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MAKING POPULITST.

M. M. Estee was named for governor of California on Wednesday. The platform adopted favors free silver, woman suffrage, and protection to home industries. It declares against mob violence, for the exclusion of Chinese, and for a reduction of cost of transporting agricultural products to foreign seaboards, and favors the use of a limited portion of the receipts of the United States custom for this purpose. Commenting on the result of the convention and the platform adopted the Oregonian says:

"The republicans of California have disgraced themselves and disgraced the name of their party. The doctrines they proclaim are the doctrines of populists, socialists, anarchists, nihilists, simpletons and idiots. Now the democratic party of California has its opportunity. If it will put forth a declaration of principles that even border on common sense its ticket ought to get the vote of every intelligent man in the state."

Could anything be more anarchistic than the above assertion! Yes, the republicans of California disgraced themselves because they saw fit to stand up for principle. They are anarchists and nihilists because they were not whipped into line by eastern capitalists. They are simpletons and idiots because they do not believe as the Oregonian does.

Such statements as this in the Oregonian only makes the republican party weaker. It makes men take a determined stand against any such bulldozing methods. It makes populists. It is the last wail of distress from the money power.

The republicans of California did a sensible thing, and when the party takes the same stand in every state, it may again take on the title of the "party of progress." It will make itself as useful as it did thirty years ago.
