We give our reasons for supporting Charley Reynolds for coroner. In the first place he is eminently qualified for the position, and a man wouldn't have to use a pair of spectacles to look far enough into the situation to see that he will be elected by a larger majority than any man on the republican ticket. Mr. Reynolds will carry this county from Nehalem to Nestucca, and from the snow-capped coast range to the shining sands of Netarts. We invite the democrats and populists to get in and help the republicans roll up a big majority for him.

For fear that some may think this paper made an unwarranted reflection on Senator Maxwell in regard to this county having no representative, we will say that Mr. Maxwell represents Tillamook, Columbia and Washington counties jointly, and that we owe nothing to Yamhill on that score. The bill originated in the house, beyond the reach of Senator Maxwell, and it seemed impossible then to get a new apportionment. No one doubts for a minute that Mr. Maxwell would not let an opportunity pass to do something in the interests of this county.

THE REASONS.

Last summer I sold the HEADLIGHT and moved away, expecting to remain away. At considerable sacrifice I was obliged to return to this place, and finally to take charge of the paper. My intention was to make it Republican, avoiding all factional fights. Mr. T. B. Handley came to me about this time and wanted to hire two columns for the republicans, \$50 being what the other paper offered to do it for. I told him that if I took the paper the republicans would find it at their service free of charge, and the whole paper at that. The only condition I asked was that some of the republican candidates who had opposed my paper should withdraw their opposition, in other words, if all hands would pull for me, I would pull for them. I was willing to support the republican ticket from stem to stern for the sake of harmonizing the party, and so expressed myself to all those most concerned. However, I was given to understand clearly by Mr. Mills and Mr. Handley that my help was not wanted by them, and further, "that they could get along without the HEADLIGHT or any of its friends, or any of that crowd." Well, perhaps they can, but I do not care to force my services upon them. Maybe Mr. Handley and Mr. Mills can be elected by democratic votes, certainly not any other way. I do not consider either of these men worthy of the support of the republicans, and never did think so, but for the interests of harmony was ready to slime them over and swallow them. Mr. Mills and his chief supporters have always been bolters and renegades from the party, and Mr. Handley is too much of a load for the party to carry, besides being a bolter. They were afterward very anxious to patch up a truce or come to terms, but all offers were declined by me, at I had offered to meet them more than half-way on the start.

I feel better since I was relieved of the dose I was about to swallow. As some of my friends heard me talking harmony before I took the paper, I feel that this personal explanation is due in order that there may be no misgivings as to the causes that prompted the paper to take the stand it has.
