly ignited the petroleum which formed a part of her cargo. Twenty cases of dynamite which were registered on the ship's papers were carried ashore, but the ship also had on board 480 cases more which did not appear on the papers and of which the authorities had no knowledge. About 4:30 the ship's boiler burst with a terrific report, and soon after there was another terrible detonation. The steamer seemed to open in half, sending a blaze of fire skyward. The force of the explosion was of such awful intensity that it shook the earth for miles around, caused houses to totter, smashed every window within radius of a rifle shot and filled the air with a mass of flying iron, burning wood, blackened timbers and scorched beams, which soon after fell upon the neighboring houses, scattering death and destruction wherever it crashed downward.

A SHOWER OF IRON ORE.

The explosion shot tons of iron ore which composed part of the ship's cargo, into the air where it mingled with the burning fragments of the steamship, tug and wooden quay, as well as with the mangled bodies of hundreds of unfortunate people who were hurled upward. The falling of this horrible mass can be better imagined than described. The flaming splinters set fire to hundreds of buildings causing a frightful panic. The force of the exploding dynamite caused such a concussion that it actually sank hundreds of smaller craft in the harbor, in addition to setting fire to a large number of other vessels and starting conflagrations upon several of the larger ships, including the Alfonso VII., which vessel caught fire so suddenly and burned so fiercely that 40 of her crew lost their lives on board her. The damage to the foreign shipping is said to be very great. For some time after the disaster the people were positively stunned with dismay and horror, and then followed a panic, during which hundreds of people are reported to have gone stark mad, while a vast majority were so paralyzed with fear and the shock that they were incapable of moving to assistance of the dying or making any effort to extinguish the flames which began to spread with most threatening rapidity.

AIR FILLED WITH DYING CRIES.

Along the quay and promenade the mangled and blackened corpses were scattered here and there, or in heaps, in many cases upon the wounded or dying, whose fearful shrieks of agony filled the air. Over 100 people are said to have been precipitated into the sea by the explosion and there met death. A train just arriving was wrecked by the explosion and set fire to and a majority of its passengers burned to death. Soon after the explosion whole blocks opposite the quay were blazing, and other portions of the city were also in flames. In the midst of the horrible panic a few men retained presence of mind to ride to the nearest railroad stations and send telegrams to the government authorities of other cities imploring succor. The cities of Valladolid, Burgos, Bilbao and Barcelona immediately took steps to assist the stricken city. Fire engines, physicians medicine and food were soon sent to the relief. Large forces of troops were also dispatched. The monetary loss sustained is enormous. The loss of life is not yet determined, but some hundreds of dead bodies have been identified, while others will never be recognized from among the mass of blackened trunks, heads and limbs which have been gathered together in a heap.

Married.

Henry S. Newman, of Chamberlain, S. D., and Miss Blanche Sturgeon, of Bay City, Oregon, were married last Monday at Sheldon, by Rev. Cummings. We have known both bride and groom for many years, Mr. Newman since a little boy at Sheldon, and we are glad to learn of this union, which we hope will be a happy one.—Primings (La.) Bell.

The many friends of Miss Sturgeon in this county will join in wishing the newly wedded couple a happy prosperous life.

More Settlers.

On Monday afternoon two families named Hensley and Cavanaugh crossed the Willson river at Glenora on their way to Tillamook. They had one two horse and two four horse teams and their wagons were laden with household furniture, etc. They are coming here from the East with the intention of buying ranches and locating. Owing to the storm that raged Monday and Tuesday night it is probable that they will be unable to cross the Willson river at Besters for some days or until the water subsides.
