THE ELECTIONS

McKINLEY ELECTED BY A LARGE
MAJORITY.

General Landslide throughout the Eastern
States.

The additional election returns received
carry out the predictions made Tuesday
night of a clean republican sweep in all
states except Virginia, and even there
the democratic majority was cut down.
In Ohio, New York and Pennsylvania
the majorities for the republican candi-
dates were fully as great as the most
enthusiastic had hoped. The following
table shows the pluralities for the head
of the republican ticket in the states
mentioned:

Pennsylvania	130,000
New York	90,000
Ohio	90,000
Iowa	35,000
Massachusetts	30,000

From Kentucky returns so far show
of 138 legislators 111 are democrats, 7
republicans and 20 doubtful. The most
doubtful are in the republican districts.
There is an overwhelming majority in
favor of the election of Lindsay to the
United States senate.

The election in Stillwater, Minn., was
a veritable landslide, the democrats hav-
ing elected every democrat on the ticket.

Overdue Steamer arrived.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 9.—The overdue
steamers Umatilla, from Puget Sound and
the Oregon from Astoria and Portland,
arrived this evening after an exception-
ally rough passage. The Umatilla ex-
perienced a very heavy gale Tuesday
afternoon off the southern coast of Ore-
gon, during which a part of the rail was
stove in on the starboard side. This is
the only damage done to either steamer.
One of the Umatilla's passengers com-
mitted suicide during the voyage, Harry
Innis, formerly a clerk of the Bank of
British Columbia in Seattle, who was
coming to this city where his parents
live, to accept a position in another bank,
became crazed through the sea-sickness
during the heavy gale and plunged over-
board. The young man also labored
under the hallucination that he was to
be arrested upon his arrival here for
failure to pay a few trifling bills in
Seattle and his fears could not be quieted.
Though carefully watched by his cabin
mate, Innis managed to get out upon
the deck alone. His cabin mate followed
him out a minute later but the young
man was nowhere to be found. No one
saw him get overboard. The body was
not recovered.

The Burned Steamer.

NORTH BAY, Ont., Nov. 8.—The fol-
lowing is a partial list of those known to
have been drowned by the burning of the
steamer Frazer on Lake Nipissing
yesterday: Capt. W. Carr, Matthew Bren-
nan, H. Sutherland, Alf. Barbeau, Wil-
liam Storey, Thos. Osborne, Alex. Dou-
glas, John Haw, Isaac Shaw, John Smal-
ley, Thomas Massey, Tom Bowers, Tom
Sheriff, James McCann, and seven others
whose names are not known. The steam-
er was owned by the Davidson Hay
Co. of Toronto and was bound for Frank's
bay with supplies for lumbermen. She
caught fire about three miles from Goose
island and a panic must have ensued as
only seven lives were saved out of
twenty-seven or twenty-eight. The fire
was witnessed from Frank's bay by Capt.
Burritt and a young Indian. They im-
mediately put off in a boat but by the
time they reached the spot the steamer
had burned to the waters edge and seven
survivors had reached the top of the scow
which was low. The hull of the boat
sank in about twenty-five feet of water
and all that now marks the spot of the
catastrophe is a short piece of smoke-
stack which appears above the water's
edge.

Ex-Secretary Rusk's Condition.

CHICAGO, Nov. 9.—Dr. J. B. Hamilton
formerly surgeon-general of the United
States marine hospital service, returned
today from Viroqua, Wis., where he has
assisted in performing a surgical opera-
tion for a growth in the bladder upon
Secretary of Agriculture Jeremiah Rusk.
He said: "The ordeal was a painful one
and dangerous for Mr. Rusk, but the
ex-secretary passed through it success-
fully, and when I left last night he was
resting quietly."

He Knew the Story.

