in regard to getting Tillamook a
representative of her own, we will
be satisfied.

Good men were elected in most
every instance, and a larger num-
ber of good men were defeated.

Perhaps the politicians will take
a back seat next time and allow the
people to run the conventions.

The populist vote in the state is
greater than that of the democrats,
and some strong democratic coun-
ties have been carried by the pop-
ulists.

The state has gone safely repub-
lican, the plurality being estimated
at 15,000. The legislature is safe-
ly republican, insuring the election
of United States Senator by the re-
publicans. Hermann is re-elected
to Congress, and the republicans
have been generally successful in
the county elections. Joe Simons
is elected state Senator over Ex-
Governor Thayer, and the republi-
cans were successful in Multnomah
county. John Fox, republican,
was probably defeated for state Sen-
ator in Clatsop by J. H. Smith,
democrat. The republicans elec-
ted both Representatives.

Out of 1030 votes in this county
on the congressional ticket, 534
were for Hermann, 268 for Miller,
populist, 212 for Weatherford, dem-
ocrat, and 16 for Hurst, prohibi-
tionist. This is perhaps a fair party
test, as it runs nearly the same
on the state ticket all through, and
it shows there are more republi-
cans in this county than there are
populists, democrats and prohibi-
tionists combined. Yet, by bad
management the republicans al-
low some of their candidates to be
defeated every election.

There was a great deal of excite-
ment and some hard feeling during
the campaign just ended, though
at the last it narrowed down to
good natured electioneering. Now
it is over, and everybody seems to
have a friendly spirit regarding
the contest. Everyone should now
devote the same energy to making
butter, raising potatoes, sawing
lumber and improving the country.

The official count shows the vote
for circuit judge to be as follows:
J. J. Daly, 240, H. H. Hewitt, 489,
Sam R. Stott, 290. For district at-
torney, C. H. Dalrymple 354, Jas.
S. McCain 518, L. H. Montayne,
democrat, 159. Mr. McCain ran
ahead of his ticket here. The bal-
ance of the state and district vote
not shown in the table runs about
the same as it does for governor
and congressman.

There were 1043 votes cast in
this election, and a great many did
not attend the polls. It was
thought the vote would be lighter
than usual, but the increase shows
that the population of the county
is steadily increasing notwithstand-
ing the general hard times in the
west.
