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### FREE MONEY.

It is not in the province of this paper to expound doctrines, to say what is right or wrong, to tell people what to do or what not to do, but this paper will endeavor to say things that will cause people to do their own thinking. To say and think what we please, within proper bounds, is a privilege which we prize higher than anything else. Now, we shall advance a financial proposition that should cause you to think. It may be radical or extreme, and perhaps it is better not to go to any extreme, but figure it out to suit yourself:

Let us have more money. Let's have all the silver that the government can coin, and all the paper money the government can print, and have a law passed making it all legal tender, good for paying all obligations. It will soon become so plentiful as to become valueless, and everybody can get all they want. The farmer can't buy groceries with it, and the merchant and non-producer can't buy flour, butter, meat, vegetables or wool or cotton with it. Work can't be procured with it. The laborer will demand something more substantial for his work. The farmer will want something better than a legal tender for his cattle and produce. When the banker wants his floor mopped, he will have to do it himself, even if his vaults are full of silver. The ordinary laborer won't want money, already having more than he needs. It will settle the social question without bloodshed, and one man will be just as rich as another. Then the farmer will exchange his cattle and wheat for sugar, shoes, clothing, railroad tickets, newspapers, and such luxuries as he can't produce. The laborer will make clothing, railroad irons, bricks, build houses, etc. for flour, meat, houses and lots and such other things as he needs. The railroads will trade transportation for iron, ties and grub for the railroad hands. The banker will throw his money into the river, and he will build warehouses and store rooms where he will keep the pro-

duce and manufactured goods of the county, until called for, taking out a small percent of each article for storage charges. He will live on the tolls. We will send our lumber to the cities and countries where they produce no lumber, and we will get hardware, flour, and drygoods in return. But this plan will become cumbersome, in many ways, and in order to keep from shipping goods and produce around over and over again to pay debts, as it would happen in many instances; government officers would be created who would issue checks or certificates representing certain property, establishing a regular value for certain articles, and these checks could be transmitted through the mails at small expense, saving much heavy freighting at times. In a short time these checks would begin to pass from one to another as a circulating medium or money—yes, money, with a recognized value, that is representing or being good for so many bushels of wheat or so many tons of iron or so many pairs of shoes. Would this bring us back to the starting point, or is this the true solution of the money question?
