



C. E. Reynolds.

We present to our readers an excellent engraving of C. E. Reynolds. The cut was made by Fred Larsen, and it shows Mr. Reynolds in his prime condition, and was taken just after election. The original painting was made by John Stewart. Mr. Reynolds owes his election entirely to the eloquent speeches he made during the campaign. Here is one of his speeches:

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen:—It is a sad thing to be a candidate for the office of coroner, and a still sadder thing to be beaten at the polls. The verdict rests with you, gentlemen, whether I shall be honored by being elected to this responsible office or suffer ignominious defeat. Maddison for the least candidate in the least party road supervisor on the populist ticket, and every one said, "no, I've no use for Doc. Madison". Neither have I. I have promised to appoint 3 deputies in each voting precinct in case I am elected, and one deputy at large. He is to be the scientific expert, and his name is W. F. D. Jones. He is to make them sick and Doc. Petre and Doc. Linton are to finish the job, and then all hands set upon them. The band will now play Annie Rooney.
