Great Excitement at the Little Backwoods Village.

T. B. Handley and Hon. E. E. Selph. They were driving tandem and were followed single file by the other members of the show. After parading the streets before the assembled populace, your correspondent noted the features of their gorgeous costumes. Rev. Handley wore a Highland cloak, knee-breeches fringed around the bottom with butter-colored board-me embroidery, and had a plume in his hat. Hon. Selph had on a mother-hubbard robe and wore a turban on his head. He was bare-footed. Judge Sappington wore a pompadour hair-cut and a brand new suit of clothes, and was bare-headed. Captain Jackson had on buckskin breeches, cut goring, and a bear claw necklace adorned his shapely neck. Dr. Mills wore high boots and a plug hat, and John R. After playing "Before the Ball," the show began. Rev. Handley performed some wonderful feats at tight-rope dancing, and Hon. Selph did a few hand-springs and some nice turning on the horizontal bar. Judge Sappington stole a handful of Hon. Selph's cigars and smoked them under five feet of water without losing a whiff, calling forth the admiration of the crowd. Capt. Jackson rode a horse at full speed, shot glass balls and rolled a cigarette all at one time. Dr. Mills then sang "Two Little Girls in Blue," and was encored. Mr. John R. Mills followed with a magic lantern exhibition, after which the men in tights wound up with the serpentine dance. Everybody wished John Barker and the other members of the troupe had been here. We haven't had so much fun since the 4th of July of '76.
