THE TICKETS

THE HEADLIGHT'S OPINION OF THE
VARIOUS CANDIDATES.

In presenting the views of the
HEADLIGHT, as an independent pa-
per, the following remarks regard-
ing the various candidates are in-
tended to be just to all concerned,
and at the same time to present to
the people the respective merits of
the candidates named. In many
cases there is little choice to make,
and in some instances the editor of
this paper is not acquainted with
the candidates, so in such cases it
will be impossible to indicate a
choice. In fact, in many cases
there are good men on both sides,
and in such cases the members of
the various parties are likely to
support men in their own party.
This will be true as to most of the
state ticket, except perhaps for
governor, it being pretty well un-
derstood that many Democrats will
support Pierce, the Populist candi-
date.

Judge Lord, the Republican nom-
inee for governor, is an excellent
man, and will perhaps get all the
Republican vote, insuring his elec-
tion, and the only objection we can
urge against him is that he was
nominated by the Portland bosses.
Pierce, the Populist, will get a very
large vote, also, and he is said to
be a good man for the place.

As to the balance of the state
ticket we are not qualified to give
an intelligent expression, knowing
none of them personally, and little
of them by hearsay, with two ex-
ceptions. Capt. John O'Brien, the
Democratic candidate for state
printer, is recognized as a strong
friend of the laboring man, and
should receive the vote of the in-
dustrial classes. The Republicans
will probably elect the balance of
the state ticket on a straight party
vote.

Binger Hermann has been very
useful to his constituents, and no
doubt he will be re-elected to Con-
gress with the full Republican vote
and many Democratic votes.

J. J. Daly, the Democratic or
non-partisan candidate for associate
judge in this district should be
elected. We know nothing of his
opponent, Mr. Hewitt, except that
he lives on the east side of the Wil-
lamette, and the west side should
be represented on the bench. Judge
Burnett, the present incumbent,
lives on the east side. Hon. J. J.
Daly is a resident of Dallas, Polk
county. It must be borne in mind
that this district is now entitled to
two judges and that Judge Daly
ought to be one of them.

James McCain, the present in-
cumbent, is a candidate for re-elec-
tion as district attorney. He has
been an efficient official and it may
be said that his success is assured.

E. E. Selph, the Democratic nom-
inee for joint representative for
Yamhill and Tillamook counties is
very popular here, and we under-
stand is very strong in Yamhill
county. It is generally thought
that Mr. Selph or Mr. Dyer will be
elected, and as Mr. Selph seems to
be the best qualified, it is the
strongest man, the people
should support him irrespective of
party in order to insure the elec-
tion of a Tillamook county man.
If a Yamhill county man is elected
it will perhaps be a long time be-
fore this county will have a repre-
sentative of her own. If a Tilla-
mook county man is elected there
is a good chance for Tillamook to
have a representative without any
long business about it. The rela-
tion between Yamhill and Tilla-
mook in this matter have become
strained that it is unlikely that
any satisfactory compromise can

ever be made. Yamhill has had
the joint representative for the last
two years, and it is time Tillamook
be represented irrespective of party.
Reasons for this are more fully set
forth elsewhere.

COUNTY TICKETS.

For Judge, Mr. Sappington and
Mr. Conder are both good men, and
the county will not suffer with
either at the head of the county
court. Mr. C. W. Smith, the popu-
list nominee is also a good man.

For county clerk, Mr. Goyne, the
Democratic nominee, has proved
himself to be efficient in his present
position, and will no doubt do the
work well if elected. We have lit-
tle or no acquaintance with Mr.
Mills, the republican nominee, in
fact he is almost a stranger to the
people of this county, and we can-
not see where he has any claims on
them. Many republicans think he
has no claims of recognition from
their party. As to Mr. Huff, we
know nothing regarding him.

J. H. Jackson and J. D. Edwards
are the principal contestants for
sheriff. Mr. Edwards has made a
good sheriff and has many warm
friends. Jackson is very popular
in his party, is competent to fill the
office and has never asked for office
before. Tom Williams, the popu-
list nominee, is also a deserving
man.

For long term commissioner, we
favor D. P. Harvey, of Oretown.
He is qualified for the office in every
way and his section of the county
should be represented once. T. J.
Lucy and G. A. Mowers, the other
nominees are spoken well of by all
who know them, however.

For short term commissioner, L.
B. Alley is our choice. W. S. Cone
and J. C. Comer are both excellent
men, but the extreme north end of
the county should be represented.

For treasurer John Barker Al-
fred Williams and J. P. Allen are
all well qualified to fill the office,
and nothing but good words could
be spoken for any of them.

For assessor, A. T. White or J.
W. Haskins are men who are highly
respected in the community, but
we believe that Theo Steinhilber is
better qualified than either of them.
Our reasons for this have been fully
stated elsewhere.

For surveyor, A. M. Austin, of
Netarts, is a young man who is
deserving of the office. He is a
practical surveyor and ought to
have the office.

For school superintendent, there
are but two candidates in the field,
T. B. Handley and Mrs. W. J. May,
the Democratic nominee, Mrs. Wil-
ley, having declined to accept the
nomination. The HEADLIGHT will
do what it can to elect Mrs. May.

This paper will support C. E.
Reynolds for coroner, because the
coroner ought to reside at the
county seat.

On account of lack of space we
are not able to discuss the merits
of all the candidates fully this week,
but in due time explicit reasons
will be given for the action taken in
every particular.

stronger than ever before.
