The Tillamook Lumbering Company is building a two-story structure 20x32 on the rear of the HEADLIGHT building. The lower story will be occupied by the company's offices, and the upper story will be fitted up with offices, which will be to let.

Tillamook did a great deal of building last year on account of the fire, and the burnt area was rebuilt with much better buildings. But, this year, there is going to be more buildings than ever, the result

of a healthy growth, despite hard times. The good work has already commenced, and at an early date we shall give a list and description of all the buildings proposed and those under construction.

Surveyor General Byars has received notice from the land departments that the survey of T. 1 S., R. 6 W., in Tillamook county. Made by Deputy F.H. Sharp, has been accepted and plats of the tract have been filed in the local land office.

While the rest of the country is complaining of hard times, Tillamook is recovering from the financial crisis very fast, and money is more plentiful here now than it has been for the last two years. Tillamook will boom this year notwithstanding hard times.