"Hans Breitmann," in a preface which
he has written to the new English edition
of the "Autobiography of James P. Beck-
worth," the famous Indian scout and
frontiersman, tells an amusing story in
the illustration of the very general from
tier weakness of spinning marvellous
yarns. There was a camp of miners in
California, to whom Beckworth was
well known, and when his "Life" ap-
peared they commissioned one of their
number, who was going to San Francisco

to obtain stores, to purchase the book.
Not being very careful he got by mistake
a copy of the bible. In the evening
after his return, the messenger was re-
quested to read aloud to the rest from
the long expected work. Opening the
volume at random, he hit upon and read
about the story of Samson and the foxes.
Whereupon one of the listeners cried:
"That'll do. I'd know the story for one
of Jim Beckworth's lies anywhere."

Cascade Timber Reserve.

Surveyor-General Byars has received
the boundaries of the Cascade range
forest reserve set apart as a public reser-
vation by President Cleveland on Sept.
28th, and has prepared a plat of the
same. The reserve extends from the
Columbia river to within twenty miles
of the California line. For 115 miles it
is about thirty miles wide, and for thirty
miles it is sixty miles wide, embracing
the summit and slopes of the Cascade
range, and comprising 4,500,000 acres.
The reserve is larger than was necessary
and since the bill was introduced in con-
gress with the object to secure the tim-
ber on such reserves, the public is begin-
ning to imagine that there was a big job
in having the reservation made. Many
sections included have been surveyed
and have settlers on them and many
more are adapted to settlement.

Lost in the Mountains.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Nov. 8.—A detach-
ment from troop E, fourth cavalry, left
here today for the Bitter Root mountains,
Montana, to search for General Carlin's
son and party of five who left Spokane
six weeks ago on a hunting expedition.
They started for the head of Clearwater
and should have returned two weeks ago.
Nothing has been heard from them. It is
supposed they are snow bound. The re-
lief party will approach them from Mis-
soula. The following comprised the
party: William E. Carlin, son of Brigadier
General Carlin, commanding department
of Columbia, his brother-in-law, John
Harvey Pierce, A. H. Himmelwright of
New York, Martin Spencer, a guide of
Missoula, a packer and a cook, six in
all. The snow is said to be six feet deep
on the mountains.

Eugene Mill Burned.

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 8.—The Eugene
flour mill owned by Messrs. Wm. Edris
and son burned to the ground about mid-
night last night. The mill was in oper-
ation and five men were in the building.
The first intimation of the fire was an
explosion in the third story and before
the men could get to the place the en-
tire upper part of the mill was in flames
which spread so rapidly that there was
no chance of saving anything. The fire
department was on hand promptly and
saved the neighboring buildings. The
mill is a total loss and was valued at
\$20,000 and had an insurance of \$10,000.
There were about 20,000 bushels of wheat
in the mill, which is a total loss. Only
part of it was burned. The books of the
mill were saved.

By a Stray Bullet.

HOODEPORT, Wash., Nov. 8.—Joseph
Nadir, an Arab peddler from Seattle,
while walking with his partner on a
lonely trail from Skokomish Indian re-
servation to Hoodport, was shot and
instantly killed at noon today. The
shooting was done by a rifle ball from
ambush supposed to be a stray shot from
some hunter. Further particulars may
develop at the coroner's inquest to-
morrow. The deceased has a sister re-
siding in Seattle.

Stealing Lightning.

TACOMA, Nov. 8.—Orville Shaw and
T. H. Headrick, electric light work em-
ployees, were arrested today charged with
tapping the Tacoma Light & Water com-
pany's wires and stealing electricity
which they used in furnishing electric
lights at cut rate prices. Their receipts
from stolen electricity are estimated to
aggregate \$300 a month.

A Millionaire's Will.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8.—The will of
the late Alexander Montgomery was filed
for probate today. The estate is valued
at \$2,500,000. The will leaves nearly all
to the widow and two daughters, and
provides for the erection of a monument
valued at \$50,000 to the deceased philan-
thropist at the theological seminary at
San Anselmo.
